W. G. DODDS, 71, DIES HERE

Was Member of Four Iowa
General Assemblies, Au-
thority on Land Values

William Drennan Dodds, 71, four time elected to the general assembly of Iowa as representative from Des Moines county and prominent in agricultural circles, died in Burlington hospital Thursday at 7 p. m. He had been a patient there for 12 days and had been ill for two years.

Mr. Dodds, a resident of Burlington for the last 16 years, was born April 12, 1870, in Danville township, the son of John Henry Dodds and Lucy Parrot Dodds, both natives of Des Moines county. He was educated in the rural schools near his father's farm and later at the Capital City Commercial college, Des Moines, Ia. At the age of 29 he was elected to the 28th general assembly. Later he was reelected to the 29th, 32nd and 33rd assemblies. Mr. Dodds was a staunch Democrat throughout his career.

Mr. Dodds was a member of the First Methodist church of Burlington and of the Danville lodge, A. F. and A. M., of which he was a past master.

Upon his retirement from farming, in 1929, Mr. Dodds came to Burlington, where he made his home at 641 S. Central avenue.

On Oct. 29, 1896, he married Lizzie Gugeler of Danville vicinity. To this union two sons were born. In 1934 Mr. Dodds was married to Clara Hubner, who survives. Other survivors include the two sons, Henry F. Dodds of Santa Monica, Cal., and Horace U. Dodds of Danville; one sister, Mrs. C. N. McGohan, Mt. Pleasant, Ia., and three grandchildren.

Services Sunday

Funeral services will be held at the Danville Methodist church, of which he was a member before moving to Burlington, at 2 p. m. Sunday, following short rites for relatives at the home of Horace Dodds in Danville at 1:30 p. m. Dr. W. T. Smith, pastor of the First Methodist church, Burlington, will officiate. Burial will be in Jagger cemetery.

The body is at Prugh's chapel in Danville and will remain until Sunday morning when it will be removed to the Horace Dodds home.

ASK BIDS ON HOUSING SITE

Government Wants Tract for 200 Homes for Defense Workers

Bids were asked today on a tract of not less than 40 acres in the vicinity of the ordnance plant for the site of 200 houses to be built for defense workers.

The bids are due by 11 a. m. Monday, June 23. Blanks may be obtained at the postmaster's office, where further specifications also are to be found.

Post office officials, asked to obtain the bids, expressed the view the site need not be "next door to the ordnance plant reservation" but in this vicinity.

Bids should state the price per acre and whether there is any variation in price of different portions—improvements should be listed separately in all bids. The federal government desires the option of taking any part or all of the acreage at the prices per acre submitted by owners.
