George Whitmer Dead

G. R. Whitmer, 71, former Primghar banker, who left Primghar to go to Sioux City in 1904, died in that city Monday evening after a year's illness. Mr. Whitmer and R. Hinman, now president of the First National bank, established the Farmers Savings Bank, later consolidated with the First National bank. Mr. Whitmer during his early years in Sioux City was one of the large real estate dealers of that city and at one time largely interested in the Pelletier Co. He served as mayor of Primghar and was an unsuccessful candidate for county treasurer and also state representative.

George R. Whitmer, 71, Succumbs to Long Illness

Funeral services for George R. Whitmer, 71, who had served as president of four Sioux City financial institutions and executive of a large department store, will be Wednesday at 3 p. m. in First Congregational church. Rev. George Pullman will officiate. Burial will be in Graceland cemetery.

The body will lie in state at West's funeral home until 2 p. m. Wednesday. The casket will not be opened at the church.

Mr. Whitmer died at his home, 3008 Jackson, Monday night following a lingering illness.

Between 1904 when Mr. Whitmer came to Sioux City and 1921 when he retired, he served as president of Farmers Trust and Savings bank, National Bank of Commerce, Bankers Loan and Trust company and State Savings and Loan association and secretary and treasurer of the Pelletier company.

Was Primghar Banker

Born December 5, 1864, at Wilton Junction, Ia., Mr. Whitmer married Miss Fannie Murrison there in 1891 and they moved immediately to Primghar, Ia., where he was engaged in the banking business. While there he served as a democratic state representative from O'Brien county.

In 1904 the Whitmers moved to Sioux City. He joined William Gordon in the real estate, loan and insurance business with offices in the old Iowa building. Mr. Whitmer became secretary and treasurer of the Pelletier company in 1906, a post he held until 1912.

He then was attracted to the banking business as president of the Farmers Trust and Savings bank, which had been established in 1909. D. C. Shull was vice president and J. B. Alexander cashier.

Retired in 1921

After holding the office about a year, Mr. Whitmer joined the National Bank of Commerce in 1913, only to return to the loan business in 1914 with an office in the Iowa building. Two years later he became president of the Bankers Loan and Trust company, which had been organized in September, 1915. W. B. Palmer was vice president and G. C. Robinson secretary.

Mr. Whitmer became president of the State Savings and Loan association in 1921, but retired later in the year.

The well known financier was a member of Abu Bekr Shrine, Knights Templar and First Congregational church.

FUND TRANSFER TO MEET O'CONNOR TRIAL APPROVED

Des Moines—(AP)—State Comptroller C. B. Murtagh Tuesday allowed Woodbury county, scene of the "graft" investigation, and the gambling conspiracy trial of Attorney General Edward L. O'Connor to transfer \$25,000 from its emergency to its court fund.

The transfer will allow the county to pay outstanding warrants against the court fund, already overdrawn, and to meet the expenses of O'Connor's trial.

Murtagh also allowed the county to transfer \$20,000 from its emergency to its poor fund and \$15,000 from its emergency to widows' pension.

WANTS EQUITY JUDGMENT NOW

Firm Asks Second Receiv-
ership for Shenberg-
Moore Realty Co.

Seeking appointment of a second receivership, the Massachusetts Life Insurance company is asking an equity judgment for \$190,579.12 in federal court against Robert C. Munger, receiver for the Shenberg-Moore Realty company.

The insurance company alleges first liens on the building and property on Third between Pierce and Douglas that formerly housed the Moore Wholesale Grocer company. The sums named represent principal and unpaid interest since the mortgage was issued in 1920. It has been renewed twice for five-year periods, the petition states.

The insurance company also asks \$1,945.79 for costs and attorney fees and seeks sale of the premises under direction of the court.

Tenants of the building, with the exception of Ramp garage, which is operated by the present receiver, are named as co-defendants in the petition, which states the new receiver, if appointed, should be entitled either to re-rent to the present tenants or seek others. The tenants named as co-defendants are the Cohen Wholesale Grocery company, the Crystal Ice company and J. C. Dye, barber.

Ferris Skaff, who also has a lien on the property, is named as co-defendant, and the company asks his claim be declared junior to that of the insurance firm. James W. Moore, also is named co-defendant.

Gerald F. Harrington is attorney for the insurance company.





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
