# SAVE NEXT YEAR'S SEED CORN NOW

Remember Last Years Seed Corn Crisis.

The date when all seed corn should be saved expires September 28, as designated by Governor Harding's seed corn proclamation. Farm bureau co-operators of each school district will conduct a survey covering every farm in Marshall county and each farmer will be listed as to whether he has or has not gathered his seed corn. This is a war measure. Help make your county 100 per cent. This plan is endorsed by the federal government, endorsed by all organizations interested in food production. A seed corn calendar has been sent to every farm home in the county. Hang it up.

A two year's supply of seed should be gathered and stored with care.

"Remember we must feed those who fight for us". We may not have help enough by next fall to select our seed corn as quickly as is usually done. Some fields of corn may be damaged later by freezing which will lessen the value of such corn for seed purposes.

Fields of corn adapted to local conditions should be selected for seed corn gathering. Arrangements may need to be made with a neighbor as many farmers had to plant just any kind of corn that would grow last spring.

Ears selected from strong, vigorous stalks where more than one stalk is in a hill is preferable to ears from a one stalk hill. Seed ears that hang down are preferable as they are better protected from the weather.

Special care is necessary in storing seed. Last year's experience of leaving corn in driveways of double corn cribs and barns caused a great loss by freezing.

The attic an unused room in the house or in a dry well ventilated building or dry cellar with a furnace are places best adapted to cure seed corn. Good ventilation should be provided to hasten the drying of the seed.

# A. L. STUNTZ DIES AT CEDAR FALLS

Death Comes to Former Resident of This Neighborhood Friday at Cedar Falls.

The death at Cedar Falls Friday night of Arba L. Stuntz, removed one of the old and well-known residents of this county. Mr. Stuntz lived for many years just across the Marshall-Story line in Story county, five miles southwest of State Center. Mr. Stuntz was 80 years of age.

Mr. Stuntz was a native of Crawford county, Pennsylvania, where he was born May 22, 1838. He spent his boyhood and young manhood in Pennsylvania, and at Albion, Pa., in November, 1862, was united in marriage with Miss Anliza Gray. In 1864 Mr. and Mrs. Stuntz came west, settling at Monroe, Wis., and lived there until they came to Story county in the fall of 1869. Mr. Stuntz represented his county in the Iowa legislature beginning in 1891, serving in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth general assemblies.

Following the death of Mrs. Stuntz, in 1896, Mr. Stuntz left his farm and since that time has been spending his time with his children. He was making his home with his only daughter, Mrs. Benjamin Boardman, at Cedar Falls, at the time of his death.

Surviving Mr. Stuntz, in addition to his daughter, are four sons, H. L. The ears should not be piled on the floor but placed on hangers or racks so no two ears touch. It is an obligation on the part of every farm operator to gather and store a two year's supply of seed while we can: as it is a war duty. Be prepared to report a 100 per cent seed corn supply when your school district co-operator calls on you for a report of your supply of seed on hand September 28.
