NEW CONTRACTS TO FOLLOW WORK ALREADY LET

Makes Reply To Reports Alleged Outside Labor To Be Brought In

Chief Engineer Fred R. White of the Iowa Highway Commission, in a definite and emphatic statement given to the Pioneer Record under the date of Monday, January 11 refutes the statements that have been circulated the past week in Ida Grove, to the effect that the Iowa highway commission might attempt to jam through during the season of 1937 most of the \$960,000 paving program authorized at the special election last June, without waiting to complete the three projects for paving already under contract.

FEAR LABOR IMPORTATION

The alleged effect of making more lettings on Nos. 35 and 59 before the previous contracts were completed, would be to force the importation of common labor from outside Ida county, in order to finish all work without delay. Such a move would be contrary to the pre-election promise that Ida county common labor should be used solely on the jobs.


In one section of Mr. White's letter, he says:

"It would be agreeable with us, if the citizens of Ida county so desire, to delay the actual letting of contract for paving road 59 between roads 20 and 35 until such time as the construction work on contracts already let in Ida county shall have been completed, or nearly so."

"If you will check the record, you will find that all the contracts that we have let thus far for paving work in Ida county have specifications requiring that all the unskilled labor and all the intermediate grade labor is required to

DROPPED DEAD SUNDAY IN HO

Came to Ida County in and Identified With A Its Interests

Ida County's friend, W. J. Scott, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Hugh Baker Geneva, N. Y., Sunday noon 10.

Never have more fond memories of a man so connected with life in Ida county been called to the minds of both old and young in Ida Grove because of the passing of Mr. Scott.

Sunday afternoon a telegram sent to Mr. and Mrs. Ben T. Ida Grove announced Mr. Scott's death.

Daily newspapers in Iowa today carried the news of the death of the former Ida Grove man.

Death Without Warning
A letter, Wednesday, from Baker states that Mr. Scott went to downtown Geneva and Thursday, a distance of two Saturday night he sat up late writing "The Last of the Mohi He arose late Sunday and Mr. and Mrs. Baker returned church they were called by Scott to a bedroom, when Scott had dropped dead. Scott said that he had noticed an attack of indigestion coming Sunday morning; this was the warning prior to the end.

A public figure in Ida county for many years, Mr. Scott had been well-known over Iowa. He and Mrs. Scott had lived in Geneva since 1926, when Mr. Scott had come to Ida Grove in 1878 and their residence here had been a continuous

In his young manhood, Mr. Scott was a skilled baseball player and older citizens cherish many stories of his exploits on the playing diamond.

Mr. Scott was a native of Chester, Pa., but the west called in his early manhood, and his identification for so many years with the growth and advancement of Ida Grove, made it doubly hard for him to leave when he and Mrs. Scott decided to remove to Geneva, New York.

Mrs. Todd Pays Tribute

Mrs. Ben Todd, a close friend of the Scotts, handed the following tribute to "Billy" Scott to the Pioneer Record:

"Mr. Scott undoubtedly had more friends in Ida county than any other man who ever lived here. He was continually doing some favor, some act of kindness for some one.

"He could give a child a nickel, pass out a cigar to a man, a pencil to a lady, etc., in a most unobtrusive manner and the merry twinkle which he had about his eyes made him seem quite akin to Santa Claus.

"He belonged to many fraternal organizations and paid dues for many friends who undoubtedly never repaid him.

"He was always a staunch republican and had many important offices. When he felt that his hearing was not what it should be, he felt it was time to step down and out which he did with much grace. His interest in politics continued as the years advanced and he was well informed on all political questions. He was keenly interested in the election of the past year. He prepared a ballot and filled it in with the candidate's names and mailed it air-mail to Ida Grove friends to be filled in and returned after the first returns were completed.





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"During his residence in Iowa he was considered a strong political influence, numbering among his friends such men as Cummins, Kenyon, Boies and many others.

"Not many men of half his age could write such beautiful letters. His choice of words as well as his lovely Spencerian style of handwriting made a letter his friends delighted to receive.

Many Received Favors

"Among the many remarks heard about town in regard to his passing, it seemed that each person remembered some favor he had done for them. One man with tears in his eyes said that he had helped him get his citizenship papers. Another, a high school girl, said that when a child she ran to meet him as he was coming to her home to dinner. On the way she fell, hurting her knee. As she got up, with his help, she found a nickel in her hand. An elderly lady said that in early days when there was a gift to be presented they always asked "Billy" Scott to write the card which went with it."

Last Letter Received

The last letter received from him in Ida Grove was written to Chas. Britch. His same exquisite handwriting showed no trace of feebleness or old age. With the letter to Mr. Britch received Monday of this week came a cook book for Grover Koons and the recipient of the letter.

It was not more than three months ago that the Ida Grove Odd Fellows sent Mr. Scott a walking stick, which he added among the treasures from his former home town.

To know Ida Grove was to know "Billy" Scott.

the Economy Printing Company of Iowa City and was associated with it until his retirement in 1928. He was active most of his life in fraternal orders—I. O. O. F., Knights of Pythias, and the Masonic order, having become a Mason in 1874. He was a member of the Methodist church. He was elected representative in 1891 and served one term, that of the Twenty-fourth General Assembly. For many years he had been interested in the history of printing and succeeded in collecting 1,800 volumes on that subject. The oldest one was printed in Mainz, Germany, in 1515. The great collection was given to the State University of Iowa less than a year before his death.

