

His candidacy, which he once renounced, has caused more conjecture, gossip, prediction and denial in Iowa than any other, because of the uncertainties which have continually surrounded it.  
Valentine's candidacy made the race for the democratic nomination three-sided, State Senator Ed Green, of Fort Dodge, and former Gov. Nelson G. Kraachel, of Harlan, having announced earlier. Valentine expressed highest regard for both.  
He greeted the Valentine announcement, Wednesday, with a statement from Fort Dodge, saying that Valentine had been forced into the race against his own wishes by "the men who fear the possibility of my election."  
The ground was shifting in both parties Wednesday. The republicans have been more or less surprised by a rapidly developing primary election fight of their own for the governorship nomination. The field was reduced Wednesday when Bern Upton, of Madison, withdrew and threw his support to H. R. Gross, of Des Moines, for the republican nomination for governor.  
Upton, denying any prior agreement with Gross, approved the latter's principles and condemned Gov. George A. Wilson. In addition to Gross and Wilson, the remaining candidates for the republican nomination for governor are I. H. Knudson, of Jewell, and Harlan Riggs, of Des Moines.  
Valentine called reporters to his room at Hotel Fort Des Moines early Wednesday and told them:  
"I have found it necessary to change my earlier decision. I have decided to become a candidate for governor. I am resigning the position of United States district attorney today unconditionally."  
Valentine did not explain the reasons for his change of decision from his earlier statement in which he said that he felt that he could not afford to seek or accept the nomination. It is common knowledge, however, that democratic supporters of Valentine refused to accept his earlier decision as final and continued to press for his entry into the governorship race. Among those who urged him to enter the race was State Senator Clyde L.



## PANTHERS SCORE ELEVEN POINTS IN THE VALLEY MEET

Placed Seventh In Field of Fourteen of Iowa's High Schools.

## OSKALOOSA MEET NEXT

Coach McCormick's Boys Showing Up in Good Shape—Busy Weeks Ahead.

Following a fine showing in the indoor track and field meet at Iowa City, a week previous, Knoxville's high school track and field stars placed seventh in the Valley Relays, held at West Des Moines, last Saturday, scoring eleven points.

The classy Des Moines prep teams ran off with top honors with East Des Moines annexing their fifth straight title with 71 points. Roosevelt was second with 54 1/2 points, Lincoln third with 32, North fourth with 28, Albia fifth with 16, Newton sixth with 15 1/2 and Knoxville seventh. Fourteen schools earned points in the annual carnival as the East Siders cracked three records.

Coach John McCormick's Panthers didn't gain a first place but continued to show the field and relay event strength which brought them fourth place in the class B state indoor meet. Cephus Tucker tied with Keith Lyon, of Roosevelt, of Des Moines, at 9 feet, 6 inches for fifth in the pole vault, while Tom Voyce flung the javelin 135 feet one inch for fifth and Ralph Fry broad-jumped 18 feet 9/16 inches for fourth place. Tom Scott high-jumped 5 feet 7 1/4 inches to tie for third with Joe Nucko, of Albia, and Bill Spriggs, of East.

The Panther two-mile baton four of Bill Hanna, Harold Goebel, Vernon Rickabough and Tom Scott placed fourth at East's quartet set up a new record of 8:21.9 while the half-mile baton team of Gene Bane, Bob Hauser, Ed. McConville and Pat McConville placed third. Paul Dickerson gathered the remaining points when he tied for fourth with Tom Thornson, of Newton, in the 100-yard dash.

Although not figuring in the scoring the Knoxville Junior High relay four composed of Hausner, Calvin Rickett, Don Andrew and Billy Buckles placed fifth in a special 440-yard Junior relay event.

The only team in the South Central Iowa Conference that placed higher than Knoxville was Lincoln High, of Des Moines. The Panthers may have a tough time in winning the conference meet that is coming up in a few weeks.

## Wignall in Prison in Louisiana

Upon expiration of Wignall's sentence in the southern prison he will be brought back to Knoxville to face forgery charges here, according to authorities.

## NEW BUILDING FOR IOWA POWER AND LIGHT CO.

Location on North Side Is Being Rebuilt to House Utility Company.

Workmen started this week on reconstruction of the building on the north side of the square recently occupied by the Sloggett Jewelry store. The building, owned by Mrs. J. S. Bellamy, will lose all semblance of its former appearance when completed, and it is expected to take its place with the finest in the city and will be occupied by the Iowa Power & Light Co.

The building will undergo a complete remodeling from top to bottom. This property has an east front to the north of the Elliott Shoe Store, and it will also be rebuilt. The front will be rebuilt over both stories and modern black glass will be employed to give it a modern appearance in keeping with others in the city.

