Jap World Gird Boards Aquitania For European D

NEW YORK, April 19.—Torichiro Araki, east bound testant in a two-man race for the world from Tokio, was way across the Atlantic on Aquitania today after arriving New York two hours ahead of schedule.

The 34-year-old Japanese neer hopped out of a mail plane Hadley field, New Brunswick yesterday afternoon, shaved in presence of the crowd there to him, dashed to the city by automobile, methodically posed for pictures, answered questions of reporters with a patient smile, then with them some, ate a dinner, met Walker and climbed aboard Aquitania.

Araki left Tokio on April 6, hours ahead of Ryukichi A who set out in the opposite direction, with a prize of \$1,500 awarded the first to arrive back at Japanese capital. The loser get \$500. The prizes have been offered by a Japanese newspaper Jiji Shimpo. The two men furnished expense money of each.

The two Japanese are using the regular means of transport which includes mail planes, passenger trains, motor routes and steamers. They do not hope to better record of 28 days, 14 hours and minutes set by Linton Wells Edward S. Evans in 1926, he said the record holders used special transportation means. Araki was educated in this country, attending Akron university, Akron, O., and traveled extensively in the United States. Thus it will be seen that Mr. Ives is a "practical" railroad man, having commenced at the lowest round of the ladder and worked his way up, step by step, until he has attained the highest position on the road. His splendid success simply illustrates what ability, coupled with energy and perseverance, will accomplish, and his career is a good example for others to follow.

Mr. Ives was married, Feb. 23, 1853, to Miss Ellen M. Dale of Wallingford, Vt., and they have one son, C. D. Ives, and also a daughter, Hattie J. Mr. Ives is a stock-holder in the Merchant's Bank of Cedar Rapids, and largely interested in real estate in that city and throughout the county. He is a gentleman of sterling worth and integrity, and his record is one worthy of example.

**J**OHN McALLISTER was born in County Armagh, Ireland, in 1842, and with his parents emigrated to the United States in 1852. His father settled in Coshocton County, Ohio, and the subject of our sketch assisted him in clearing up his farm, undergoing many privations, as the family was large and their worldly means very limited. The opportunities of young McAllister for securing an education were also very limited, yet by his own exertions he made good progress in the common branches of study. He assisted his father on the farm, and worked for other farmers by the month to get money to help pay for the family homestead. He went to school about two months during the winter season, and learned fast as he was anxious to become fitted for teaching school. He taught school in the winter of 1861-62, but before the school term expired he enlisted in the 69th Ohio Infantry, and went to the war. He encountered cheerfully all the vicissitudes common to active army life, and was always ready for duty except when suffering from wounds received in action. He participated with his regiment in all its principal battles, among which might be mentioned Stone River, Tullahoma, Chickamauga, Mission Ridge, Resaca and Bentonville, N. C. He was wounded at the battle of Stone River, and taken prisoner. He was also severely wounded

at the battle of Resaca, being shot through the neck while making a charge on the rebel works, the ball passing through his windpipe, and injuring him to such an extent that it is now difficult for him to speak. After recovering from this wound he rejoined his regiment at Rome, Ga., just in time to march to the sea. He went with Sherman all through the Carolinas, and after Gen. Johnston surrendered, marched on to Washington City. He was present at the grand review of Sherman's army in Washington on the 23d of May, 1865. He served faithfully as a soldier, and re-enlisted for a second term after having served two and one-half years. He was promoted Sergeant and on the march to the sea had charge of the ordnance of the regiment. He was mustered out at Louisville, Ky., July 17, 1865.

After his return from the army, Mr. McAllister taught school the succeeding winter and in the spring of 1866 came to Iowa and bought 160 acres of the land which he now occupies. He went considerably in debt for his original purchase, but by perseverance and industry, not only paid for that, but continued adding to it, until he has at present 360 acres of as good prairie land as there is in the Hawkeye State, all free from encumbrance.

The subject of our sketch was married in January, 1871, to Miss O. E. Hutchins, and their union has been blest by the birth of six children, namely: John B., Minnie, Perley, Ada, Elsie and Isaac.

The industry and moral worth of Mr. McAllister was duly recognized by the people of his community, and he has been entrusted with various offices, among which might be mentioned those of Assessor, Clerk and Justice of the Peace. He has also been School Treasurer in his district for more than ten years, and still holds that position. He is now Justice of the Peace, having been elected to that office in the fall of 1886. Politically he is a conscientious Republican, and is religiously a member of the Evangelical Association. He has also taught school six terms since he came to Iowa.

