

Funeral services for Henry T. Saberson, 91, will be at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Harbach's funeral home. Burial will be in Woodland cemetery.

Mr. Saberson died Sunday, fol- lowing a two- week illness, at his home, 1074 Forty-second st.

Born in Beloit, Wis., Mr. Saberson came to Bue- na Vista county, Iowa, in 1875. He later moved to



Alta, Ia., and aft- er retiring from the hardware busi- ness, became associated there with a bank as cashier.

He served as representative in the state legislature two terms, 1892 and 1894. In 1901 he ac- cepted a position in the office of secretary of state, which he held 18 years.

When the legislature passed the "blue sky" laws, he was appoint- ed special examiner for the execu- tive council. Eight years later he retired.

Mr. Saberson was a member of the Capital Lodge No. 110 A. F. and A. M., the Des Moines Con- sistory and Plymouth Congrega- tional church. Mr. and Mrs. Sa- berson had celebrated their sixty- fourth wedding anniversary the day before his death.

Surviving are his widow; three daughters, Mrs. Nina Hohberger, Miss Lulu Grace Saberson, both of Des Moines, and Mrs. Ora F. Ryan of San Francisco, Cal.; a brother, Andrew Saberson, and two sisters, Mrs. Olive Barnum, Miss Julia Saberson, all of Beloit, Wis., also three grandchildren.

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# Henry Saberson, Prominent Alta Pioneer Died Sunday

## LAND OWNER; FAIR SEC. AND BUSINESS MAN

Lived to Ripe Old Age of 91 Years; Was Active in Many Affairs

Henry T. Saberson, pioneer land owner of Elk township, former business man of Alta, and the first secretary of the Buena Vista County Fair, passed away at his home in Des Moines last Sunday. Mr. Saberson had attained the ripe old age of 91 years last November.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Harbach Funeral Home in Des Moines with the Capitol Lodge A. F. & A. M. in charge of the services. Interment was made in Woodlawn cemetery of that city.

Early Land Owner  
Much of the early pioneering

history of the Saberson family was made in partnership with his brother, namely Samuel Saberson. For both the Henry and Samuel Saberson families celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary on March 27, 1942 and their Gold-wedding anniversary on Mar. 27, 1929.

Henry Saberson was born in Rock County, Wisconsin, and with his family moved to Buena Vista county in the early spring of 1871, where their father Torgus Saberson purchased a section of land in Elk township.

Both of the boys married neighboring girls in Elk township, and Henry took Etta Bradfield, (Continued on back page)

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

daughter of Rev. Adolphus Bradfield as his wife. Both Samuel and Henry and their family lived in one home for some time but after their new homes were built they lived separately.

Four daughters were born to the Henry Saberson union. They were Nina, now Mrs. Paul Hohberger; Myrtle, deceased; Ora, who was Mrs. Thomas Ryan, now deceased; and Lulu, a resident of Des Moines. Besides the daughters, Mrs. Saberson survives.

In the late 80's Henry Saberson moved to Alta where he was engaged in the hardware business, later being elected as cashier of a bank here. He was elected as a member of the Iowa legislature and also served as chief clerk of the office of Secretary of State, Blue Sky Examiner for the Executive Council and an employee in the State House for 26 years.

Henry Saberson was the first secretary of the Buena Vista County Fair and also served as a member of the board of education here for eleven years.

In 1901 they moved to Des Moines and that city was his home until his death. But for many years he commuted back and forth from the city to Alta, looking after farm property. But during the past few years, age had left its mark, and he stayed closer to home.

## The Buena Vista County Fair


In section 26 of Nokomis township, Buena Vista County, there are 36 acres of property which are transformed for one week each year into a colorful and noisy center for family fun, games and recreation.

This has been going on since 1878 when four men organized The Buena Vista County Agricultural Society, bought the land at the northeast edge of Alta and determined to start an annual county fair. C.E. Cameron, George E. Hobbs, H.T. Saberson and M. Adams sold 400 shares in order to pay for the land in their speculative undertaking.

It turned out that C.E. Cameron, an Alta druggist and owner of a horse farm west of town, was a FAIR choice for a FAIR job, for after serving as director and coordinator for the first sixteen Alta Fairs, he went on to be director of the Iowa State Fair for ten years.

In the early days, the fair goers drove in with their teams and raced the same horses that had been hitched to their buggies or wagons. Mr. Cameron was interested in harness racing and eventually it was his influence that brought the sulky drivers to the race track.

In days gone by there were horses which became famous at the Alta track: Vivian O'Brian, a little dapple gray from South Dakota, Betty Ann Direct, a bay mare, Edgar S. and Attila.

The races were in the afternoon and bigger sights and sounds came on after dark when the Thearle-Duffield Company from Chicago presented their fireworks displays.

When the grandstand became a reality there were spectacular shows in early evening: Carvers' Diving Horses, the Hustrei Troupe of highwire bicyclists, Ricardo on His Swaying Pole and Karl King's band. One time, twenty Rockettes enroute to the Colorado State Fair were booked by Mr. G.A. Soderquist for one performance on the Alta stage, much to the delight of the fair patrons. Mr. Soderquist gave eighteen years of faithful and devoted service as chairman-manager of the fair.

