POLITICAL LEADER OF 90'S IN SAC CO. DIES

**CHAS. E. STALLCOP, STRICKEN
WITH APOPLEXY, DIES SUD-
DENLY IN DES MOINES.**

Was Superintendent of Schools and
State Representative—An Active
Speaker in Sound Money
Fight—Yeoman Leader.

Charles E. Stallcop is dead. This unexpected news comes from Des Moines where he has lived for more than a dozen years, giving his attention entirely to the promotion of that well known national fraternal insurance order, the Brotherhood of American Yeomen, of which he was grand master of ceremonies for fifteen years—the office corresponding to vice-president.

Only a week ago last Thursday Mr. Stallcop passed through Sac City en route from Storm Lake to Odebolt in pursuance of his work as a lecturer for the order and visited a few hours with one of his old-time friends. Apparently he was in the best of health, for he talked and looked as if he were, and he was especially reminiscent.

After his return from the Storm Lake trip to his home at 922 Clinton Ave., Des Moines, Mr. Stallcop remarked to his wife that he was tired and had a severe headache. On Wednesday morning of last week he awoke early saying that he could not sleep and might as well get up. He got his own breakfast that morning, shaved himself, attended the furnace and sat down in his large chair, where his wife found him half an hour later. She called the maid to assist her and summoned a doctor, though she knew her husband was past human aid. Apoplexy was the cause of death, which had occurred before Mrs. Stallcop arrived. The funeral was held at the Dunn Funeral Home in Des Moines last Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Burial was made in Glendale cemetery.

Mr. Stallcop is survived by his wife, formerly Miss L. Grace Robinson, the daughter of Sac county pioneers, to whom he was married at Early in 1888, and also by his daughter Edna, now Mrs. Robert F. McGuire of Denver, Colo.

Was a College Graduate
 Charles Edwin Stallcop was born in Minnesota Sept. 9, 1858. He attended the public schools of that state

and the firm of Lane & Stallcop represented the anti-saloon forces in the final triumph over the saloon advocates who sought to obtain a legal statement of consent for the establishment of saloons in the county.

Lane & Stallcop in May, 1902 purchased the Brooklyn Chronicle and Mr. Stallcop gave his attention more or less for a number of years to the newspaper, soon acquiring the interest of his partner who retired on account of ill health, but he finally disposed of it to his old-time friend and fellow teacher in Sac county, M. L. Gordon, who still owns it.

Interest in the Yeomen.
 Through his friend, W. A. Rutledge, a former Early man, Mr. Stallcop early became interested in the Brotherhood of American Yeomen and while at Sac City prepared the first ritual of the order, basing it, as the editor of the Sun remembers, on scenes from "Ivanhoe". Later Mr. Stallcop was elected one of the directors of the organization and at the time of his death was holding the office of master of ceremonies, as has been stated.

He was never essentially a money-maker. An idea always looked bigger to him than a dollar. For some reason he never brought himself to active affiliation with the churches but his life was as clean as that of a consistent Christian. Few men who have lived in Sac county have been more useful.

**DANIEL J. ORTON ALLEGES CAM-
MACKS MISREPRESENTED
VALUE FARM IN DEAL.**

Odebolt Paving Cases Coming for the

In the final days for filing a large number of new cases were presented. These and others that have been filed for hearing in the March term are included in the matters mentioned in the following items.

Wants Trade Annulled.
 Daniel J. Orton is plaintiff in a suit brought against Edna and Fred Cammack demanding annulment of the contract made with the defendants for an exchange of farms. In the course of this deal the plaintiff transferred to the defendant his title to 70.69 acres in the south part of Sac City, alleged to be worth \$42,414, and his contract for the J. R. Mendenhall residence property in Oak Park Addition to Sac City, alleged to be worth \$5,500, in exchange for a farm in Palo Alto county, the value of which the plaintiff alleges to have been misrepresented. The farm was taken in the trade at \$225 an acre. The plaintiff alleges it is not worth more than \$125 an acre and the defendants had no real equity in it. The plaintiff is represented in this action by Malcolm Currie and Jacobs & McCaulley.

Was a College Graduate.
Charles Edwin Stallcop was born
in Minnesota Sept. 9, 1858. He at-
tended the public schools of that state
and graduated from Carleton College
at Northfield, Minn., coming to Iowa
in 1881. In 1884 he graduated from
the law school of Drake University
and soon afterward came to Sac
county. His friend, E. L. Ahrens, re-
calls that not long after he came he
taught the school in District No. 1,
Wall Lake township, and attended
regularly the lyceum held in District
No. 2, near the Pleasant Hill church,
in which school M. L. Gordon, now
editor of the Brooklyn Chronicle, was
teacher. At that time, as in later
years, Mr. Stallcop was a strong de-
bater. A number of schools in Sac
county were so fortunate as to have
Mr. Stallcop's services as teacher.
One of them, C. E. Griffin recalls, was
the school at Lake View.

Political Activity Begins.
In 1889 Mr. Stallcop acquired the
Sac County News at Early and while
he was publisher of that newspaper
was elected chairman of the Republic-
can county central committee. He
was serving in that capacity in 1891
when the question came up whether
the Republicans should endeavor to
retrieve the office of county super-
intendent, which had been captured
by Edward Drewry, Democratic nomi-
nee, two years before when an in-
surgent Republican campaign had
been made against some of the
party's nominees. Republican lead-
ers at Sac City were reluctant to en-
ter upon a contest with Mr. Drewry,
who was then, as afterwards, unusu-
ally popular, both with his own party
and with Republicans at the county-
seat.

