PIONEER CITIZEN IS CALLED

Hon. B. F. Stoddard Passes Away Sunday After Illness Of Several Months.

Since our last issue our people have been called upon to mourn the death of one of our most prominent and distinguished citizens, Hon. B. F. Stoddard who passed away at his home on West Hawley street Sunday morning at eleven o'clock. Mr. Stoddard underwent an operation at the Presbyterian hospital Waterloo, in November and had been confined to his bed the most of the time since. He recovered sufficiently about six week ago as to be able to come up town and conditions looked brighter, but the change for the better was but short duration and he gradually failed until the end came.

Benjamin F. Stoddard was born at Gales Ferry, near New London, Connecticut, on the 9th day of July, 1848, therefore would have been 71 years old had he lived until the ninth of next month.

In 1855 Mr. Stoddard came to Iowa with his parents, the family settling in Clayton county near McGregor. In 1867 the family removed to Buchanan county, locating on a farm east of Jesup.

Mr. Stoddard remained at home until he was eighteen years of age, when he came to Jesup to learn telegraphy, which he followed for two years, being stationed at various points on the Illinois Central. At the end of that time he gave up telegraphy to learn the miller's trade, plying himself to the business for six years at Independence.

On the 12 of February, 1875 he was united in Marriage to Miss Electa A. Labour, to which union two children were born, Gertrude and Margaret.

After marriage he took up the pursuit of farming on a ten acre tract of land which is now the home place and in which house he has lived over a span of 44 years.

He was a man that enjoyed public life and spent much of his time in serving the people in various capacities and has held all city offices and became well known not only in the county but over the state as well.

Mr. Stoddard was a stalwart republican and represented his district in the state legislature in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies and proved a very efficient member, serving on many important committees.

After retiring from the legislature he served two terms as mayor, from 1914 to 1918.

natives of England and in an early day came to the United States, the mother being then a little child, but the father was practically grown when he made the voyage to the new world. He located in Illinois and purchased land near Kewanee, where he carried on farming throughout his remaining days, passing away in 1878. His wife survived for more than two decades, dying on the 7th of September, 1899. To Mr. and Mrs. Mumford have been born six children, as follows: John T., at home; Ella, who passed away in 1873; Elizabeth A., who is the wife of Bert Fifield, of Illinois, and the mother of a daughter, Irene, thirteen years old; Alice, who gave her hand in marriage to Elisha Myer and resides near Trenton, Missouri; Leonard B., at home; and Manville, who follows farming near Vista, Iowa.

A republican in politics, a Baptist in religious faith—these are the associations of Mr. Mumford outside of business. He is neglectful of none of the duties which devolve upon him in a public relation but has made farming his chief interest and his labors have resulted in the attainment of a high measure of success which is the merited reward of his industry and close application.

HON. BENJAMIN F. STODDARD.

Hon. Benjamin F. Stoddard for many years has been prominent in public affairs of Buchanan county and his influence has been felt throughout the state of Iowa, as he was for two terms a member of the general assembly. He is the present mayor of Jesup and brings his wide knowledge of civic and governmental matters to the administration of the affairs of the town, proving an unusually able and progressive executive.

He was born at Gales Ferry, near New London, Connecticut, on the 9th of July, 1848, a son of Isaac A. and Celia M. (Cortes) Stoddard. The father was a native of the same place and the subject of this review is a representative of the sixth generation of the family born at Gales Ferry, the Stoddards having resided in this country since about 1650, when William and Anthony Stoddard came here from England. The mother was also of English descent and was born at Windham, Connecticut.