The new location for the Iowa Power & Light Co. will give the display of electrical appliance every advantage. The room will be finished and arranged to give better display to each and every item handled. The offices of the company will be at the rear of the room as will be the manager's private office. A full basement will take care of storage and service demands.

Manager Wilbur stated that a new air-conditioning system of the latest type will be installed. They system operates at night on an off-peak period storing up air to be used the following day. Unusual lighting design will identify the business following its installation about July 1.

## CHAS. H. ROBINSON ENDED HIS CAREER SATURDAY MORNING

Fifty Years Ago Was a Popular and Well-Known Man in County.

## PLAYED MANY PARTS

Soldier, Lawyer, Legislator, Editor, Photographer, Teacher, Public Official.

A paragraph in the daily papers of Sunday announced briefly the death at an early hour Saturday morning of Charles H. Robinson in Chicago.

Fifty years ago no man was better known in Marion county, yet today not many are left who knew Robinson in the years he made his home here.

Charles H. Robinson was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, February 3, 1843, and was reared in Guernsey and an adjoining county. His youth was occupied in acquiring an education, and for some years he was engaged in teaching. He enlisted in the civil war, first for three months, in the Eighty-sixth Ohio Infantry, and afterward he re-enlisted in the One Hundred and Twenty-ninth infantry, and was discharged to accept a commission as second lieutenant in the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Illinois. After his return from the army he went to Illinois and taught school. In 1869 he came to Marion county, and in 1873 was elected county auditor, and in 1875 was re-elected, and again in 1877. Having chosen the law as his profession, he read with Stone & Ayres with whom he became associated after his admission to the bar in 1879. In 1874 he had married Miss Helen Mathews, born in Coshocton county, Ohio, a daughter of Hon. James Mathews, a member of congress from the Coshocton district in Ohio and a pioneer horticulturist of Iowa.

To Mr. and Mrs. Robinson was born a daughter, Gertrude, who married an Englishman named Baker, and they made their home in England. Mrs. Baker preceded her father in death.

Mrs. George Anthony Schretter, of Chicago, in whose family Capt. Robinson made his home for the past nineteen years, wrote The Express on the day of Capt. Robinson's death:  
"Chicago, April 13, 1940.—Editor Knoxville Express—Dear Sir: I know you and your readers will be saddened to learn that Capt. C. H. Robinson died at three-thirty this morning. His death was peaceful. To the end he enjoyed The Express and loved to learn the news of his old home town.

"Capt. Robinson has been a member of my family for nineteen years, and we have all shared his enjoyment of The Express with him. He read four papers a day and kept up-to-date in political and world affairs.

"He leaves two granddaughters and a great-grandson and a great-granddaughter, all living in London, England.

"The captain's nephew, Robert Wallace, of Tulsa, Okla., was with him when he died.

"The captain enjoyed a birthday cake on his 97th birthday. The last honor given him, while being made honorary commander of the

For a year the governor struggled along, riding in highway patrol cars which just happened to be going his way, no matter where highway fatalities were occurring in greatest number, or taking his pick of any state car which might be available in the so-called "pool" conducted by the \$2400-a-year official he added to the state payroll.

Last week the state executive council, of which Governor Wilson is chairman, bought a state automobile to be used by the governor. It traded a 1938 Studebaker (net price Des Moines \$1,038) for a 1940 Ford (list price Des Moines \$867.50) and paid \$240.70 of the taxpayers' money to boot. The trade-in price of the Studebaker was \$640, so it could hardly be called one of the "wrecks" the Wilson administration said it inherited, especially as it was a 1938 model.

"I wonder if Governor Wilson will drive his new deluxe car out to the Abraham Lincoln Park home, and if he will, will he close a mortgage and secured deficiency judgment just a few days before state troops were sent to Denison because of so many such foreclosures?" asked a democratic spokesman.

The republican legislative interim committee has promised to make its often-postponed trip to the institutions under the republican state board of control this week. Upon its return will the committee answer the following questions?

Is it true or false that the last legislature approved the purchase of a Hammond electrical organ for the chapel of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport, the children having no music except that provided by the Home band, but after nine months of the republican biennium there is no organ?

Is it true or false that a farm tractor is being purchased this spring for the Davenport Orphans' Home by the simple expedient of eliminating 16 radios placed upon the estimate for the children's cottages, there being no radios there now unless the cottage matron has her own, the institution with its 240 acres already having two tractors (a Farmall and a McCormick-Deering) besides 10 horses?