WILLIAM D. TISDALE was born in Bloomfield, Iowa, February 23, 1853, and died in Ottumwa, January 31, 1937. He was a son of Orrin D. and Harriet Newell (Baldwin) Tisdale. When he was twelve years old the family removed to Ottumwa. He was graduated from the Ottumwa High School, from the State University of Iowa in 1875, and remained at the university another year as an instructor. He followed that by being principal of the Ottumwa High School a year, then returned to the university and was graduated from the Law Department in 1878. He at once began the practice of law in Ottumwa. In 1882 and 1883 he was city solicitor for Ottumwa. In 1892 he was elected judge in the Second Judicial District and served in 1893 and 1894, but declined further service and returned to practice. He first practiced in partnership with Joseph G. Hutchinson, and later was successively associated with William McNett, George F. Heindel, and finally with the firm of Jaques, Tisdale & Jaques. He was president of the Wapello County Bar Association for several years, and was dean of the association at the time of his death.

ROBERT HUFSCHMIDT was born in Rouchrath, Germany, September 22, 1844, and died in Lansing, Iowa, May 29, 1936. Burial was in Oak Hill Cemetery, Lansing. He served in the German army in the war against Austria. At the age of nineteen, 1863, he migrated to America. He lived some years in Wisconsin, but removed to Lansing in 1879 where he remained the rest of his life. He was in the grain business, and later in the machinery business in Lansing many years. He was mayor of Lansing several terms and was postmaster there two terms. He was elected representative in 1901 and served in the Twenty-ninth General Assembly.

WILLIAM J. SCOTT was born in Chester, Pennsylvania, September 16, 1855, and died in Geneva, New York, January 10, 1937. His parents were John T. and Martha J. (Campbell) Scott. He attended Girard College, Philadelphia, from which he was graduated, and then served an apprenticeship in the drug business in Chester. He removed to Iowa in 1877, worked one year as a drug clerk in Glidden, and in 1878 located in Ida Grove in the drug business. In 1882 he was elected county re-

order and was six times re-elected, serving fourteen years. For several years of that time he also acted as city clerk. In 1899 he was elected representative and served in the Twenty-eighth General Assembly. During 1903 to 1906 he was a deputy state oil inspector. He then served eight years as postmaster at Ida Grove during the administrations of Theodore Roosevelt and William Howard Taft. In 1914 he was elected clerk of court for Ida County, and was five times re-elected, serving until 1926, when he resigned and removed to the home of his daughter, Mrs. Hugh Baker, in Geneva, New York.

MART. D. COONEY was born on a farm near Rickardsville, Dubuque County, Iowa, June 8, 1885, and died in Dubuque, Iowa, May 27, 1937. His parents were John and Elizabeth (Gandolfo) Cooney. His mother was a member of a prominent Italian family whose family seat, Gandolfo Castle, near Rome, is now the summer palace of Pope Pius XI. Mr. Cooney obtained his elementary education in the district schools of Dubuque County. He attended Columbia College, Dubuque; University of Iowa; and Georgetown University, Washington, D. C. He began the practice of law in Dubuque in 1912, forming a partnership with the late Allan J. Kane. This partnership continued until after Mr. Cooney was elected to the state senate in 1930. He served in the senate of the Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth general assemblies. He was always prominent in civic and fraternal affairs in Dubuque and was a member of Knights of Columbus, Elks, Modern Woodmen and the American Legion. He was also a member of the national, state and county bar associations, and was equally prominent in Democratic state and national organizations. He was serving his first term as state senator when he was appointed legal member of the Board of Parole which position he occupied at the time of his death.

THOMAS HICKENLOOPER was born near Foster, Monroe County, Iowa, July 23, 1876, and died in Albia March 24, 1937. His parents were Theophilus and Margaret Hickenlooper. He attended rural public school and Albia High School, and later, the Ottumwa Commercial College. He studied law in the office of L. T. Richmond at Albia, was admitted to the bar in 1899. In 1900 he was elected clerk of the District Court, was re-elected in 1902, 1904 and 1906, and served eight years. In 1908 he was elected representative, was re-elected in 1910 and served in the Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth general assemblies. During his practice as a lawyer he was associated for some time with J. C. Mabry, and later with John R. Price. He was mayor of Albia a short term, and was a member of the School Board. He was an active and devoted member of the Church of Christ. Politically he was a Republican.

W. J. SCOTT

William J. Scott, clerk of the district court of Ida County, has devoted much of his life to public service, and the reputation that results from the faithful performance of duty is his just reward. For forty-eight years he has been a resident of Ida Grove and his record is a matter of pride to its citizens. He was born September 16, 1855, in Chester, Pennsylvania, and his parents, John T. and Martha J. (Campbell) Scott, were both members of Scotch families. They were reared and married in the north of Ireland and in their youth came to the United States, settling in Pennsylvania.

When William J. Scott was a child of five his father died, and at the age of nine years he entered Girard College in Philadelphia. After his graduation from that noted institution he returned to Chester and served a four years' apprenticeship to the drug trade. On the expiration of that period he journeyed to the west and for a year was clerk in a drug store at Glidden, Iowa. He came to Ida Grove in the spring of 1878 and has since made his home in this community, which numbers him among its honored pioneers.

Mr. Scott is a staunch republican in his political views and in 1907 was appointed postmaster of Ida Grove, acting in that capacity until 1915. He was city recorder for more than eighteen years and county recorder for fourteen years. He was a member of the twenty-eighth assembly of Iowa and gave his earnest support to all measures which he believed would prove of benefit to the
