DAVID C. MOTT IS DEAD AT 82

Iowa Newspaper Man Many Years.

IOWA CITY, IA.—David C.

Mott, 82, former state legislator and Iowa newspaper man, died Saturday at a hospital in Cherokee, Okla.

Word of his death was received by his son, Prof. Frank L. Mott, director of the State University of Iowa school of journalism. The former Iowa editor was visiting a daughter, Mrs. Ethel Mott Truitt of Helena, Okla.

Mr. Mott had been making his home with another daughter, Mrs. C. L. Pickard of Indianola, Ia., since his retirement in 1937 as assistant curator of the state historical department in Des Moines. In that position he was auditor of Annals of Iowa, a historical quarterly.

A member of the state legislature from Audubon county from 1904 to 1908, David Mott also was a member of the state parole board from 1910 to 1920 and he served for a time as board chairman.

Mr. Mott was editor of the What Cheer Patriot from 1888 to 1894; of the Tipton Advertiser from 1894 to 1897; the Audubon Republican from 1897 to 1906; the El Reno, Okla., Daily American from 1906 to 1907 and of the Marengo Republican from 1907 to 1914.

Funeral services will be in Marengo, at 2:30 p. m. Monday. Besides his three children, Mr. Mott is survived by one brother, Elwood D. Mott of Pasadena, Cal.



Mary Hicks Dies Friday at Exira

Mott, Prominent Iowan, Dies in Cherokee, Okla.

Was Editor And Publisher of
 The Audubon Republican
 Several Years

David C. Mott, 82, prominent
 Iowan and once publisher of the
 Audubon Republican, died Satur-
 day at a Cherokee, Okla. hospital.
 Mr. Mott, who had lived at In-
 dianola since 1937 with a daughter,
 Mrs. Clark Pickard, had been vis-
 iting at Helena, Okla. with his
 other daughter, Mrs. L. D. Truitt.
 Mr. Mott, in addition to the two
 daughters, was the father of two
 sons, Russell G. Mott, deceased, and
 Frank Luther Mott, director of the
 University of Iowa's school of
 journalism. The latter is an Audu-
 bon high school graduate, having
 been one of 12 members of the
 class of 1903 here.

Here 1897-1905

David C. Mott bought The Audu-
 bon Republican in 1897 from J. E.
 Griffith, and sold it July 1, 1905
 to Albert C. Ross.

Mr. Mott's birthplace was Wash-
 ington county, Ohio. He was born

Had Been In Ill Health Long Time; Exira Resident For Years

Mrs. Mary Belle Hicks, 86, died Friday evening at 11:40 o'clock at her home in Exira. She had been in ill health for a long time.

Her maiden name was Smith, and she was born June 6, 1854 at Frankfort, Ohio, the daughter of Samuel and Gertrude Smith.

Moved to Exira

She moved with her parents to a farm northeast of Exira, now owned by William Jensen. She married John A. Hicks Jan. 6, 1874, and they farmed west of Exira until moving to that town in 1893.

Mrs. Hicks was preceded in death by her husband, whose death occurred in 1908, and by five

children. Of the latter, two died in infancy, two sons, John and James A. died in 1920 and 1940, respectively, and one daughter, Ora Belle Law, died in 1932.

Surviving children are Mrs. Chas. Simonsen, Exira; Mrs. Della Addington, Minneapolis, Minn.

From 1911 until 1919 he was a member of the state board of parole, and from 1919 until 1937 editorial assistant with the state historical department of Iowa. During this period of service with the parole board, he served as its chairman for a time. His services with the state historical department included editorship of Annals of Iowa.

Mr. Mott's wife died a number of years ago. His survivors, besides the three children named, include a brother, Elwood, of Pasadena, Calif.

Value Corn Stalks To Soil Explained

Increased yields and a workable soil are the two reasons why more farmers under cornstalks each year, according to J. I. Fredregill, soil conservationist at the Audubon CCC camp.

Corn stalks increase the soil and reduce water and soil according to many Audubon county farmers.

An analysis of one ton of stover is as follows: 16 pounds of nitrogen, 16.5 pounds of potassium, 16.5 pounds of phosphorus, 2.2 pounds of potash, and 8.3 pounds of potash according to H. D. Hughes and E. R. Henson, Iowa State professors.

Thus, Mr. Fredregill points out one ton of stalks is more valuable than one ton of manure.

sole proprietor of the business. He has won an unassailable reputation by reason of his integrity and honorable dealings and is accorded a most gratifying and well deserved patronage.

On the 16th of June, 1914, in Cedar Rapids, Mr. Taylor was united in marriage to Miss Bertha Witwer, of that city, her parents being John and Sarah Witwer, the former a retired grocery merchant. In politics Mr. Taylor is a republican, while fraternally he is identified with the Masons, belonging to Crescent Lodge, No. 25. He attends the services of the First Presbyterian church and his wife is a consistent member of the Christian church. He stands high in the esteem of his fellow citizens, and those who have known him from boyhood are numbered among his warmest friends.

