N. M. PUSEY IS REPORTED DYING

RELATIVES OF AGED RESIDENT
CALLED TO BEDSIDE MON-
DAY AFTERNOON.

BEEN SICK FOUR DAYS

Ill for Some Time But Because
Worse During Last Week—Re-
lapse Monday—Come to
Bluffs in 1877.

Nathan M. Pusey, 81, retired law-
yer and father-in-law of Attorney
Emmet Tinley, was reported dying
at the family residence at 553 Willow
avenue, Monday afternoon.

During the past four days the well
known citizen has been gradually
weaker from an aged heart and com-
plications. Late in the afternoon he
suffered a relapse and relatives were
hurriedly called to his bedside.

Pusey practiced law in this city for



twenty-five years, retiring nearly
twenty years ago.

The retired lawyer was born in
Washington county, Pennsylvania,
June 21, 1841, and moved to Balti-
more, Md., with his parents in 1849.

Before coming to Council Bluffs Mr.
Pusey practiced law in Baltimore
from 1864 until he moved here. In
May, 1865, he married Miss Gertrude
A. Morgan, the daughter of N. J. B.
Morgan, a celebrated Methodist
divine. He was admitted to the bar in
1864.



the senate and the public as only a few are able to do. Senator Pusey was born in Washington County, Pennsylvania, June 21, 1841. His father was a native of Virginia and his mother of Maryland. They were both members of the Society of Friends, in which religious belief their son was reared, and to the tenets of which he still adheres. He removed with his parents to Baltimore in 1849 and there received his education in the best private school in that city. After reading law unremittingly for three successive years, he was admitted to the Baltimore bar in March, 1863, and at once entered upon



the practice of his profession there. In 1877 he removed to Council Bluffs, Iowa, where he has since resided, having now been in the continuous practice of law for more than thirty-five years, and established himself securely as one of the most distinguished lawyers in the western part of the state.

He has always been a republican and never failed to do his full share of party work. In 1895 he was nominated for state senator from Pottawattamie county, and though the county had for many years been electing democrats to the legislature, Mr. Pusey was strong enough to carry the county by over 1,000 majority. His services to the state as

a member of the senate are of the highest importance, as was universally commented upon at the time, especially during the extra session of 1897, when the new code was made. He was a member of the ways and means, code revision, insurance and cities and towns committees, all of which had very important duties. He was one of the three floor managers of the revenue bill, prepared by the ways and means committee, and during the ten days which the bill occupied in the senate, he was a leader in the discussion of all of its features. The same was true of the insurance law, which he guided through the senate, and with the laws on cities and towns, where he secured some very important changes in regard to street improvements, street improvement bonds and taxation. The senate was ready to take the word of the senator from Pottawattamie and to accept his judgment, for it had learned that both were good, and that his statements were always based upon thorough investigation and intelligent study. In the Twenty-seventh General Assembly, in 1898, Senator Pusey was chairman of the committee on cities and towns and was again intrusted with some of the most important work of the session. He was also a member of the judiciary committee and several other important committees. He looked after the interests of the Trans-Mississippi exposition in Omaha and secured a liberal appropriation for an Iowa exhibit.

Mr. Pusey was married May 2, 1865, to Gertrude A. Morgan. Three children were born to them as follows: John M., Elsie and Gertrude M.

Mrs. Pusey died May 22, 1891. Mr. Pusey was married again September 14, 1892, to Anna J. Wright. They have one child, Dorothy, born September 28, 1896.

REINIGER, ROBERT G., of Charles City, a prominent lawyer, jurist and legislator, was born in Seneca county, Ohio, April 12, 1835. He is a son of Gustavus and Rosa Dur Reiniger, natives of Wurtemberg, Germany, who emigrated to this country after they were married in 1832, settling in the above named county upon a farm. Here

Senator Newberry spoke as follows:

Somehow this is rather a sad occasion to me, having to recall at this time the death of three different senators who served with me during the 30th, 31st, and 32nd General Assemblies, namely: Senators Stirton, of Jones, Senator Elerick, of Van Buren, and Senator Young, of Washington.

Senator Stirton was elected to the 30th General Assembly as a democrat from a usually republican district. He was a man of broad vision, progressive ideas, and he had the courage of his convictions.

While there were quite a good many more democrats in the Senate in those days than there are now, I will not say that the quality was any better then than now, for the quality of the minority of the present General Assembly is good, but I would say that Senator Stirton was the peer of any Senator in the General Assembly at the time of his membership. He supported the enactment of the primary election law, a republican measure over which there was a great contest. He did that because he thought it was right.

Senator Stirton during those sessions was here with his family, which was composed of his wife and two young daughters, who attended the public schools during those two sessions. These daughters are now married. His wife, a splendid woman, for many years has been a helpless invalid. She is now being cared for by one of her daughters. Senator Stirton thought a great deal of his home. He was a splendid husband and father. He was a most excellent business man. From early manhood he was engaged in the banking business and was connected with that business up to the time of his death. He was not a showy man, but he was a resolute business man, one of those men who make their mark in the community in which they reside, and he was respected by every one in his own community and everyone who knew him in the state. He was a most excellent friend, neighbor and citizen.

