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
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**SENATOR E. L. HOGUE
RITES HELD THURSDAY**

Ernest L. Hogue, State Budget Director passed away suddenly Monday morning at 10:25 o'clock at his hotel apartment in Des Moines. The funeral will be held at the High School auditorium at Blencoe this Thursday afternoon, the Rev. J. R. Perkins of Council Bluffs conducting the service. The body lay in state in the rotunda of the state Capitol building Tuesday afternoon and at 5:30 o'clock the funeral party left Des Moines for the family home at Blencoe.

Nominated by Kendall

Senator Hogue was the first director of the budget to be confirmed by the senate. When the budget law was enacted during the special session of the fortieth general assembly, former Gov. N. E. Kendall appointed former Senator Fred L. Maytag of Newton. The senate refused to confirm this appointment and rejected several other names sent up by the governor.

After the economy bloc of that senate let it be known that Senator Hogue's appointment would be satisfactory Governor Kendall nominated him. The appointment went through the senate. Governor Hammiel reappointed Senator Hogue for a full six-year term last year. There was a warm fight in the senate on this nomination, it was understood, but the senator's confirmation was accorded without delay.

Born in Monroe County

Senator Hogue was 67 years old Aug. 31. He was born in Monroe county. When he was 2 years old, his family moved to Warren county, near Norwalk. Mr. Hogue came to Monona county when he was 24 years old, engaging in farming and livestock raising. He owned about 2,000 acres of farm land in Monona county around Blencoe and Little Sioux. This land has been operated by his two sons, Lawrance and Lewis, since Mr. Hogue became budget director in August, 1924.

Probably nobody in the eleventh congressional district knows more about its policies than did Senator Hogue. He served the Monona-Harrison-Crawford county senatorial district in the twenty-ninth, thirtieth and thirty-first general assemblies, getting an extension on his term for one session when the years of senatorial elections were changed

Senator Hogue's death was due to an attack of coronary thrombosis. He had been home ill with influenza since Friday, but his condition was not regarded as serious.

A slight manifestation of the attack which caused his death Monday was given Sunday night as the budget director sat playing cards with Mrs. Hogue. No physician was called then. Monday morning about 8:30 he had a severe attack. Dr. J. M. Griffin, house physician, was called. He administered a hypodermic to relieve chest pains.

Physician Called

Dr. E. B. Winnett, Senator Hogue's physician, was called about 10 a. m. He found Mr. Hogue feeling somewhat better, but advised Mrs. Hogue that his condition required the services of a nurse and his confinement to bed for a period of six or eight weeks.

Shortly after Dr. Winnett and Mrs. Hogue returned to Mr. Hogue's bedside, the death of the senator occurred.

Mrs. Hogue, who was seriously ill recently, was prostrated by the senator's death. Families of the budget director's staff and Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Ellis, close friends of the Hogue family, remained until the arrival of Lawrence Hogue, son of the budget director, N. C. Gray and L. E. McElwain from Blencoe.

Had Been in Poor Health

Senator Hogue had not been in good health for more than six months. He was a sufferer from diabetes, which caused him to go to a hospital last summer and to follow a rigid diet. The heavy work of completing the biennial budget for submission to Governor Hammill and the legislature in January had been a severe strain on him, his office staff said.

Budget Nearly Completed

The budget was nearly completed. About all that remained was for Senator Hogue to make his final recommendations on state board of education askings. A conference of the board with Senator Hogue and Governor Hammill had been arranged for Tuesday.

of senatorial elections were changed to Monday. He was renominated for a second term by the republican senatorial convention, but declined to accept with the statement that he ever was ready to fight for his party but not within it. This declaration came after there had been some show of opposition from one of the counties, accompanied by a threat to bolt Senator Hogue's nomination.

Senator Hogue was the eleventh district member of the republican state central committee until last July, when he retired because of his work as director of the budget. This office no doubt kept him from becoming chairman of the committee two years ago.

The death of Senator Hogue will be keenly felt in Blencoe and Monona county.

Ernest L. Hogue was born August 30, 1861 the son of M. C. and Jane Hogue. On June 8th, 1890 he was united in marriage to Miss Emma Case who died December 21st, 1903. On September 15th, 1921, he was united in marriage to Mrs. Etta Morrison in Council Bluffs, Ia. On last Thursday afternoon Mr. Hogue was taken ill with a slight attack of influenza in his office in the Budget Department at the State House in Des Moines. He rapidly declined Monday morning and passed away peacefully at 10:25 a. m. Surviving are his widow, 2 sons, Lawrence and Lewis and a daughter Mrs. H. O. Williams, a brother Lewis Hogue of Weiner, Arkansas and a half brother, Karl of Marcus, his step-mother, Mrs. Laura Hogue of Blencoe, 5 grandchildren, 2 step-sons, Fred Morrison of Washington, Ia., and Bruce Morrison of New York City.

Funeral services were held at the high school auditorium this (Thursday) afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. J. R. Perkins, pastor of the First Congregational church of Council Bluffs officiated. He was assisted by Rev. M. P. Jones of Blencoe. Pall bearers chosen from old friends of Mr. Hogue were: W. F. Davis, A. M. Rock, C. H. Lee, John Hanson, E. R. McElwain, W. D. Basset. Services were in charge of Vesper Lodge No. 1000 at the graveside at Garceland cemetery.

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The state executive council which
