- He came to Algona in August, 1865, soon followed by his brother, Colman
Together they operated a large farm south of Algona, Iowa.
They became wealthy and powerful in the community.
- After 30 years together on the farm, they moved into Algona, Iowa in 1897.
There they invested their savings in bank stocks and managed
financial affairs of the First National Bank and the Algona State
Bank.
- He taught school in Waukesha, Wisconsin in his early manhood
until the Civil War broke out.
- Military service - Civil War - Company F, 3rd Wisconsin Artillery
he was discharged 1st Jul 1864, re-enlisted in the 20th New York
Heavy Artillery until the end of the war.

LONG, ACTIVE LIFE BROUGHT TO AN END

Charles C. Chubb Died Sunday After-
Noon at 2:30 O'clock.

ALWAYS PROMINENT CITIZEN

Came to the County in Pioneer Times
and Became Wealthy After Years
of Frugal Effort.

A long, active, useful and honor-
able life reached its close Sunday af-
ternoon at 2:30 o'clock when former
State Senator Charles C. Chubb died
at his home in this city.

Senator Chubb's death occasioned
no surprise, for he has been very ill
during more than a year and it has
been realized for many months that
he could not recover. For weeks
prior to his passing the end was ex-
pected at any moment.

The funeral services were held
Tuesday afternoon at the late home
of the decedent. The ceremonies were
conducted by Rev. O. H. Holmes on
the spacious lawn surrounding the
house. Interment was made in beau-
tiful Riverview Cemetery, the last
rites at the grave being conducted
by the Algona Masonic lodge.

Senator Chubb had been an influ-
ential citizen of the county during
more than forty five years. He
came here in an early day and was
shortly afterwards followed by his
brother, Colman, who survives him.
Together they for years operated a
large ranch south of Algona. They
were frugal, industrious and honor-
able in all their dealings. Gradual-
ly they became wealthy and powerful
in the community. But there was
no taint on any dollar that they ever
accumulated and the power that
they came to exercise was always
wielded with rare discretion and wide
public benefit.

Throughout their lives in this coun-
ty the two brothers were insepar-
able. Their business affairs were al-
ways conducted as a partnership.
They and their families resided in the
same home and their relations have
furnished an example of peace, amity,
love and forbearance that it would

the courthouse offices and the of-
fice of the Kossuth County Mutual
Insurance Company, which Mr. Chubb
helped to found and of which he was
treasurer during many years prior to
his death, were also closed out of
respect to his memory.

The pall bearers at the funeral
were J. R. Jones, D. A. Haggard and
Lewis H. Smith of Algona, C. H.
Blossom of Burt, O. R. Rowley of
Swea City and G. W. Newell of Fen-
ton.

Obituary facts in reference to the
deceased follow:—

Charles C. Chubb, was born October
2nd, 1840 in Waukesha County, Wis-
consin, his parents, natives of Ver-
mont, being among the earliest pion-
eers of that region.

He was reared and educated at the
place of his birth and was engaged
in teaching school in an adjoining
county when the war broke out.

In April, 1861, he enlisted in Co.
E., 3rd, Wis. Infantry Volunteers,
serving with his regiment through the
battles of Winchester, South Moun-
tain, Antietam, Chancellorsville, Get-
tysburg and Lookout Mountain, until
July 1st, 1864, when he was discharg-
ed at Marietta, Ga., by reason of the
expiration of his term of service.

Soon after, he re-enlisted in the
20th N. Y. Heavy Artillery and serv-
ed to the end of the war, being final-
ly discharged on the 6th day of
May, 1865.

In August of the same year he
came to Algona, being followed soon
after by his brother, Colman, and
together they established the home
on the farm south of town which they
occupied for thirty years, from which
they retired in 1897 to the new home
they had builded in this city.

January 1st, 1869, Charles C. Chubb
was united in marriage with Hat-
tie M. Taylor, who, with their three
children, Collie, Charley and Laura,
survive him.

He is survived also by two broth-
ers, Osgood P. of Wauwatoosa, Wis.,
and Colman C. of Algona.

In 1872 he was elected County Sup-
ervisor and in 1883 was chosen to
represent this district in the upper
house of the Legislature.

He served in the
Army of the Republic and a Royal
Arch Mason.

Leaving the farm after thirty years
of strenuous endeavor they moved
to Algona. Selecting one of the most
beautiful sites in the city, they
built for themselves and their families
a large, modern home. There they
have ever since resided, setting a
pattern of family affection and
goodfellowship that has been the
subject of favorable comment in this
community since grown men and women
were in their cradles.

The two brothers were endowed
with rare business ability and hard
sense. They made their business pay
them well without infringing on either
the legal or moral rights of others.
Thus they acquired wealth without
at the same time falling victims
of the envy, jealousy and ill-will
of their neighbors. Everybody that
enjoyed their acquaintance knew that
they were scrupulously honest. They
were faithful to all their contracts
and those who had dealings with them
came to rely as much upon their
bare word as upon a government
bond.

Following their removal to Algona,
the brothers invested much of their
savings in bank stocks. These
holdings were under the direction in
the main of the dead Senator. He
was a stockholder in numerous northern
Iowa banks and a director in
several of them. He was, besides,
president of one of the solidest banking
institutions in the county, the
Burt National Bank, and vice president
of the Algona State Bank. Until
disease struck him down, he was
active in the management of the affairs
of all of these institutions. He
regularly attended all bank meetings
in which he was interested and much
of the success that these banks have
obtained was due to his wise and
constant counsel.

The funeral was attended by a very
large concourse of friends. Included
among those present were nearly
all the bankers of the county. In
honor of the deceased most of the
banks of the county closed their
doors Monday afternoon. Some of
