H. C. LOUNSBERRY, LAWYER, FORMER LEGISLATOR, DIES

Prominent in Republi- can Politics of County 25 Years Ago

H. C. Lounsberry, 63, Marshalltown attorney, former state legislator and prominent in republican politics of Marshall county a quarter of a century ago, died at 5 o'clock this morning in the university hospital at Iowa City. Mr. Lounsberry had been in failing health for several years and decided to enter the hospital at Iowa City after attending the graduation exercises at the state university June 7 when his daughter Irene was awarded her degree.

He submitted to an operation June 14 and last Friday Mrs. Lounsberry and children were called to Iowa City and were at his bedside when death came.

Two Terms in Assembly.

Mr. Lounsberry represented Marshall county as state representative in the 34th and 35th general assemblies which convened in 1911 and 1913. His previous political experience was gained as clerk of the district court in Marshall county, to which he was elected in 1905, retiring in 1909, and the following year was selected to the state legislature. While in the legislature he helped to codify the laws of the state.

After serving two terms he retired from politics for several years, but again sought public office in 1920 when he was a candidate for the republican nomination for state senator from this district upon the completion of the two terms served by W. H. Arney. He failed to gain the nomination, however, and again in 1928 was unsuccessful in seeking the republican senatorial nomination.

His legislative experience also included service as journal clerk of the house of representatives in the 27th assembly, journal clerk of the senate in the following term and assistant secretary of the senate in the 29th general assembly. In

county politics he served as a member of the county central republican committee and was a delegate to both state and judicial republican conventions.

Born in Hardin County.

Born on a farm in Hardin county just across the Marshall county line, June 14, 1874, he moved with his parents to a Marshall county farm when he was 2 years old. There were eight children in his father's family and young Lounsberry was unable to finish his course in the Marshalltown high school but took a job as a farm hand to earn money to put himself thru law school. He finally was able to enter Drake University, completed the two-year course in one year and was admitted to the bar in 1899.

He married Miss Nellie Stewart, at that time fourth grade teacher in the Anson school, in this city June 28, 1912. They were the parents of five children, Irene, Clara, Mary, Helen and Harold, Jr., all at home. The family home is at 503 West Main street.

Besides his widow and children he is survived by a sister, Mrs. E. G. Andrews of Knoxville, and four brothers, Claude of Ames, Carl of St. Louis, Mo., Vance of Denver, Col., and Dr. Ray Lounsberry of San Diego, Calif., who is now studying in Europe.

The body will be brought to this city for burial but funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Army Worms Eat Four Acres of Five Acre Alfalfa Field

Army worms have destroyed about four acres of a five acre plot of alfalfa on the G. W. Van Voorhis farm, two miles north and the quarters of a mile east of Lisco in southern Grundy county.

Mr. Van Voorhis noticed a streak of yellow running thru his field Saturday and investigated. He found dark colored worms with yellow spots and took several of them to Lou Plager, county agent. Mr. Plager immediately identified them as army worms. Mr. Van Voorhis brought back a supply of poison bran, with which to combat the army worm menace. But by morning practically four acres of alfalfa field has been destroyed by the worms, which eat away the roots of the plant and leave the tops to wither away in the sun. It was a streak of this withered hay that caused Mr. Van Voorhis to investigate.

Mr. Plager reported that the army worm is working in many fields in Grundy county. He is instructing farmers to place the poison bran around fields where the worms are working. In this way the worms are poisoned as they move from field to another.

One other case of army worms was reported earlier this year at the E. E. Robinson farm in Eldon township.

While army worms have not made their appearance again on the borders of Marshall county, so grain and corn have made a remarkable growth in the last few days. The cool, damp weather of early June was perfect for the development of small grain and in many fields the oats are so heavy that they are going down. Corn, apparently retarded somewhat by the same sort of weather that made heavy small grain crop, has been booming along in the last three or four days, and in many fields in this section is already knee high.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare a resolution commemorating the life, character and public services of the late Hon. J. E. McMillan of Benton county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following:

J. E. McMillan, the son of pioneers of Benton county, was born in Harrison township, Benton county, Iowa, November 16, 1860. He was educated in the country schools of that day. On November 2, 1882, he was united in marriage with Miss Nora I. Pitts. To them were born five children, Leslie, Lawrence, Nancy, Glen, and Wilhelmina. Mr. McMillan followed the occupation of farming all the active years of his life. He was a member of the board of directors and chairman of the Farm Bureau of Benton county for many years. He was also county chairman of the campaign to eradicate bovine tuberculosis. Mr. McMillan was always interested in and an advocate of good roads. He made a drag patterned after the one invented by Mr. King of Missouri and used it to drag the roads in front of his farm for several years before the road officials paid for dragging the roads. His was a deeply religious nature. As a young man he united with the Prairie Creek Church of Christ and was always active in the work of the church, being one of a group of people who made possible an active country church that has survived the inroads of the automobile and modern methods of communication on the country churches. He was always a very loyal republican and in 1926 was elected to the House of Representatives, serving in the Forty-second, Forty-second Extra, and Forty-third General Assemblies. His wife preceded him in death several years and since that time he made his home with one or the other of his children. He had planned to spend the winter with his daughter in Arizona, but illness came upon him from which he never recovered and he passed away on the 11th day of January, 1938. His mortal remains were brought back to Iowa where they were interred beside those of his wife in the Bear Creek Cemetery which is in the same township in which Mr. McMillan was born and spent his entire life.