Mr. Stallcop told them there must
be a candidate and if no one else
would run he would do so. He had
to make good, and he ran. He was
elected by a majority of 12 and
served two terms very efficiently in
that office—from 1892 to 1896. While
he was county superintendent Mr.
Stallcop became noted as a practical
user of the bicycle, which he utilized
in visiting schools throughout the
county, and he was one of the best
riders, not for races but for practical
purposes, in all the country.

Supporter of Sound Money.
When the free silver issue came on
in 1895 and 1896 he was thoroughly
equipped to meet it and he made
more schoolhouse speeches in Sac
county in that memorable campaign
of 1896 than any other man—per-
haps than any other two men.
He was strong in debate and few
who heard will forget his joint de-
bate with Joseph H. Strain, the val-
iant free silver champion, which took
place at Early. In 1897, doubtless in
recognition of his splendid service in
the 1896 campaign, the Republicans
of Sac county nominated Mr. Stall-
cop for representative in the state
legislature. He was readily elected
and reelected for another term, and
made a faithful and efficient legisla-
tor.

As Law Practitioner.
The last few years he was in Sac
City, where he practiced law in
partnership with Charles E. Lane.

administering hypodermics Crain
stoutly protested his innocence, but
let slip the admission that he had
been gambling all night at the shanty
on the Coon. There was every reason
to believe from his attitude that he
had done something more than
gamble, but, since this could not be
proved conclusively, the mayor ar-
raigned him on the gambling charge
and assessed a fine of \$50 and costs,
which Crain paid. At first Crain de-
cided to go to jail and, before he re-
considered, a fire was built to make
Christmas behind the bars as com-
fortable as possible for him.

The Community Store, one of a se-
ries opened at county-seats in Iowa,

itors. A trustee has been appointed
for all of the 34 stores in the chain
and it is evident that the stores are
in financial straits.

MR. SPEAKER—Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and services of the Hon. R. F. Price, late of Dickinson county, Iowa, beg leave to report the following memorial:

Reuben F. Price was born in Delhi, Iowa, January 1, 1858, and lived practically all his life in his native state. In 1882 he settled on the prairies of Dickinson county, and for a period of eight years applied himself diligently and successfully to farming. March 16, 1886, he married Miss Jennie E. Jones, who survives.

In 1890 Mr. Price became a resident of Milford, where for the remainder of his life he was a substantial community factor. For twelve years he was postmaster, and for a long time he served on the town council. For years prior to his death he was engaged in the real estate business.

So well had he lived and served that when Mr. Price aspired to legislative honors, two terms came to him practically without opposition. He was a useful legislator. All the details of service had his earnest attention and few roll calls found him listed as absent. His judgment was safe, his courage unflinching, his devotion absolute. These elements, vital in legislative character, gave him the confidence of the House as he became rich in friendship through rare temperamental equipment.

In character, in personality, in all the better elements of citizenship, Reuben Price was so strong as to win the esteem of his community and all with whom he served during his life of marked probity and distinct usefulness.

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the House of Representatives take this occasion to present this tribute to the memory of a faithful public servant and to express appreciation of his character and public services, and that there be extended to the widow and relatives most sincere sympathy.

HON. CHARLES EDWIN STALLCOP

MR. SPEAKER—Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and service of the Hon. Charles Edwin Stallcop, late of Sac county, Iowa, beg leave to report the following memorial:

Honorable Charles Edwin Stallcop, who represented Sac county in the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth General Assemblies, was born in Minnesota, September 9, 1858. He attended common school, was graduated from Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota, and came to Iowa in 1881, then a young man, as Iowa seemed more alluring to him in

ment of Drake University in 1884 and became a resident of Sac county, engaging in teaching there. In 1889 he acquired the Sac County News, published at Early, and in 1891 was elected County Superintendent of Schools. He was re-elected two years later, and served from 1892 to 1896.

In the noted campaign of 1896 he delivered many speeches in support of the Republican party, and won recognition as an able speaker. In 1897 he was elected representative and was re-elected two years later, serving in the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth General Assemblies. For a few years he practiced law in Sac City, being in partnership with Charles E. Lane, and was active in the anti-saloon litigation that put the saloons out of Sac county.

In 1902 he bought the Brooklyn Chronicle and edited it for some years. He was much interested in the Brotherhood of American Yeomen and several years previously had assisted materially in writing its ritual. He became a member of its Supreme Auditing Committee and disposed of his newspaper, removed to Des Moines, the headquarters of the association, and for several years of his later life he gave his entire time to its interest, visiting local lodges, lecturing, and acting as vice-president.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the House of Representatives take this occasion to present this tribute to the memory of a faithful public servant and to express appreciation of his character and public service and to extend to his family and relatives most sincere sympathy.

MR. SPEAKER—Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and services of the Hon. Abram Pearson, late of Washington county, Iowa, beg leave to report the following memorial:

At his home in Washington county, Iowa, at seven-thirty p. m., Wednesday, September 20, 1922, Hon. Abram Pearson passed away after a brief illness. Mr. Pearson was born near Kansas City, Kansas, on July 15, 1837. He was the son of Moses and Sarah Pearson of Miami county, Ohio, who, with a man named Henry Harvey, were sent out in 1835 by the Friends (Quakers), of which church they were members, to establish schools among the Indians of Indian Territory. They worked in the west for three years, during which time Mr. Pearson was born, and then returned to their home in Ohio.

Abram Pearson was one of a family of eight children and was the last to pass away. He attended the Friends' school near his home and this education was supplemented by two years of study at Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio. After completing his education he en-