Midways were not always organized carnivals. In earlier years a family from Okoboji came down with a souvenir stand and food. There were a privately owned merry-go-round and ferris wheel for a nickel a ride.

Eventually the hub-bub included the sounds of organized carnivals, and added to the carousel and ferris wheel were the whip, the tilt-a-whirl, the calliope, the shooting galleries, the penny toss and the cry of the carnival barker. It was then that Moms had to start cleaning cotton candy and taffy apples off of the little kids' faces.

As time went on the race track gave way to cars and the oval has since seen midgets, Indy-type racers and stock cars.

The wheels on the parking lot changed too. The buggies and wagons were replaced by Essex, Ford, Nash, Willys-Knight, Studebaker and DeSoto and later by Toyota, Renault LeCar, Datsun, K-Car and Volkswagen, Chevy, Plymouth, etc.

Before the Storm Lake kids had cars, they used train travel during the fair. It was convenient to take the morning Illinois Central passenger train to the Alta depot-spend all day at the fair and return home on the evening train.

Ladies' Day at the fair was introduced in the 1940's and Floral Hall (no longer standing) was the center of activity with colorful exhibits of handiwork, gardening and crafts.

Since 1920, when 4-H became active, there have been open class premiums in horticulture, cattle, hogs, poultry and sheep.

Ninety years later, the newer buildings are: 4-H Girls' building, horse and pony building, hog arena, junior feed barns, show ring and Future Farmers of America sheep barns.

Open class is now categorized as: farm and garden, floriculture, textiles, pantry, crafts and basic hobbies. There are now two permanent, enclosed food stands.

Tom Huseman is presently the director-manager-coordinator. He was preceded over the years by: Roy Wilkinson, C.J. Baines, Barney Kindwall, Art Adams, Bert Hatch, Bill Sievers, E.J. Edwards, G.A. Soderquist, and W.H. Brown.

HENRY T. SABERSON

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of the Honorable Henry T. Saberson, a former member of the General Assembly of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

Henry T. Saberson, son of Torgus and Betsy Saberson, was born in Rock county, Wisconsin, November 28, 1851, his parents having come from Norway in 1839.

In 1875 Mr. Saberson settled in northwest Iowa where he engaged in the hardware business and later associated with a bank as cashier.

He was married March 27, 1879, to Etta Bradfield, daughter of a Christian minister, and also a pioneer of northwest Iowa. Four daughters were born, three of whom with their mother still survive: Mrs. Nina Hohberger and Miss Lulu Grace Saberson, both of Des Moines, Iowa, and Mrs. Ora J. Ryan of San Francisco, California.

Mr. Saberson served in the state legislature as Representative from Buena Vista county during the Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth General Assemblies. In 1901 he accepted a position in the office of the secretary of state, which he held 18 years. When the legislature passed the "blue sky" laws, he was appointed special examiner for the executive council. Eight years later he retired.

He was a member of the Capital Lodge No. 110 A.F. & A.M., the Des Moines Consistory and Plymouth Congregational church, and at the time of his death was vice president of the Iowa Pioneer Law Makers Association, and never missed a session of this association until this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Saberson celebrated their sixty-fourth wedding anniversary the day before his death.

He passed away at the age of ninety-one after a two weeks' illness at his home in Des Moines, and was laid to rest in Woodland cemetery.

In his commercial and in his public life he made valuable contributions to the welfare of the state of Iowa and continued his interest in good government and public affairs until the very end.

STANLEY RULIEF SMITH

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public services of the Honorable Stanley R. Smith, a former member of the General Assembly of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Stanley Rulief Smith was the third son of James A. and Mary Alice (Crego) Smith, born at Osage, Iowa, on January 5, 1881. After completing his education at the Osage high school and the Cedar Valley Seminary, he attended Grinnell College during the years 1900-1901, and then for the following two years studied law at Iowa University, and was a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity.

Upon completion of this work, he entered the services of the James A. Smith Lumber Company, being very active in the establishment of new yards in South Dakota, until 1909, when he purchased a lumber business at Tripoli, Iowa, later on adding a business at Oran, giving these his personal attention until 1919 when he removed to Osage to take the active management of his father's estate.

His business ability was again recognized when in 1934, after the death of its president, F. W. Annis, he was called to the presidency of the Home Trust and Savings Bank of Osage, and after two years failing health compelled him to relinquish this position to other hands, and he was elected vice president of the bank, a position he held at the time of his death. His business ability, especially along banking lines, has long been recognized and his advice was eagerly sought and will long be cherished and remembered.

His desire to be of service soon gained for him other recognitions. He was chosen to represent Bremer county as State Representative for 1917-1918. After his removal to Osage, he was elected its mayor for the term of 1921-1923, exercising these responsibilities to the entire satisfaction of the communities which he served. He was at one time a member of the
