DIES AS RESULT OF A CARBUNCLE

Hon. John E. Dempster Had Suffered Year; Was Once in Legislature.

Hon. John E. Dempster of Grinnell, formerly of Davenport, died at the home of Mrs. Thomas Osler, 2004 Ripley street, Sunday morning, death being due to a carbuncle. Mr. Dempster had suffered with a carbuncle at the base of his brain a year or more and blood poisoning developed over a week ago.

He came to Davenport about that time and has been confined to his bed practically ever since.

Mr. Dempster was a member of the lower house of the Iowa legislature in 1898, having been sent there from this district. He moved with his family to Grinnell about 12 years ago, where he had resided practically ever since. Deceased was born in Morgan county, Ohio, Jan. 3, 1837, and came to Iowa in 1859, settling in Davenport. In 1868 he was married to Miss Effie Burch. Three children were born to this union. They are Mrs. Emma G. Fisher of Grinnell; Mrs. Mary J. Sherman of Pelican Rapids, Minn., and John J. Dempster of Grinnell.

A number of years later Mrs. Dempster died and in 1877 he was married to Miss Josephine Fitzsimmons, and three children were born, Edna A. Dempster, Alden H. and Roscoe Dempster, all of Grinnell. Mrs. Josephine Dempster also died a number of years ago.

In addition to being one of the prominent members of the legislature Mr. Dempster was also an active member in the Methodist church.

A short funeral service was held at the home of Mrs. Osler shortly after noon today and the body was later taken to Grinnell for burial.