In early life Isaac A. Stoddard was a whaler and had many interesting experiences in the Arctic seas. In 1855 he came with his family to Iowa and settled in Clayton county, near the town of McGregor, where he resided for four years. At the end of that time he removed to Grand Meadow township, where he purchased one hundred and sixty acres of wild land. He cleared the farm and cultivated it for a number of years, or until 1867, when he sold the place and came to Buchanan county, buying one hundred and sixty acres east of Jesup. He operated that farm until his death, which occurred when he was eighty-nine years of age. He was a man of iron constitution and was vigorous and active until a very short time before his death. He was a republican in politics and held all of the township offices. He was also very active in church work, being a local minister of the Methodist Episcopal church and prominent in the Sunday school. His wife died when the subject of this review was fourteen years of age and when she was but forty years old. Her religious affiliation was with

the Congregational church and she could always be depended upon to aid in the work of that organization. By her marriage she was the mother of three children, namely: Benjamin F.; Mary M., the wife of N. R. Reynolds, of Luverne, Minnesota; and Isaac C., who died when thirty-five years of age.

Benjamin F. Stoddard was about six years of age when the family removed to Iowa and remained at home until he was a youth of eighteen years. He then began the study of telegraphy at Jesup and for about two years followed that occupation, being stationed at various points on the Illinois Central Railroad. At the end of that time he abandoned telegraphy and learned the miller's trade, which he followed for six years at Independence, Iowa. He then began farming and still oversees the cultivation of a valuable tract of land which he owns in Perry township, this county. About thirty-eight years ago he built his present home in Jesup and has since been a resident of the town. A great deal of his time has been devoted to public service, as he has held all of the town offices and, as before stated, is the present mayor. He represented his district in the state legislature in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies and proved an efficient member of that body. He served on the following committees: Railroads and transportation, roads and highways, food and dairy, agriculture, telegraph and express, schools and text-books, senatorial districts, federal relations, and was chairman of the committee on horticulture. He readily learned the intricacies of legislative procedure and manifested excellent judgment in deciding upon the merit of the bills that came up for consideration, and was an important factor in securing the passage of a number of measures which proved beneficial to the state at large.

On the 12th of February, 1875, the marriage of Mr. Stoddard and Miss Electa A. Labour was solemnized. Mrs. Stoddard was born May 21, 1849, in the state of New York and came to this locality in 1867. They have two children: Gertrude E., the wife of R. W. Houck, of Jesup; and Margaret M., assistant superintendent of the Northwestern Hospital at Moorhead, Minnesota.

Mr. and Mrs. Stoddard are active and consistent members of the Methodist Episcopal church. He is a republican in politics and his advice is much sought in local councils of his party. Fraternally he belongs to Siolem Lodge No. 222, A. F. & A. M., of Jesup, and both he and his wife are members of the Eastern Star. He is one of the prominent citizens of Jesup and his endorsement of any project does much toward insuring its success.

GEORGE W. FRANCK.

A farm of one hundred and sixty acres situated on section 8, Newton township, pays tribute to the care and labor bestowed upon it by George W. 



Jacob Sherman Family -- Jacob F. Sherman (1826-1892) and Catherine Breithaupt (1838-1916) were married in 1862 and located in Barclay Township four miles north of Jesup. Catherine continued to reside on this farm after her husband's death until she moved to Jesup in 1909.

A log cabin was built in 1860 and their ten children were born in this cabin. They were: Henry Charles (1863-1957); Clara Catherine (1865-1951); Nellie Jane (Mrs. Henry Tempus) born in 1866 and died in 1946; Sara Summa (1868-1957); Ida May (1870-1909); Silas George (1872-1951); John Adam (1874-1964); Edward William (1876-1956); Jacob Frederick (1877-1957); and Norris Franklin (1880-1970).

Stadford and Abagale Sherman Family -- Stadford and Abagale Sherman settled in Buchanan County in 1854 in Jefferson and Westburg townships. They moved there from Illinois with a family of three children. One

child, Erwin O. Sherman, survived. He married Anna Gregory from Pennsylvania and they had two sons. The oldest, Ralph, was killed while attending Iowa State University at Ames. The surviving son, William Richard Sherman, continued the farming operation. He married Hazel Hertzberg.

