Pipe Organ for M. E. Church

The Chariton M. E. church is to have a magnificent \$3000 pipe organ—and that very soon it is hoped. The possession by the church of such a splendid instrument has been made possible by the promise of a gift \$1500 from Andrew Carnegie the steel king; an offer of \$500 from Will A. Eikenberry of Chariton, and an offer of a like sum from Mrs. Carl Sigler of Indianola. The balance of the amount needed—\$500 will be raised by the Ladies Aid Society of the church.

The offer of Mr. Carnegie was expressed in a letter to S. M. Greene a steward of the church, received last Friday, and was in response to a request for aid in purchasing an organ. Mr. Carnegie stated that he would be glad to provide the last half of the cost of an organ for the church, at a price of \$3000, when the first half had been collected.

When the news of Mr. Carnegies offer was learned, Mr. Eikenberry at once promised \$500 of the remaining \$1500 to be raised. A day or two later came the offer of \$500 from Mr. Eikenberry's sister, Mrs. Sigler. The church is certainly to be congratulated upon the good fortune which has come to it. All our people should join with the members of its congregation in rejoicing and in thanking the generous donors.

"Quim" Baker Dead

Milton P. Baker, formerly of Chariton, where he was familiarly known as "Quim," died in Fullerton, Calif., January 12, aged 51 years. The funeral was held in Santa Ana the following Sunday from the home of his brother, E. S. Baker, of Chariton, who is spending the winter there.

Mr. Baker was well known in Chariton and Lucas county. He was a son of Walter W. Baker, deceased, of Lincoln township, and was born in that township. He was a sufferer from consumption and some years ago he went to California to benefit his health. For the past ten years he resided in Santa Ana. He is survived by his mother, his son Harry, of Los Angeles; two brothers, E. S. Baker of Chariton and C. W. Baker of Joliet, Montana; three sisters, Mrs. M. V. B. Lovering, Mrs. Eliza Rankin of Fullerton, Calif., and Mrs. Clara Simpson of Montana. His mother, Mrs. W. W. Baker, resides in Santa Ana, and although she is eighty years old, is enjoying good health. His brother, Dan M. Baker, deceased, was, for several years, the publisher of the Chariton Leader. He afterward founded the Santa Ana Bulletin.

he prevented the capture of his regiment. On January 1, 1864 his first enlistment having expired, he re-enlisted and remained in the service until the close of the war, being mustered out at Davenport, Iowa, June 15, 1865, having served 3 years, 9 months, and 1 day.

He served mostly under Grant and Sherman, and was engaged in the battles of Shiloh, Iuka, Corinth, Vicksburg, Kennesaw, Lookout Mountain, Atlanta, and a few others. At the battle of Shiloh he was wounded in the hand and foot, and at the siege of Atlanta, he received injuries from which he never recovered. It was near Atlanta that he was taken prisoner, and was confined in Andersonville prison for two months, then two weeks in Charleston prison, and for four and a half months in the prison at Florence, from which he escaped February 21, 1865.

At the close of the war, he returned to his father's home. On May 14, 1865, he was married to Ann Eliza Neel, at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa. To this union were born six children—three sons and three daughters. One son died at the age of four years. The others, with their mother, one brother, and one sister, beside many friends, mourn his loss. In April 1871, he located in Washington township, Lucas county, Iowa, where he resided until failing health caused him to remove to Russell, Iowa, in October 1902.

He served as a representative of Lucas county in the 24th and 25th general assemblies of Iowa. In November 1878, under the labors of Rev. William King, he was converted to God, and united with the Trinity Evangelical church of Washington township, Lucas county, of which he remained a faithful member until death. In 1893 he was licensed to preach the gospel, by the Des Moines conference of the United Evangelical church, and in 1889 was ordained a deacon by the same body. He served in the active ministry on charges in the Des Moines district, of the above conference for four years, rendering very efficient service.

A manly man, a brave soldier, an honored legislator, a good citizen, an affectionate husband, a faithful father, and a devoted servant of God has gone. Let us cherish his memory, emulate his example, and be ready, as he was, for roll call.

