Milton Z. Bailey was born in Johnson County, Iowa, April 1, 1856, and departed this life at the University Hospital in Iowa City, March 16, 1936, at the age of 79 years 11 months and 15 days.

He grew to manhood in Johnson County where he was united in marriage to Emma Feldman Jan. 13, 1894. To this union 6 children were born. Two sons, Oscar Lee in 1884 and Milo Morin in 1922, preceded him in death.

Many Iowa counties are to refund road bonds, and at the ruling rates of interest, will realize considerable saving. These when issued bore 4 5 or 4 75 percent interest.
