William H. Hickey.

In our Thursday issue we made brief
mention of the death of Mr. Hickey
which occurred that morning at his
home in Diamond township. Mr.
Hickey had been suffering from grippe
and two days before his death was
seized with violent hiccoughing which
could not be controlled and this was
the immediate cause of death. The
following modest biography appears in
the Iowa Official Register with the
other biographical sketches of the mem-
bers of the 32nd general assembly:

"William H. Hickey, representative
from Cherokee county, was born in
Rochester, New York, in 1846 of Irish
parentage. His education was received
in the public schools of New York. At
the age of fifteen he moved to Kenosha,
Wisconsin, and in 1866 to Allamakee
county, Iowa, where he resided until
1875, when he moved to Cherokee
county, settling on a farm in Diamond
township, where he has since resided.
He was married in 1869 and has six
children, three boys and three girls.
He is a director of the First National
Bank of Aurelia. Elected representa-
tive in 1906. A democrat in politics."

The funeral occurred from Diamond
Center Saturday, February 1st, and
were in part to be under the auspices
of the Masonic Lodge of this city, but
owing to the hard storm of the previous
evening it was impossible for the lodge
to be there at the hour set for the
funeral. Mr. Hickey was also a mem-
ber of Crusade Commander, K. T's. of
this city. Mr. Hickey was a man of
sterling worth, modest to a fault, yet
earnest in his advocacy of what he
deemed the right. He won the esteem
of all who knew him, and in his death
Cherokee county loses one of her fore-
most and well loved citizens.


