

DEATH CLAIMS
C. C. UPTON SR.

Prominent Hillyard Attorney
Succumbs to Stomach
Ailment.

Death, due to ulcers of the stomach, claimed C. C. Upton Sr., prominent Hillyard attorney, yesterday morning at Sacred Heart hospital following a protracted illness. He was given a blood transfusion Monday morning with his son, Leland B. of Seattle, the donor, and operated upon Tuesday, but life ebbed at 10 a. m. yesterday.

It was Mr. Upton's third attack of the stomach ailment. Four years ago he was stricken and recovered, again stricken two years ago to recover, with the attack that caused his death starting last September.

He had been in the hospital for some time and taken home only to be returned Monday in the desperate effort to save him. He had undergone two previous transfusions with another son, Clark C. Upton Jr. of the Federal Land bank, the donor in both, the family being one of few in which blood came in the same classification.

Mr. Upton was born in Cresco, Iowa, July 19, 1859. His father was one of the first settlers in northeastern Iowa and its first judge.

Mr. Upton graduated from the University of Iowa in 1889 and was admitted to the bar the same year, and served as city, county and district attorney in Cresco, and as a member of the state senate during his residence there. He was married to Miss Eva Leland in Cresco in 1893 and they made their home there until 1907, when they moved to Spokane. Here Mr. Upton formed a partnership with the late Judge Hurn and they had their offices in the Hyde building until 1912, when he was appointed city attorney of Hillyard. He then moved to Hillyard, filling this position until Hillyard was annexed to Spokane. He continued to practice in Hillyard and at the time of his death was associated with George Elmer Brown in the law firm of Upton & Brown.

He was an active worker in the Westminster Congregational church and a member of the Masonic lodge and the Lions club. In addition to

Professor Boyd was married August 20, 1860, to Ida Patterson, daughter of James Patterson and Martha Henry Patterson, of Amesville, Ohio. Two children were born to them: Luella, born October 25, 1863, and Robert Allyn, born July 17, 1866. Mrs Boyd died October 21, 1867. Professor Boyd was married the second time, August 20, 1874, to Mary Ellen Moody, daughter of Gen. Granville Moody and Lucretia Elizabeth Harris Moody, of Ohio. To them were born four children: Granville Moody, born June 12, 1877, died November 3, 1879; Clifford Moody, born October 21, 1879; Lucy Moody, born September 12, 1881; and Elizabeth Moody, born April 17, 1887, and who died April 20, 1887.

UPTON, HON. C. C., one of Howard county's brightest young men and recently representing the Forty-second district in the upper branch of the general assembly, was born on his father's farm near Cresco, Iowa, July 19, 1859, and therefore has the distinction of being senator from the county wherein he first saw the light. His father, James G. Upton, was engaged during most of his active life as a farmer, but for the last ten years has lived a retired life. He was the first county judge of Howard county, Iowa, having assisted in its organization, and was a prominent figure in all public affairs of those pioneer days. His ancestors came to this country in an early day, the founder of the American family of Uptons having been engaged by Governor Winthrop in 1636. Many of the name are in the New England states, particularly in the vicinity of Boston. A brother and sister are living at Barre, Vt., and one brother resides in Illinois. The last named is Judge C. W. Upton, an able jurist, who has been on the bench of the court of Illinois for twenty-five years and resides at Waukegan. The mother's maiden name was Sarah A. Miles. On her mother's side she was descended from the Prescott family, of which the famous historian was a member.

The literary education of Senator Upton was received in the public schools and by home study; his legal learning at the State University of Iowa, from the legal department of which he graduated in 1889. He worked on the farm until 16 years of age,

then taught school in winter and farmed in summer until 1882. At that time he went to Dakota and pre-empted a homestead, but not liking the country, returned to Cresco, where he farmed for three years and then entered the law office of Barker Bros., as a student. After having been admitted to the bar, in 1889, he went to Pierre, S. D., and remained until May, 1890, at which time W. K. Barker, with whom he had studied, offered him a partnership in his law business at Cresco, which was accepted and continued until February, 1896, when Mr. Barker retired from the firm because of ill health. In 1891 he was elected city



attorney by the voters of Cresco, and the following year he received a similar compliment. In 1892 he was elected county attorney for Howard county, and served so satisfactorily that he was sent to the state senate in 1893. The secret of his success lies in his constant desire to do his duty at all times in a careful and upright manner. He is plain, honest and outspoken on public questions, always uses his best judgment and stands by his convictions in all matters, public or private. He was regarded as the strongest of the younger members of the senate, and, though possessing a due amount of modesty, was evidently there for business and to protect the interests of the section he represented. He had

a place on many important committees, of some of which he was chairman. He was married September 14, 1893, to Miss Eva S. Leland, of Cedar Falls, Iowa. They have two children, Gertrude L. and Clark C. Upton.

SISSON, EUGENE ROBERT, one of the most successful real estate dealers and financiers in northwestern Iowa, lives in Storm Lake, where he located for the practice of law in 1886, having purchased the practice of the firm of Robinson & Milchrist, the former being elected to the



supreme court at that time. He is the son of Daniel W. Sisson, former school-teacher in Rising Sun, Ind., who later became a merchant and engaged in the milling business at Mason, Effingham county, Ill. He was married to Margaret B. Gibson, whose parents died when she was quite young and left her with the care of bringing up three younger brothers. She brought up nine children of her own to maturity, each one making a living, as he was taught, by the hand of honest toil. She was and is one of the most devoted and conscientious of Christian mothers. The Sisson family came from Otsego county, N. Y., and settled in Ohio and Indiana and later in Effingham county, Ill. Five brothers of

Daniel Sisson were in the union army while he cared for their families, and from his mill furnished bread for all the needy who applied. E. R. Sisson was born near Rising Sun, Ind. He attended the public schools and the State Normal school at Normal, Ill., where he fitted himself to become a teacher. He had a natural talent for music and taught band music in St. Elmo and Shawneetown for a time. He studied law two years, in the office of Hon. Carl Roedel in Shawneetown, Ill., and was admitted to the bar in Illinois in November, 1883. For three years he was in partnership with his preceptor, and at the end of that time sought a larger field farther west, locating, as stated, in Storm Lake. He formed a partnership with A. D. Bailie, who was county attorney, and formerly had been his chum and classmate in college. A three years' residence in Storm Lake opened his eyes to the splendid business opportunities offered by the rapidly developing country, and he organized the Northwestern Land company, of which he is manager. He then began a series of important public enterprises, putting on foot the plan for constructing the auditorium and raising funds for the building of a summer hotel and a college. He sold town lots under an arrangement that half the proceeds were to be used for the erection of the hotel and college buildings. In this and in other ways Mr. Sisson has been of great value to the city of Storm Lake. Mr. Sisson has recently opened an additional office at Ft. Dodge, which he operates in connection with his brother-in-law, W. R. Higgins. Of late years he devotes his attention exclusively to locating settlers in northwestern Iowa, and especially in Buena Vista and adjoining counties. These settlers are all ready to give evidence of the realization of every promise made to them. In one season Mr. Sisson's agency sold over 21,000 acres in Buena Vista county alone. It will thus be seen that he has been a very important factor in the settling and development of northwestern Iowa. By the exercise of strict integrity on his part Mr. Sisson's customers have been induced to advertise his business among their friends, and this has been the main element in his success. While living in Shawneetown, Ill., Mr. Sisson was married to Miss May C. Carroll, the eldest daughter of Charles Carroll, of that place, who was one of the wealthy and honored citizens of southern Illinois. He was the democratic nominee for state