DAVID C. MOTT.

David C. Mott devoted the major part of his time and attention to newspaper publication until he became a member of the board of parole, to which position he was called through appointment of Governor Carroll. During fifty-three years he has been a resident of Iowa and has therefore largely witnessed the development of the state from pioneer times to its present condition of progress and prosperity. He was born in Washington county, Ohio, March 23, 1858, a son of George W. and Abigail (Ball) Mott, both of whom were also natives of Ohio, whence they removed to Iowa in 1862. After residing for two years in Cedar county they took up their abode in Keokuk county in 1864.

David C. Mott was but four years of age when brought to this state. He began his education in the district schools of Keokuk county and after mastering the branches of learning therein taught, spent one year as a student in the Friends Academy at Barnesville, Ohio. During early manhood he devoted several terms to teaching in the country schools, largely following that occupation through the winter months, while the summer seasons were devoted to farm work. He became actively identified with newspaper publication in 1888, when he purchased the *What Cheer Patriot*, and during the period of his residence in *What Cheer* he served as post-master of the town during the last two years of President Benjamin Harrison's administration. In 1894 he purchased the *Tipton Advertiser*, of which he remained the owner and editor until 1897. He then became editor and proprietor of the *Audubon Republican*, which he published for eight years, becoming a well known figure in newspaper circles in Iowa.

On the 7th of September, 1881, at Centerdale, Iowa, Mr. Mott was married to Miss Mary E. Tipton, a daughter of Samuel Tipton, and to them have been born the following named: Frank L.; Ethel A., the wife of L. D. Truitt, of Fairbank, Iowa; and Mildred, at home.

Mr. and Mrs. Mott hold membership in the Methodist Episcopal church, in the work of which they are actively and helpfully interested, Mr. Mott serving now on the official board of this church. He is identified with several fraternal organizations, having taken the degrees of the lodge and chapter in Masonry. He is also a Knight of Pythias and has membership with the Sons of the American Revolution, having been president of the Iowa state society in 1910. This indicates his deep

interest in everything that pertains to American history and calls forth the patriotic devotion of the citizens of the country. He has never regarded lightly the duties of citizenship and has studied closely the significant and vital questions which divide the great political parties. While living in Audubon county he represented his district in the thirtieth and thirty-first general assembles. He then went to El Reno, Oklahoma, where he devoted one year to newspaper publication and upon his return to Iowa in 1907 he purchased the Marengo Republican, which he and his son Frank L. owned and published until 1913, when he sold his interest. He still makes his home in Marengo but spends most of his time in Des Moines, the seat of government, his active duties as a member of the board of parole causing him to spend the major part of his time in the capital city. Upon the death of Hon. P. A. Smith he was appointed to fill out the unexpired term on the board by Governor Carroll, and the record which he has made in office is but another proof of his fidelity and patriotism in public affairs.

FRANK W. ELLIS.

Frank W. Ellis, one of the best known members of the Iowa bar, is practicing in Clinton, in which city he was born May 4, 1865, his parents being Hon. Lyman A. and Mary (Buckley) Ellis, of whom mention is made elsewhere in this work. He attended the schools of Clinton and was graduated from the high school in 1883. He afterward became a student in the University of Minnesota and subsequently read law with the firm of Ellis & McCoy. After thorough preliminary preparation he was admitted to the bar in May, 1888, and practiced in Clinton until 1890, when he removed to Denver, Colorado, where he followed his profession for four years. On the expiration of that period he returned to Clinton, where he was for several years a member of the prosperous and influential law firm of Barker, Ellis & McCoy, but with the election of Mr. Barker to the district court bench the firm became Ellis & McCoy and so continues. Their business is extensive and of an important character, and Mr. Ellis is most careful and thorough in the preparation of his cases, presenting his cause in the strong, clear light of sound reasoning, and, while he is devoted to the interests of his clients, he ever recognizes the fact that he owes a still higher allegiance to the majesty of the law.

In May, 1899, Mr. Ellis was married to Miss Celeste Ware, and they have one child, Jane, born in May, 1900.

In his fraternal relations Mr. Ellis is a Mason and a member of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks, while in politics he is a republican, taking an active interest in party work. He served for several years as city attorney of Clinton and made an excellent official. He is a man of much public spirit and is ever ready to lend his aid and influence to any measure which has as its object the good of the community. The son of one of the ablest practitioners of the Iowa bar, he inherited much of his father's natural aptitude for the law, but, realizing that hard work counts for more than talent, he has applied himself steadily to the study of law and is very thorough in the preparation of his cases. Moreover, he is a man of high mental endowments, ambitious to excel in all things that are worth while, and by reason of his undaunted spirit and determination he has gained a most creditable and enviable position in his profession.
