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

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# FRANK M. HOPKINS 70, DIED FRIDAY

### Prominent Banker, Politician and Beloved Citizen Died of Heart Trouble.

Frank M. Hopkins, 70, widely known throughout the state as a champion of republican interests, president of the Peoples State bank of Guthrie Center and former state senator, passed away at his home at 2:45 o'clock Friday morning from heart trouble.

Mr. Hopkins was born at Oskaloosa, Mahaska county, Iowa, March 8, 1854, the son of John Y. and Mary (Needham) Hopkins. He came with his parents to Guthrie Center in the year 1869 and resided here continuously since that time. He was united in marriage September 27, 1882 to Lucy N. Holsman, who survives.

Graduating from the public schools of Guthrie Center, Mr. Hopkins spent three years at the state university at Iowa City. In the year 1880 he was appointed mayor of Guthrie Center to fill an unexpired term and afterward was twice elected to that position. In the year 1899 he was elected state senator for the 17th senatorial district comprising the counties of Audubon, Dallas and Guthrie. He served in the 28th to 32nd, inclusive, general assemblies and the extra session of the 32nd. During his services in the upper house he was associated with much important constructive legislation and was firm for many movements of benefit to the commonwealth. In 1907 he was made chairman of the railroad committee, and he was a member of the appropriation committee since elected to the senate.

Republican county committee in 1890 and was alternate to the republican national convention at St. Louis in 1896.

In the year 1887 he assisted in organizing the Guthrie State bank and became its first president. This bank is now the First National bank, of which institution he was cashier and later vice president. In 1912 he assisted in organizing the Peoples State bank, and he was president at the time of his death. He was a director of the Bayard Savings bank, the Yale Savings bank and the First National bank of Bagley. He was also on the board of directors of the Western Life Insurance company, Des Moines.

Mr. Hopkins leaves no children. Besides his widow, he is survived by three brothers, Dr. C. N. Hopkins, Harry and Ed Hopkins, all of Los Angeles. The deceased was a Mason.

The deceased was a 32 degree Mason and a charter member of the Shrine at Des Moines and the Eastern Star of Guthrie Center.

In his political life even his bitterest opponents speak of him in terms of respect and praise. His entire career both in business, official and private life has been an honor to the people who have honored him.

The funeral services were held at the residence of the deceased conducted by Rev. John F. Arnold, pastor of the Methodist church, the services being in charge of the Masons. Members of the order and the Eastern Star attended in a body. Burial was made in Union cemetery.
