Stanley Conn Buried Monday

Served Citizens in Many Ways During His Lifetime

Stanley Conn, son of Joseph and Mary Parker Conn was born at Granby, Canada, May 13, 1855 and passed away at his home in Parkersburg, January 12, 1939 at the age of eighty-three years, seven months and twenty nine days.

He had been a sufferer from diabetes for eighteen years but his last illness was short and his death came as a distinct shock to the community.

When he was six weeks old his parents with a company of relatives came to the United States going by boat to Chicago and overland to Delhi, Iowa, where they spent the winter. The following spring the company divided, some going to Illinois and others to various parts of Iowa.

The Joseph Conn family who were accompanied by Mr. Conn's father, a surveyor, settled on government land three and a half miles north of Parkersburg.

Many of the roads and early farmsteads were laid out by Mr. Conn's grandfather.

Married in 1880

He grew to manhood on the farm and was married May 13, 1880 to Mina Collins. They continued to live on the farm until December of 1892 when they moved to Parkersburg, purchasing a home on South Church street which place has been the family home for forty-six years.

He has held many places of honor and responsibility. He served as Supervisor in Butler county from 1895 until 1903 and in 1904 was elected to the State Legislature, serving as a State Representative in the 32nd and 33rd General Assemblies, 1904-
