

FATHER AND SON GONE

Edward and Gordon Hayes, Prominent Citizens and
Business Partners, Passed Away
Within Few Hours

BUSINESS HOUSES CLOSED YESTERDAY FOR FUNERAL SERVICES

Edward Hayes, pioneer of Montgomery county, prominent in the devel-
opment of the community, died at his home, Valley and Broad-sts., about 11
o'clock Sunday morning, March 25, after having been confined to his home
for several months.

Gordon Hayes, son of Edward Hayes, his business partner, likewise
prominent, associated with his father in the development of the community,
and combining his father's ideas with those which he believed fitted the
conditions of the present day, died Monday morning about two o'clock from
heart trouble at his home on Boundary-st., at Prospect, after illness of but
a few hours.

The death of Edward Hayes, coming as it did, after months of failing
health, and at his age, was not unexpected, but that of Gordon Hayes, appar-
ently rugged and always active, came as a shock to the community.

The funerals of both Edward and Gordon Hayes were held yesterday
(Thursday) afternoon, business houses in Red Oak closing during the hour
of service. Rev. Carl A. Glover, of the Congregational church, conducted the
services. Those of Edward Hayes were private and held at the home at
two o'clock, where the family services in memory of Gordon Hayes
were also held.

Gordon Hayes' funeral was held at the Congregational church at three
o'clock, Rev. Carl Glover, preaching the sermon, and music being by the
choir of the church. The pallbearers were J. C. Brown, Philo D. Clark, Dr.
E. T. Will, Ralph Pringle, Hiram C. Houghton, Jr., and J. R. Loomis. Those
who were here from a distance to attend the funeral included Miss Alice
Hayes, New York; Mr. and Mrs. Benj. B. Clark, who were sojourning in Florida;
Chas. Carey, spending the winter in California; Mrs. G. G. Trowbridge,
