## H. B. KLING DIED SATURDAY MORNING

HAD LIVED IN WOODBINE SINCE  
1878

H. B. Kling, a pioneer resident and business man of Woodbine, passed away Saturday morning, December 6, at his home in Woodbine, after an illness of about a year and a half with heart trouble.

Henry Bliss Kling was born May 23, 1845, at Troy, Wis. On April 11, 1872, he was united in marriage to Flora E. Allen, at Stoughton, Wis. To them two children were born, Mrs. Bessie Nelson of Los Angeles, Calif., and Herbert A. Kling of Westwood, N. J., both of whom were present at the funeral services.

Before coming to Woodbine Mr. Kling and the late George Mathews were in the lumber business at Stoughton, Wis. In 1878 they came to Woodbine and engaged in the same business, the firm name at that time



Thirtieth sessions of the state legislature. He has been president of the First National Bank since the death a few years ago of Josiah Coe, and was an active member of the Woodbine Commercial Club until his health failed him.

During his long residence in Woodbine Mr. Kling was largely identified with the growth and prosperity of the town. He was always ready and willing to use his influence and money for the good of Woodbine, his home town. His help will be greatly missed in the years to come. He was a good father, husband and neighbor, a loyal friend and a man among men.

Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church Wednesday afternoon and were largely attended in spite of the cold weather. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Roland J. Blue and the members of the I. O. O. F. lodge conducted their ritualistic service. Members of the Rebekah lodge, of which the deceased was a member, attended in a body. Music was furnished by Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Smith, and the floral offerings were many and beautiful. Burial was made in the Woodbine cemetery.
