Baker Library in Sutherland. Charles served in the House of Representatives in the 32nd Assembly in 1907 and the extra session that followed. Charles was a staunch Republican and served on the O'Brien County Board of Supervisors. He was one of seven men who were trying to overcome the swindling and bribery of the previous Board, who fled the county instead of being prosecuted. His term was 1890 to 1900. Charles was also involved in the O'Brien County Agricultural Society, holding many offices over the years. And he was active in forming a young mans' youth organization much like the YMCA.

Charles immigrated to the United States in 1881 with his

It was said that at one time Charles and William owned close to 1,000 acres of land southeast of Sutherland about 3 miles. Every time it's been added up since it seems to come up to about 640 to 720 acres. Their oldest brother George settled here for a time also and he owned about 160 acres southwest of town. Most of this land had never been turned over until these men came to do it. This area was nothing but prairie grass at that time, the only trees were along the rivers and creeks. Sam owned land to the northeast of Sutherland about 7 or 8 miles.