Traveling Men Aid A Brother

W. J. Donnenworth of this city was remembered in the right way by his brothers of the T. S. T. A. in their annual convention at Des Moines last Saturday. The association voted him

the hotels that the move is one which it is hoped will lead to the assurance of Democratic support for the state-wide primary measure already before the law-making body. It is well known about the legislature that the Democratic members, if not as a whole, at least in a majority of cases, are opposed to any bill making the primary system a state measure. It is also well known that the same members have for a long time urged with more or less earnestness the passage of a law removing the circle from the head of the official ballot. Now the claim is made that for Democratic votes on the primary bill the Republicans who are interested in its adoption will assure support on the matter of ballot reform.

Objections to Circle.

The claims made against the placing of the circle at the head of the official ballot have been that it prevented the voter in many instances from exercising his intention of voting a split ticket, because of the fear that in splitting his vote he would invalidate his ballot entirely. Those who have favored the retention of the circle on the ballot heretofore have argued that it was only a means for simplifying the method of voting, and that where a voter desired to cast his ballot for either of the parties he could do so by making only one mark, a cross in the circle at the head of the ticket which he favored, instead of going to the trouble of marking the cross in the square opposite the name of each of the candidates on that ticket. The original ballot law, and one which was in force for four years after the adoption of the Australian voting system in Iowa, made the method of voting much easier than it is at present. Under the law then, if a voter desired to cast his ballot for the Republican ticket, for instance, with the exception of a few candidates for offices on one or more of the other tickets on the ballot, he could place a cross in the circle at the head of the Republican column, and then by marking in the squares in front of names on other tickets could also vote for those candidates. The effect was that the vote was counted for all candidates on the Republican ticket except those whose opponents on some other ticket had crosses marked in the squares preceding their names. After a short trial, as stated, this feature of the ballot was changed and the law at present is such that a voter who desires to split his ticket must ignore the circle entirely and only vote for such candidates as he favors

a miller, and that has been his occupation ever since. He came to Russell in 1869, and went to work in the mill of which he is now the manager. In 1871, he returned to his native place, resided there two years and came again to Iowa. He located for a short time in Melrose, and soon after came again to Russell. He is doing an excellent business and making a very superior quality of flour. There is a steam corn-sheller in connection with the mill, where all corn to be shipped from this point is shelled. Was married May 15, 1876, to Miss Hannah Comstock. They have three children: Bessie May, Charles Ray, and Rose A. Mr. and Mrs. M. are members of the M. E. Church. He is a member of the I. O. F., in which order he has passed the chair.

McNEELEY, GEORGE, farmer and stock raiser, section 21; born October 16, 1840, in Highland county, Ohio, where he resided with his parents until 1848, and then started for Iowa, but was overtaken by winter in Livingston county, Illinois. In the spring of 1849, he came to Iowa, located in Henry county, where his father purchased a farm, on which George labored until August, 1861. He then enlisted in the Iowa state militia, and was assigned to duty in northern Missouri, under Colonel Moore. Enlisted September 14, 1861, in company G., Eleventh Iowa Infantry volunteers, and participated in some of the hardest fought battles of the war, among others, those of Shiloh, the siege and capture of Corinth, Vicksburg, the siege and capture of Vicksburg. He was also with General Sherman on his Meriden march, and on his return veteranized, and in the spring of 1864, joined the army of General Sherman on his Georgia campaign at Big Santee, Georgia, and participated in all the battles of the Georgia campaign. At the battle of Kenesaw Mountain he was taken prisoner and transported to Andersonville, where he was confined two months. While *en route* from Andersonville to Florence he jumped from the moving train, and was a free man for nine days. He was then recaptured and taken to Charleston, and later to Florence, where he was imprisoned nearly five months. He made his escape February 21, 1865, and reached Union lines at Wilmington, North Carolina. Was discharged at St. Louis, June 15, 1865. He came to Lucas county in March, 1871, and has since been engaged in farming. Owns a fine farm of 120 acres, well improved. Was married May 17, 1865, to Miss Ann E. Neel, of Henry county. They are the parents of six children, five of whom are now living: Martha E., Emily O., George H., Mertie and Ellis B. Mr. McNeeley is at present one of the township trustees.