Is it true or false that Republican Chairman McCree secured authority from the republican legislative interim committee to spend up to \$1,000 on a cattle shed; the work was done but the organ and the radios for the children are still not forthcoming?

Is it true or false that livestock is considered ahead of the children?

The official figures in the office of the state comptroller show seven more employees in the department of agriculture, under Secretary Mark Thornburg, than when the democrats went out of office fifteen months ago. The increase in the semi-monthly payroll in this department is \$468.48, computed in the office of the state comptroller. This is of more than passing interest in view of the loudly-touted and bogus "economy" claims of Governor Wilson, and his oft-repeated declaration that his administration cut down the number of state employees in the state house by 375 after he took office.

"There are 13 vacancies in the state highway patrol, although the highway death rate is higher than ever before in Iowa and this state has the highest percentage rate of increase of highway deaths of any state. Now that the republican state convention is over, can these vacancies be filled, without losing too many republican votes? Or must the state wait until after the primary election on June 8 to fill the highway patrol ranks, so there can be no checking up on job promises made by the republicans controlling the patrol until the republican votes are counted?"

Loyal Legion of the U. S. He was the last commissioned officer in the Chicago area. Sincerely, "Natalie Schretter."

"Charlie" Robinson was a brilliant and versatile character. He did many things and did them well, and enjoyed them all.

About 1885 he leased Capt. McCormack's Reporter and conducted it for a time. He was in the photograph business for a while. At one time he traveled over the county selling tombstones and grave markers, he and his brother, Tom C., being in the marble business in Knoxville. He had a position in one of the departments in Washington, D. C., and later was U. S. pension agent for Iowa and Nebraska, in charge in Des Moines. He was much interested in fraternal affairs and life insurance, and for many years of his later life in Chicago he edited a journal devoted to fraternal insurance.

"Charlie" Robinson was a cousin of the famous Three Robinson Brothers, remarkable for their height, who resided here and for many years were features in circuses and museums. Sam, Will and Charlie toured the world with the Barnum circus. All are now dead.

Mr. Robinson's tastes were as varied as his pursuits. He was at home in literature, art, travel, politics, and many scientific lines. During his later years in Chicago he gave much attention to the famous sand dunes just across the Indiana line, and his writings upon them were published in leading magazines. He was an occasional contributor to The Express, which he had read for sixty years or more. When his daughter Gertrude married and went to live in London he was a frequent visitor in her home; and the writer has a vivid recollection of Charlie's enjoyment of a chance meeting with the king of England and saluting his majesty as he passed him on a secluded highway.

Funeral services were held Monday and burial was in Chicago.

# CAPT. CHAS. ROBINSON DIES IN CHICAGO

He Was Once Mayor of Knoxville  
And Member of The  
Legislature.

A clipping received from J. J. Maloney of Chicago tells of the death of Capt. Charles H. Robinson, 87, former mayor of Knoxville and also for many years a member of the Iowa legislature. He died at 1401 East 52nd street, Chicago, where he had lived for the past 19 years.

Captain Robinson was born in Ohio and was a grandson of Alexander McCracken, who fought in the Revolutionary war with his sons. Captain Robinson's mother was one of the first women students at Oberlin College.

After the war, Captain Robinson

served as mayor of Knoxville. Mr. Maloney says that when he was a farmer boy living near Knoxville he knew Captain Robinson.

Captain Robinson was honorary commander-in-chief of the Loyal Legion, formed by officers of the Union after the war, and was the last surviving Civil war officer in the Chicago area. He was the discoverer of the "Capt. Robinson Bone" and was an early student and authority on the sand dunes of Indiana. He wrote several books, one of which, "Longhead," was one of the four books Theodore Roosevelt carried with him on his South American explorations.

Survivors include Helen Baker Kirk, Frances Baker Harris, grand children, and Robert Kirk and Natalie Harris, great grandchildren, all of London, England and a sister, Mrs. Jeanetta Bell Wallace of Tulsa, Okla.

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

His youth was occupied in acquiring an education, and for some years was engaged in teaching. He enlisted in the late war, first for three months, in the Eighty-sixth Ohio infantry, and afterward re-enlisted in the one Hundred and Twenty-ninth infantry, and was discharged to accept a commission as second lieutenant in the one hundred and thirty-sixth Illinois. After his return from the army he went to Illinois and taught school. In 1869 he came to this county, and in 1873 was elected county auditor, and in 1875 was re elected his own successor, and again in 1877. Having made choice of the practice of law as a profession, he read with Stone & Ayres, with whom he is now associated, and was admitted to the bar in 1879. He married Miss Helen Mathews in 1874; she was born in Coshocton county Ohio. They have one daughter: Gertie.
