DEATH OF MAHLON HARVEY

An Upright Man and Useful Citizen Goes to His Rest

The body of Hon. Mahlon Harvey was brought from Rochester, Minn., Sunday evening, and was buried in the Sibley cemetery Tuesday afternoon. The funeral was largely attended. Services were held in the M. E. church and the Masonic order performed its ritual at the grave.

Mr. Harvey died at Cook's hotel, an adjunct of the Mayo hospital in Rochester, Saturday night.

About a month before his death Mr. Harvey's acquaintances were surprised to learn that he had been taken to Rochester for surgical treatment. He was rugged looking for a man of 68 years and never complained of illness. Yet a post mortem investigation disclosed that he had suffered from cirrhosis of the liver and from acute nephritis, either of which spelled death, and that the end was hastened by pneumonia, which attacked him in his weakness. He was not considered fit to go under the surgeon's knife after his arrival in Rochester and was not operated upon.

Mr. Harvey was born in St. Lawrence county, N. Y., in August, 1844, and grew to manhood in his native state. He came to Osceola county in the early 70s and settled upon a farm in East Holman township which he never left. A wife and a son survive him.

Mr. Harvey was a man of the strictest probity and a very useful citizen. In his early life he taught school. Irving Bacheller, the author, was one of his pupils. All his days he was interested in educational affairs and for many years served his neighborhood as a school director. For the past six years, ever since Osceola county was made a representative district, he represented the county in the general assembly of Iowa. He was of sane judgment, a strong but not bitter partisan, not easily moved by excitement nor given to moods; frank in the expression of his opinions, but tolerant of the views of others, with a large capacity for friendship and abounding charity, he steadily pursued an honorable career, and was most loved by those who best knew him.
