with prisoners. He spoke of his  
experiences and deplored the

day. He pleaded for a united  
Christian action to cleanse our  
community of those forces that  
are responsible for sending our  
people to our reformatories. He  
pleaded for action on the part of  
Christians to place into office  
men of character who may right  
ly receive the loyal support of  
young.

Rev. Olson has spoken to some  
1,000 high school students and  
his message depicting the crime  
situation in our nation have  
been appreciated by all.

Special music was rendered by

trio from their group. Two  
other pastors were present,  
Rev. L. E. Tallakson of Sioux  
Falls, Iowa and Rev. E. Boe of

church of Onawa with the pas-  
tor, Rev. O. B. Anderson in

Mr. Hathaway was recognized  
as being the oldest settler in this  
community at the time of his  
death. He was an extensive land  
and stock owner and through  
his efforts the Monona County  
Mutual Fire Insurance company  
was organized.

Mr. Hathaway was born in  
Council Bluffs, Iowa April 17,  
1855 and moved to Monona Coun-  
ty with his parents in February  
of the following year.

He was united in marriage to  
Clara B. Normand June 18, 1879  
at Sheboygan, Wis. To this union  
seven children were born; one  
died in infancy and one daugh-  
ter Mrs. Genevieve Winegar,  
died six years ago.

Surviving are his widow, Clara  
two sons Will and D. D. of Turin  
and three children, Mrs. Arth-  
ur Whitehorn of Great Falls,  
Montana, Mrs. J. E. McNamara  
of Castana, and Mrs. J. D. Stone  
of Sioux City. Besides one sister  
and a number of grand child-  
ren.

Funeral services were held at  
the Methodist church here in  
Onawa on Tuesday afternoon at  
2:00 o'clock with the pastor Rev.  
Watson officiating and burial  
took place in the Onawa ceme-  
tery.
