John F. Hinman was born August  
 24, 1827, in Derby, Orleans county,  
 Vermont. He was married in 1866,  
 to Ellen A. Foote, at the residence  
 of Perry C. Holcomb, in Marshall-  
 town, Iowa. Four children were  
 born to them: Ralph, Bert T., Eth-  
 el M., and Nellie G., of whom the  
 first and last survive. They lived 25  
 years in Marshal' county. About  
 19 years ago they moved to Baker  
 township, O'Brien county, and five  
 years ago to Primghar. Mr. Hin-  
 man was a man of far more than or-  
 dinary ability; well educated, well-  
 read, well-informed upon current  
 events; a high-minded, affable and  
 genial gentleman, whom it was al-  
 ways pleasurable and profitable to  
 meet; most exemplary in all his hab-  
 its; pure in thought, life and busi-  
 ness; we do not believe any one ever  
 heard him indulge in profane or vul-  
 gar language; successful in business,  
 his word as good as his note or bond  
 any day; he never engaged in poli-  
 ties nor sought office, though in 1891  
 he was tendered the nomination for  
 representative, accepted, was elected,  
 running several hundred ahead of his  
 party ticket, and served with honor  
 and credit. He had a regular pro-  
 gram for the Sabbath day, and was  
 always in favor of good morals and  
 right living. He was loved, respect-  
 ed and esteemed by all. A kind and  
 affectionate husband and father and  
 a helpful neighbor and friend. Truly  
 a good man and citizen has been  
 taken, and all feel the loss, and all  
 sympathize with the family in their  
 sudden and great bereavement.
