DEATH COMES TO HON. HENRY STONE

FORMER SPEAKER OF IOWA
 HOUSE AND WELL-KNOWN
 ATTORNEY DEAD.

END COMES IN CHICAGO
 EARLY THIS MORNING

Slight Stroke of Paralysis, Last Feb-
 ruary, Marked Beginning of End —
 Stone Ex-County Attorney, and Was
 Once Prominent in State Politics —
 Member Public Library Board.

Henry Stone, former speaker of the Iowa house of representatives and twice a member of that body, and an old and well-known attorney of this city, died at Dr. Lindlahr's sanatorium, on Ashland boulevard, Chicago, this morning. The news of his death which, while sudden, was not entirely unexpected by those who knew his true condition, was received in a telegram from Mrs. Stone to Mr. Henry Pappé shortly before noon.

Because of the prominent places he had occupied in state legislative circles, as representative and speaker of the house, in the county as county attorney for four years, and in the city as a member of the board of trustees of the public library, Mr. Stone was widely known.

Exact Cause of Death Not Known.

The brief message from Mrs. Stone, which told of her husband's death, contained no details of his last sickness. It was known here, however, that for the past week he had been undergoing a very severe attack of intestinal trouble which was made especially dangerous by the extremely hot weather.

In his weakened condition Mr. Stone was unable to withstand the additional physical strain. Word reached the city Friday that his condition was very serious.

Mrs. Stone, in charge of the body, leaves Chicago tonight, and will arrive here at 7 o'clock Sunday morning. No arrangements for the funeral will be made until Mrs. Stone's wishes are consulted.

Cummins, Hepburn, Lacey and Perkins, became an active candidate for the nomination of United States senator. This honor eventually went to Gear.

County Attorney Four Years.

Just prior to his election to the general assembly Mr. Stone was chairman of the local county republican committee. After retiring from the house, Mr. Stone resumed his practice of law in this city. In 1899 he was elected county attorney, and two years later was re-elected.

Mr. Stone was the senior member of the present board of trustees of the public library. He was appointed before the present library building was erected, and in 1904 was re-appointed for a second term of six years, which would have expired in 1910.

Was Early School Teacher.

Mr. Stone was born in Ohio. He was 56 years of age, and for thirty-one years he had been a resident of this county and city. He graduated from Oberlin College, and soon after finishing his course came to Marshall county and went to Marietta, where he began teaching the Moninger school. Later he came to this city, and with R. E. Sears formed the law partnership of Sears & Stone, which continued for eighteen months, or until Mr. Sears retired to engage in the barb wire manufacturing business. Since then Mr. Stone has practiced alone.

Mr. Stone married Miss Florence Powell, a former teacher in the public schools of this city. The wedding took place at Kansas City. The couple had no children.

Stroke Beginning of End. The sudden attack last winter of hemorrhage of the brain, which brought about a condition involving the left side of the body, and which closely resembled paralysis in a light form, was the beginning of the end.

While addressing a large audience at the Odean, on the night of Feb. 26, when the declamatory contests and spelling match of the county short course were being held, Mr. Stone was stricken. He had been invited to speak for a few minutes in the interest of the movement in the state schools for the collection of a fund on the Tuesday following, with which a monument for Senator Allison was to be purchased.

Was Invalid For Weeks. From the examination it was determined that Mr. Stone had suffered a slight hemorrhage of the brain, which had resulted in a apopleptic condition involving the left side of his body. For ten days his left arm and leg were useless, but gradually he regained control of the former. His leg, however, never entirely recovered from the effects of the stroke, and in addition his physical condition had become generally debilitated.

About a month ago Mr. Stone decided to go to the Chicago sanatorium for the rest cure, Mrs. Stone having previously been treated successfully there. At the time he left Mr. Stone thought he was feeling stronger than at any time since he was stricken.

Was Prominent in Politics. Mr. Stone, especially during the year just preceding and following his election to the legislature, was prominent in republican politics. His influence in the state and county political circles reached its maximum when he was elected representative from Marshall county to the general assembly in 1891 to succeed Charles Eckles. He was re-elected in 1893, and on Jan. 8, 1894, was elected speaker of the house. He retired from the assembly with the end of his second term, being succeeded by John B. Classen.

When the general assembly met in 1894 Mr. Stone, together with Gear,

Mrs. Mary Haynes, aged 72 years, of 712 East Boone street, died at St. Thomas hospital at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon of ailments due to old age, Mrs. Haynes was removed from her home, where she lived alone, to the hospital a week before her death, so that she might be properly cared for. She had been gradually failing in health for some time before being taken to St. Thomas.

Mrs. Haynes was the widow of William Haynes, who died several years ago in this city. She had lived here for about eighteen years. Mrs. Haynes is survived by one daughter, Mrs. James Cahill, of Minneapolis, and one sister and three brothers. The latter are Mrs. Nora Feld, of this city; Dennis Flaherty, who lives in Ireland; William Flaherty, of Denison, and Bernard Flaherty, of Marengo.

The funeral will be held from St. Mary's church at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Burial will be in Riverside.






