DR. G. W. HINKLE, PIONEER DOCTOR LAID TO REST

Old Soldier of Harvard Dies
Suddenly.—Was Laid to
Rest at Fairfield.

Dr. George W. Hinkle, a pioneer resident of Harvard and well known over the county, passed away suddenly while sitting on the porch at his home Saturday morning. Although in failing health for several years his death came as a great shock to relatives and friends.

The funeral services were held at the home Monday morning at 10 o'clock, when a large group of friends gathered to pay their last respects to a cherished friend. Dr. B. S. Walker read a splendid tribute to his late friend, Hon. H. K. Evans read the poem, "The Country Doctor", Hon. W. P. Allred, commander of the Robert Jackson Post of the G. A. R. read the burial service of the post, Rev. Wm. Sessions, pastor of the Corydon Christian church read a scripture lesson and offered prayer and the Corydon Tent of the Daughters of Veterans performed their burial rites.

The remains were taken to Fairfield for burial and were accompanied by a number of friends, who joined with Fairfield friends in an impressive service at the graveside. The following obituary was read and also the tribute by Dr. B. S. Walker.

 Warsaw, then located in Harvard.
 He there continued his active prac-
 tice as long as he was able to travel
 the country roads. After that he
 was always ready to care for those
 who came to him.

He enlisted in Company I, Forty-
 fifth Iowa infantry, when he was but
 15 years old and served six months,
 being one of the youngest soldiers in
 the army at that time. He was com-
 mander of the G. A. R. post at Har-
 vard until it became so small that
 they united with G. A. R. Post at
 Corydon.

He was married to Melvina E.
 Axline September 30, 1879. To this
 union was born Eulalie, who died in
 infancy and twin daughters Bessie
 and Jessie. His wife died in May
 1909 and Bessie in April 1916. He
 had only one brother and one sister,
 both of whom have preceded him in
 death.

He served as representative from
 Wayne county during the 27th and
 28th General Assembly and was
 largely instrumental in getting the
 state to make the appropriation for
 the Historical building.

His daughter Jessie has been his
 constant companion during his last
 years doing all that loving hands
 could do to make him happy and
 comfortable.

He was a great reader and took a
 great interest in everything that
 would make his community and
 country a better place in which to
 live.

His going was very sudden as he
 had appeared to be in better health
 than usual and he and his daughter
 were preparing to start Monday on a
 trip to Ohio when he was called the
 Saturday before.