Mr. McAllister is now living comfortably on the homestead which he has secured by his own exertions and those of his amiable wife. He devotes the most of his time to stock-raising and has made

that business a success. He is regarded as one of the most substantial farmers of Linn County, and has the satisfaction of knowing that what he has was accumulated by his own persevering industry.



**J**OHAN B. CUTLER, an honored pioneer of Linn County, is a native of the Green Mountain State, born in Glover, Orleans County, Nov. 15, 1813. His father, Nathan Cutler, was a native of England, and emigrated to America in company with two brothers. He made his first location in Glover, being one of the pioneer settlers there. The nearest market for many years was Boston, Mass., which was 200 miles away, and it was customary for the settlers to "pool" their resources, as it were, and do their marketing together as much as possible. A company made the journey each winter, with four-horse teams, transporting such supplies as were needed for the following season. The mother of our subject was accustomed to spin and weave, and for several years in this way manufactured all the cloth for the family.

In due time after his settlement in this country Nathan Cutler erected a saw and grist mill, and became quite a man of note among his neighbors. He was enterprising and industrious, and after a busy life folded his hands to rest at the homestead which he had established, where once stood the primeval forest, of which he was one of the first to lay the ax at the root of a tree. The maiden name of his wife was Martha Blanchard, a native of New Hampshire, and a worthy and virtuous helpmeet, who cheerfully followed her husband and endured with him the vicissitudes of pioneer life. Of their union six children were born, whose record is as follows: Sophia married Jefferson Ufferd, and lives in Barton, Vt.; Henry is a resident of Glover, same State, as also is Charles; our subject, John B., is the next in order; Martha is married and lives in Glover, and Mary married Mr. Farr, and died in the same town.

John B. Cutler was a little lad of four years old when his father died. His mother determined to keep her little family together until they were old

enough to care for themselves. In this she succeeded admirably. John B. remained at home until he was eighteen years old, and then went to Barton, Vt., and was employed to take care of a line of stage horses. From this he was promoted to be a driver, and for three years occupied this responsible "seat," making the trip from Lyndon, Vt., to Stanford Plains, a distance of forty miles. This proved a valuable experience to him, and he afterward went to Boston, and was engaged as driver of a private carriage one season; he drove a public hack for three years thereafter, and then proceeded to New Orleans and remained until the following May, 1844, engaged in a cotton yard there. At this time he determined to see still more of the world, and came up the river to Muscatine, and thence overland into Linn County. He remained with L. D. Jordan until the fall of the year, then returned to New Orleans, and was occupied again during the winter in a cotton yard. In the spring he returned to Linn County, and soon afterward made a claim on section 23, in what is now Jackson Township. A year later he erected a log house, and has been a continuous resident here since that time, with the exception of five winters spent in the Crescent City. At that early day the nearest markets were Dubuque and Muscatine, fifty-five or sixty miles distant.

Mr. John B. Cutler was married, in 1848, to Miss Martha Heaton, a native of Potsdam, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y. He did not long enjoy the companionship of his early choice, Mrs. Martha Cutler having departed this life Feb. 3, 1856. Of this union there were born three children—Martha, Lucretia and Amos.

Mr. Cutler in due time contracted a second marriage, with Miss Anne Cruikshank, a native of Halifax, N. S. Her father, James Cruikshank, was also a native of the same Province, and her grandfather, John Cruikshank, was a native of Scotland, and the son of Andrew Cruikshank. The grandfather of Mrs. Anne Cutler emigrated to Nova Scotia and settled there, while his brother Andrew went to the West Indies. The former was engaged in agricultural pursuits in Nova Scotia, and there his life terminated. His son James came to Boston in 1818, and thence to Linn County four years

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ary, 1906, began the practice of law there, but devoted himself principally to real estate business. He was active in the city's development, became president of Long Beach Realty Board, and president of the Chamber of Commerce. He was also president of the Iowa Society of Southern California. In 1914 he was elected assemblyman and served two years. This was followed by an election to the state Senate in 1916 and a re-election in 1920, giving him eight years in that body. Shortly before the termination of that service he was a candidate for lieutenant governor, and came within a few hundred votes of election.