The Lounsberry's were survived by five children, Irene Eudora, Clara Louise, Jean, Helen Ruth, and Harold Claire. All the children were born at 412 North 2nd Avenue, but for the youngest, Harold Jr., born at 503 West Main.

Irene Eudora Lounsberry was born October 9, 1913 in Marshalltown. Irene received her Liberal Arts degree in History and Elementary Education from the University of Iowa. In 1941 while teaching school in Algona, Irene met John L. Mowry. Women in 1941 were asked to resign before marriage. Upon leaving her position, Irene and John were married June 7, 1941 at 503 West Main, Irene's family home. Irene and her siblings cared for their invalid mother for eighteen years until her death. Irene was active in the American Association of University Women, Daughters of the American Revolution, and Eastern Star. Her love of reading was shared by serving on the Library Board. Her love of "birding" was shared by many friends.

One daughter, Madelyn Eudora, was born on December 21, 1942. Her father, John, heard the name Madelyn during a trial in a New York City court room and said "The alliteration sounds so nice." Madelyn received a B.A. degree in Elementary Education from the University of Iowa and taught school for about eight

years in the Iowa City School district and the State Center School district. She married Stephen Robert Irvine October 20, 1963, who practiced law with his father-in-law at Mowry and Irvine until John Mowry's death November 1, 1995. Steve and Madelyn have two children Kristin Elizabeth and John Robert. Kristin has three children Mitchell, Stephen and Haley. John Irvine graduated from Northwestern University, Evanston, IL in 1996 and is attending The University of Iowa College of law. Madelyn has been active in community activities.

The family home at 503 West Main, where all the Lounsberry children were married and where two other descendants were married, is still owned by Madelyn Mowry Irvine a grand daughter of Harold and Nellie.

Ludlow, Lucius and Alwilda J. (Patterson)

The Ludlow heritage began in Ireland. First members of the family to come to America settled in the state of Vermont and spent the remainder of their lives there. Richard Ludlow was born in December, 1821, a son of an early family, and married Amanda M. Johnson, daughter of Thomas Johnson and Roxanna Smith Johnson, both natives of Vermont, who spent the major part of their lives in that state. Two children were born to this union: Lucius Ransom, born in Cuyahoga County, OH May 10, 1845, and Althea Arvilla, who died June 22, 1891. Richard died in Wisconsin in 1888. Amanda's death occurred in 1901.

Frank Ransom Ludlow, second son of Lucius and Alwilda Ludlow, was born October 18, 1876. He married Sarah Rebecca Jontz of Jasper County on December 22, 1898. Sarah was born November 26, 1877, a daughter of Robert Fulton and Rachel Louisa Crawford Jontz. Sarah died February 1, 1953 and is buried in the Baxter Cemetery. They were the parents of three children — Earl Ransom, born October 6, 1899, who married Mildred Sumpter and they settled at Baxter; Marie Blanche Ludlow (Mrs. Omer Medhus), born April 19, 1902; and Maurice Allen, born January 20, 1905, who married Barbara Weidner and settled southwest of Gilman.

She moved to Baxter in 1909 and finished her education there, but came to Gilman every summer to her grandfather's (Lucius Ludlow's) home and stayed with his housekeeper, Ruth Fagan, while Lucius went to South Dakota for carpenter work with a cousin J.L. Johnson, a nephew of his mother, Amanda (Johnson) Ludlow.

Alwilda Patterson Ludlow passed away March 4, 1884. Lucius Ludlow died July 4, 1919, leaving 100 acres of land to one son, Samuel, the other 100 acres to another son, Frank. This is the farm where Frank brought his wife and children in 1920. When he discontinued farming he did carpentry work in the area until his

MILLHISER, JOHN, farmer, S. 30; P. O. Marshalltown; born in Wurttemberg, Germany, Jan. 3, 1808; when about 9 years of age, his parents took passage at Amsterdam for America, but the winds being contrary, they were driven high up in the North Sea, all the masts carried away, and they were at the mercy of the waves; they finally got into the port of Bergen, Norway, where they wintered, and the next Summer, after harvest, chartered a vessel to

go to Philadelphia, on condition that the passengers be sold for the passage. His parents and sister were accordingly sold to serve four years each, and he to serve until he was 21 years old; he was in charge of a Quaker, and worked on a farm. When the time was up, he went to Ohio, where his parents had previously moved, but having forgotten his native tongue, was unable to converse with them, and had to again learn the German language. The next Spring, he returned to Pennsylvania, and during the five years following, made three trips to Ohio, and returned, but finally located in Ohio. Was married Feb. 6, 1840, to Margaret Raub, who was born in Ohio; they have five children living—Wm. B., Henry R., Christian C., Malinda H. and John L. Mr. M. and wife are members of the Evangelical Association. In 1856, they moved to Mercer Co., Penn., and remained until 1870, when they came to this county. The children are all well located near him. Owns 210 acres of land, valued at \$6,300.
