Where Louisa County Tax Money Is Spent

Division of Funds and Percentages Compared For 1932—Author of Bill.

We are indebted to State C. W. Storms for an informative report which shows actual division of the tax amount and percentage collected in each county of the state in the state as a whole. The following division in tax purposes levied in 1931 and in 1932:

Louisa County

Total tax \$566,376.07.

State tax, \$47,697.58 or 8.4 cent as compared to the state average of 8.54.

County tax, \$216,161.56 or 38 cent as compared to the state average of 29.34.

District school tax, \$265,924.69 or 46.95 percent as compared to state average of 45.70.

Cities tax, \$32,779.99 or 5.8 cent as compared to the state average of 14.36.

Miscellaneous tax, \$3,812.44 or .67 percent as compared to the state average of 2.06.

By the use of these figures it is easy to determine which of Louisa county taxes are above or below the state average.

School Audit

The outstanding thing that was conceived to point out is that Louisa county district school tax money is 46.95 percent of the total tax in Louisa county and 45.70 percent of the state is not subject to an appeal unless especial request is made.

Storms Bill

This condition should be in the opinion of State Auditor Storms and to this end he is the author of a bill designated 323 which provides for the following general plan:

Resident Examiners

Divide the state into districts and locate in each district resident examiners under the supervision of the state auditor, who shall annually the books of all taxing bodies and institutions. State examiners will be rotated annually so that none will audit in any district two consecutive years.

AN ACT

TO AMEND SECTION FIFTY-FOUR HUNDRED ELEVEN (5411), CODE 1931, RELATING TO PUBLISHING PROCEEDINGS OF BOARDS OF SUPERVISORS; AND TO REPEAL SECTION FIFTY-FOUR HUNDRED TWELVE-A ONE (5412-A1), CODE 1931, RELATING TO THE PUBLICATION OF THE SAME AND ENACTING A SUBSTITUTE THEREFOR.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. That section fifty-four hundred eleven (5411), subsection one (1), code of 1931, be amended by striking out all following the comma (,) in line two (2), and adding the following: "excluding from the publication of said proceedings, its canvass of the various elections, as provided by law; witness fees of witnesses before the Grand Jury and in the District Court in criminal cases; the transcripts of justices of the peace, including their proceedings and costs; the county superintendent's report."

Section 2. That section fifty-four hundred twelve-a one (5412-a1), code 1931, be and the same is hereby repealed and the following is enacted in lieu thereof:

"5412-cl. All proceedings of each regular, adjourned or special meeting of Boards of Supervisors; including the schedule of bills allowed, shall be published immediately after the adjournment of such meeting of said Boards, and the publication of the schedule of the bills allowed shall be made by the county superintendent for whom the allowance is made and for what such bill is filed and the amount

Manded the same high place in the religious life of the town, and especially was he a pillar in the Methodist church where he served as superintendent of the Sunday school for 17 years, as well as being on the official board. In politics he was an active republican and took a deep interest in town, county, state and national affairs. He served his community faithfully in civic affairs, and was honored by being elected as a representative to the Iowa legislature in 1890, and re-elected in 1892. The service he rendered the county was greatly appreciated by his constituency. In the home he was the same kind and loving husband and father, and his friends always received a hearty welcome and a kindly greeting when they called there.

We just cannot think of a place in life where he didn't measure up to a stalwart citizen. For years his store drew trade from points far outside his territory, and it was his policy always to sell at the lowest margin of profit possible and he never permitted a customer to leave his store dissatisfied.

He had a friendly and cheerful nature, radiating happiness and good will wherever he went. He was the type of a man who easily commanded your admiration. He made a success of whatever he undertook to do. He was outspoken and unswerving in his support of what he considered to be the right thing, and was uncompromizing against that which he considered to be wrong.

The large attendance of neighbors and friends at his funeral Sunday afternoon attested the high esteem in which he was held by those who knew him best.

PRUNE JELLY

1 pound cooked prunes, 2 tablespoons gelatin, 1 cup cold water, 2 cups boiling water, 1 cup sugar, juice 2 lemons.

Remove pits and press prunes through a coarse sieve. Soften gelatine in cold water; dissolve in boiling water. Add prunes, sugar and lemon juice. Pour into mold. Chill. Serve with whipped cream or soft custard.—Child Life Magazine.