GEORGE B. McCARTY was born at Milford, Pennsylvania, August 7, 1843, and died in Emmetsburg, Iowa, April 4, 1928. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander McCarty, removed to a farm in Clayton County, Iowa, in 1838. George attended district school and later Upper Iowa University, read law with Thomas Updegraff at McGregor, was admitted to the bar at Elkader May 12, 1868, and began practice with his preceptor at McGregor. In October, 1869, he removed to Emmetsburg and began practice there alone, but a year later formed a partnership with E. J. Hartshorn, which continued until Mr. McCarty was elected district attorney of the Fourth Judicial District in 1874. This district comprised twenty counties of northwest Iowa and Mr. McCarty resided in Sioux City during the four-year term of the office, but in the fall of 1878 returned to Emmetsburg and formed a partnership with T. W. Harrison, which continued three years. From 1883 to 1900 he was the senior member of the firm of McCarty & Linderman. In 1904 his son, Dwight G., joined his father in the firm of McCarty & McCarty, which later became McCarty, McCarty & Smith. Mr. McCarty was successful in his practice and in business, and was a leader in the development of Emmetsburg and northwest Iowa.

JOHN McALLISTER was born in County Armagh, Ireland, November 3, 1840, and died in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, April 17, 1928. Burial was in the Palo cemetery. He immigrated to this country with his parents in 1852, the family locating on a farm in Coshocton County, Ohio. John obtained his education in rural schools and by private study and reading. He was teaching school the winter of 1861-62 when he quit and enlisted in Company I, Sixty-ninth Ohio Infantry. He was wounded at Stone River, was taken prisoner and sent to Libby prison, and was exchanged and rejoined his regiment. In 1864 he re-enlisted but in the battle of Resaca was wounded in the neck which cause him to speak afterward only in a coarse whisper. However, he rejoined his regiment and was in the famous March to the Sea and in the Grand Review at Washington May 23, 1865. Returning to Ohio he again taught school there, but removed to a farm near Palo, Linn County, Iowa, in 1866, where he followed farming, occasionally teaching a term of country school in winter. He held many township offices, among them being

justice of the peace, and was elected representative in 1903, and re-elected in 1906, serving in the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second general assemblies. Politically he was a Republican, and was a useful citizen.

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JAMES F. POWELL was born in Harrington, Delaware, August 16, 1868, and died in Ottumwa, Iowa, July 12, 1928. His parents, Dr. C. C. and Kate (Fountain) Powell, removed to Exeter, Illinois, in 1876, later to Neeleyville, Illinois, and to Ottumwa, Iowa, in 1883. In 1885 James secured a position with the *Ottumwa Democrat* where he began the trade of printer, working afterward as a compositor on Des Moines, Council Bluffs and Omaha papers. In 1888 he returned to Ottumwa and began work as a compositor on the *Ottumwa Courier*. He advanced steadily, becoming foreman of the job office, foreman of the composing room, assistant business manager, and in 1901, business manager. On the death of A. W. Lee in 1907 he became publisher of the *Courier* and remained in that capacity until his death. He also had in connection with E. P. Adler of Davenport, general supervision of the newspapers of the Lee Newspaper Syndicate, being secretary-treasurer of it. He was prominent in the good roads movement, was a nature lover and out door enthusiast, was prominent in many activities beneficial to his city, and was held in esteem and affection especially by the people of Ottumwa, and by his fellow-workers in the newspaper field.

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HENRY REED KEAGY was born in Epworth, Iowa, March 21, 1861, and died in Independence May 8, 1928. His parents were Philip and Mary Jane Keagy. He was in the mercantile business in Epworth several years, was an officer of Epworth Seminary, and was elected representative from Dubuque County in 1901 running as a Republican, and served in the Twenty-ninth General Assembly. In 1907 he removed to Independence and joined with J. A. Wells in the glove and mitten business, but in 1912 engaged in the grocery business. He was for several years a member of the Independence City Council, and at the time of his death was chairman of the Republican County Central Committee of Buchanan County.

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EMMA B. FARNHAM was born in Osage, Iowa, February 20, 1859, and died in Charles City April 29, 1928. Burial was at Osage. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Lower. As Emma Lower she was a teacher in Osage public schools in 1879 when she was married to Frederick F. Coffin, a lawyer of Osage. She assisted him in his law practice. Mr. Coffin died in 1890, and in 1893 she was married to Samuel Fiske Farnham, a banker of Charles City, and thereafter resided there. She was acquainted with the best in literature, had traveled extensively in the United States, Canada, and Mexico, and had been three times to Europe. She was a woman of talent, had a strong personality, and exercised a positive influence for good.