NATHAN MARSH PUSEY

MR. PRESIDENT—Your committee named to prepare a memorial to commemorate the life and service of Nathan Marsh Pusey, submit the following report:

Nathan Marsh Pusey was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania, on the 21st day of June, 1841. In 1849 the family moved to Baltimore where Mr. Pusey was educated. Mr. Pusey was educated in a private school conducted by Mr. Ashbury Morgan and then took up the study

of law in the office of Judge Stockbridge, the father of Judge Henry Stockbridge, Justice of the Court of Appeals of Maryland. He was admitted to the Bar of Maryland in 1864 and in 1865 married Miss Gertrude Morgan. He continued to practice law in the city of Baltimore until his removal to Council Bluffs in 1878. In 1882 he formed a partnership with Col. W. F. Sapp and the firm of Sapp & Pusey were actively engaged in the practice of law in Council Bluffs until the death of Colonel Sapp in 1892. Mr. Pusey served as a Senator from Pottawattamie County, Iowa in the regular session of the 26th General Assembly and in the extra session of the 26th General Assembly and in the 27th General Assembly. The Code of 1897 was adopted at the extra session of the 27th General Assembly. His work in the preparation of the Code is regarded as extremely noteworthy. He was an excellent lawyer of broad experience and unlimited industry. He was a brother of W. H. M. Pusey, one of the pioneer law makers of the state and a member of the Senate for the Seventh and Eighth General Assemblies and a representative in the Forty-eighth Congress. Mr. Pusey died in Council Bluffs, October 9, 1922.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That in the death of Mr. Pusey the Senate recognizes the loss of a valuable citizen who desired and labored to improve and upbuild his community and state, and takes this occasion to express its appreciation of his character and public service, and to extend its sympathy to his family in their bereavement; and

Be It Further Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the journal and a copy of them transmitted by the secretary to the family of the deceased.

RICHARD PRICE

MR. PRESIDENT—Your committee which was appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life, character and services of Richard Price of Madison county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

Richard Price was born in Freeport, Ohio, February 28, 1848. His father was a farmer, and the son attended school in what time he was not occupied in the duties on the farm. Being an apt pupil in school he made rapid advancement, especially in the English branches.

About 1861 his parents removed to Iowa, and settled in the south part of Union township, Dallas county. He remained at home with his father, working summers and attending school winters until seventeen years of age.

In the spring of 1869 he entered the employ of Getchell & Sons, lumber dealers in Dexter, Iowa, remaining in that city about two years. He then was placed in charge of the firm's business in Earlham. Four

years later this firm placed him in charge of another branch of their

Geneva, New York, Agricultural Experiment Station. He came to Ames in 1905 as horticulturist of the Iowa Agricultural Experiment Station, and professor of horticulture, and a little later was made vice-dean of agriculture. At the time of his death he was president of the Iowa State Horticultural Society. He was the author of many publications, the most important being "Apples of New York." He was an excellent teacher, a fine experimenter, and left his impress for good on the student body and on the horticulturists of Iowa.—L. H. Pammel.

JOSEPH COOPER LOCKLIN was born at Brandon, Wisconsin, November 3, 1853, and died at Aurelia, Cherokee County, Iowa, October 16, 1922. He was educated in common school, assumed the vocation of teacher, removed to Cherokee County, Iowa, in 1876, and in 1878 began farming. He followed this until 1895 when he removed to Aurelia and engaged in the grain business in which he remained ten years. In 1905 he entered the real estate, loan, and insurance business. For forty years he was secretary of the Maple Valley Mutual Insurance Association. In 1900 he was a lay delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was a trustee of Morningside College for several years and was secretary and treasurer of the endowment fund. In 1887 he was elected representative and served in the Twenty-second General Assembly. He was again elected in 1918 and re-elected in 1920, serving in the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth general assemblies. He was mayor of Aurelia four years and a member of the school board twenty-five years.

NATHAN MARSH PUSEY was born in Washington County, Pennsylvania, June 21, 1841, and died at Council Bluffs, Iowa, October 9, 1922. In 1849 the family removed to Baltimore, Maryland, where he was educated in a private school. He studied law under Cochran & Stockbridge of Baltimore, was admitted to the bar in Maryland in 1864, and practiced in Baltimore until 1877. He then removed to Council Bluffs and entered the practice there. In 1882 he formed a partnership with Colonel W. F. Sapp, as Sapp & Pusey, which continued until Colonel Sapp's death in 1892, after which he practiced alone. For a period of some twenty years he was considered one of the ablest lawyers of western Iowa. In 1895 he was elected senator and served in the Twenty-sixth, Twenty-sixth Extra, and Twenty-seventh general assemblies.

MAURICE D. O'CONNELL was born at Constable, Franklin County, New York, April 23, 1839, and died at Washington, D. C., August 26, 1922. Burial was at Fort Dodge, Iowa. He was educated at Franklin Academy, Malone, New York, and at Columbian (now George Washington) University, Washington, D. C., being graduated from the latter in 1866. For some years in his early life he had a position under the United States comptroller of the Treasury at Washington, and became chief of

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
