

SAMUEL H. MOORE DEAD

Prominent Banker and Farmer
Dropped Dead Yesterday of Heart
Failure, Aged 67 Years.

Samuel H. Moore, aged sixty-seven years, retired farmer and director and vice president of the Humeston State bank, died at Alva Humeston & Sons grain office at 10:45 yesterday morning. Death resulted from heart failure.

Mr. Moore had just assisted in unloading two loads of timothy seed and was in the grain office talking to Mr. Humeston when he fell to the floor, dying almost instantly. He was near the door and

Funeral Services of Prominent Citizen Who Died of Heart Failure Held Friday.

The funeral services of Samuel H. 






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