Louise, daughter of Jeffrey and Luna (Miller) Bridgeman of Unionville, Iowa, came to live with the Shermans in 1925 when she was nine years old, and they raised her. Later a daughter, Shirley Ann, was born to William and Hazel. Shirley and Louise graduated from the Jesup Community School.


Louise married Elmer F. Peters.* They live in Westburg Township and have three sons.

Benjamin Franklin Stoddard Family -- Benjamin Franklin Stoddard* (known as "B.F.") worked as a

telegrapher for the Illinois Central Railroad, was a miller for six years, and then farmed in Perry Township. After moving to Jesup he worked as a truck gardener, but devoted his major efforts to public service. At different times he held all of the town offices, was on county boards, and served as district representative in the state legislature during the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies. He was born in 1848 and was married to Electa A. Labour in 1875. He died in 1918. The couple had two children: Gertrude, who married R. W. Houck, and Margaret, who married Harry Parker of Independence, Iowa.

A granddaughter of Benjamin Franklin and Electa Stoddard is Bernice (Mrs. Dan Hogan), whose parents were Gertrude (Stoddard) and R. W. Houck.

Stoddard Family -- Isaac A. Stoddard* came to the Jesup area from Gales Ferry, Connecticut, by way of McGregor, in 1867. He married Celia Curtis. Their children were Benjamin Franklin, Mary May, and Isaac Carlton.

Isaac's son Benjamin Franklin* married Electa A. Labour in 1875. He died in 1918. The couple had two children—Gertrude, who married R. W. Houck, and Margaret, who was a nurse in various hospitals before she married Harry Parker of Independence. The family were active Methodists, Republicans, and Masons.

Mary May Stoddard, daughter of Isaac A. and Celia, married N. R. Reynolds of LaVerne, Minnesota.

Isaac Carlton Stoddard, born in 1856, married Ella M. Sayles in 1881. He was killed in a farm accident in 1896, leaving his wife and four children—Celia, Guy, Coral, and Vine. Celia was born in 1883 and died in 1903.

Guy Carlton Stoddard,* elder son of Isaac C. and Ella (Sayles) Stoddard, was born in 1885, and lived on the home farm all of his life, taking over the operation of the farm after his father's death. He married Beulah Maude Dunlap (born in 1889), daughter of William S. and Edith (Logan) Dunlap, in 1910. Their children, Carlton and Margaret, graduated from Jesup High School and are now living in Florida and Connecticut, respectively. Guy died in 1973.


Coral Mabel Stoddard was born in 1887, daughter of Isaac C. and Ella (Sayles) Stoddard. She was a lifelong teacher, starting in local country schools and completing her career as a college instructor at Wayne State University, Wayne, Nebraska. After retiring, she returned to Jesup where she made her home until her death in 1971.

Vine Murat Stoddard* was born in 1892, son of Isaac C. and Ella (Sayles) Stoddard, and married Hazel Maud Potwin (born in 1889), daughter of Monroe and Maud (Emery) Potwin, in 1917. They were both teachers prior to their marriage. Vine then became a rural mail carrier until his retirement. Vine died in 1967 and Hazel in 1975. They had two sons, Gilbert V. and Philip M. Stoddard.

Gilbert V. Stoddard,* the elder son of Vine and Hazel (Potwin) Stoddard, was a rural mail carrier. He married Marian Magner in 1942. They have two sons: Gregory, a pilot with a commercial airline in Newark, New Jersey; and Richard, a partner in a law firm in Denver, Colorado. Richard married Kae Ethridge of Denver in 1979. They have one daughter, Gregor, born in 1983.

Philip Monroe Stoddard,* born in 1923, the younger son of Vine and Hazel Stoddard, married Frances Wheatly in 1950. She was the mother of Kay and Brad (Bud), whom Philip adopted. Frances was killed in an automobile accident in 1956. At the present Philip is a bus driver for the Jesup Community School.