McKINLEY, T. D., farmer and stock-raiser, section seventeen, post-office Russell. Born March 28, 1836, in Indiana, where he remained about twelve years of age. He came with his parents to this county in 1849, and remained on his father's farm until he was twenty-one years old. In 1860 he went to the Rocky mountains, where he worked in the mines,

was obliged to live on a pint of corn meal per day. He has now in his possession a half-gallon tin measure which he used during his army service, and also a knife which was used by Professor Hammel, of Burlington, and himself to cut large clubs in order to protect themselves against the bloodhounds while making their escape from Southern prisons.

Mr. McNeeley was always a faithful and valiant soldier, true to his duty and to the old flag which now floats so proudly over the united nation. The family has furnished several representatives to the armies of the country. The great-grandfather of our subject, who also bore the name of George, was the founder of the family in America. He located in Pennsylvania, and when the Colonies attempted to secure their independence he served for five years in the Colonial army. The grandfather, also named George, was a soldier of the war of 1812, and in 1816 removed from Kentucky to Ohio, building a log house in the midst of the wilderness on the banks of White Oak creek, where he spent his remaining days.

The father of our subject was born in Kentucky, November 28, 1812, and died in Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, June 7, 1889. He wedded Drusilla Springer, who during her girlhood was a schoolmate of General Grant. She was born in Maryland, descending from one of three brothers who came to this country in 1580, while the ancestry of the family in Sweden can be traced back to the eleventh century. Mrs. McNeeley's father was also a soldier of the war of 1812, serving as Major in an Ohio regiment. To Jeremiah and Drusilla McNeeley were born three sons and two daughters, viz.: Nancy, who died of consumption in 1888; Uriah, who was a soldier of Company I, Fourteenth Iowa Infantry, and was captured at the battle of Shiloh. He died in a prison at Macon, Ga., August 14, 1862, and was buried in the national cemetery at that place. Our subject is the next of the family. Elizabeth makes her home with her brother Flavius, who is engaged in agricultural pursuits in Mt. Pleasant, Iowa.

On the 14th of May, 1865, the gentleman

whose name heads this record wedded Miss Ann E. Neel, who was born in Wayne county, Indiana, August 23, 1840, and is a daughter of Jesse and Rebecca Neel. She accompanied her parents to this State in 1845, and by her marriage has become the mother of six children: Martha E., wife of J. L. Evans, a farmer of Adair county, Iowa; Emily O., wife of Sherman La Follett, a farmer of Adair county; Charles F., who was born June 20, 1870, and died September 4, 1874; George H., Myrtle and Ellis B., at home.

On the 6th of April, 1871, Mr. McNeeley removed to Lucas county, locating on section 21, Washington township, where he owns a fertile and valuable farm of 315 acres. In 1889 he erected thereon a substantial residence, and the other buildings are in keeping with the pleasant home. He and his family are members of the Evangelical Church, and he takes an active part in Sunday-school work and in promoting the cause of education. In politics he has been a stalwart Republican since casting his first presidential vote for Abraham Lincoln, the ballot being a grain of corn, for thus the soldiers in Florence prison were allowed to show their preference for the presidency. His private life and his official career are alike honorable. He has served both as Township Trustee and Assessor, and in 1891 was elected to the State Legislature, serving for two terms in a most acceptable and creditable manner.

JAMES FRANKLIN WOODY, Clerk of the District Court, is one of the leading and representative citizens of Guthrie county, Iowa, where his birth occurred on the 2d of August, 1859. His parents were John W. and Clarissa C. (Henderson) Woody. The father was born in Indiana in 1828, and enlisted in the Second Indiana Infantry for the Mexican war, serving for one year under the command of General Taylor. After receiving his discharge he came to Iowa, in 1848, and on the 28th day of Au-
