Frank Aloysius O'Connor, 78, senior partner in the law firm of O'Connor, Thomas, McDermott and Wright, died at 9:25 p.m. Sunday at his residence, 390 Grandview Ave., after an illness of six weeks.

Friends may call at the residence from where services will be at 10 a. m. Tuesday to St. Joseph's Church. Burial will be in Mt. Olivet Cemetery. Arrangements are by the Didesch Funeral Home.

An Iowa Democratic leader and a former Iowa legislator, as well as an outstanding laymen in activities of the Catholic Church in the Archdiocese of Dubuque, O'Connor, for many years served the federal government as general counsel for the Farm Credit Administration and later became head of all its operations, including its various banks.

Knight of St. Gregory

He was named a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory by Pope Pius XII in 1945.

Mr. O'Connor was born Aug. 2, 1875, at Independence, Ia., son of Timothy and Ellen Curran O'Connor. He was the sixth of 13 children. When a child he went to Lawler, Ia., to visit his grandfather and the visit turned out to be permanent. It was there he graduated from high school. He attended the Iowa City Academy and went on to the University of Iowa where he took special work in the College of Liberal Arts and with it his law lectures. He graduated in

DES MOINES (P)—Iowa had 369 deaths from cancer of the respiratory tract, generally known as lung cancer during 1952 — an increase of 25 per cent in two years. This was reported Monday by the

O'Connor served as a representative from Chickasaw County in the state legislature from 1908 to 1912, being minority leader of the house in 1911 and 1912. In 1912 he was delegate-at-large from Iowa to the Democratic national convention at Baltimore, Md., and in 1932 was chairman of the Iowa delegation at Chicago, Ill. In 1940 he placed the name of Henry Wallace in nomination for vice president.

He was on the Iowa governor's council of defense during the world War I years of 1917 and 1918.

He began his federal service in 1934, when he became general counsel for the Farm Credit Administration at Omaha, Neb., and later that year became its general agent, filling the post until June 1, 1937. In that position he was responsible for the entire operations of the FCA, including the four credit banks set up by the congressional act. He served as chairman of the boards of these banks — the Federal Land Bank of Omaha, the Omaha Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, the Production Credit Bank of Omaha and the Omaha Bank for Cooperatives.

He returned to private practice in 1937.

U. S. Attorney

While at New Hampton he was county attorney from 1902 to 1906, and from January 1, 1914, when he still was at New Hampton until May 1, 1922, he was U. S. attorney for the Northern District of Iowa.

He was a past president of the Dubuque Chamber of Commerce, a member of the board of governors of the School of Religion at

Males Lead

As was true nationally the preponderance of lung cancer fatalities in this state was among men—291 males as against 78 females.

The total number of Iowans between 50 and 70 interviewed in the ACS study was 10,573. Iowa was one of the states selected for the study because of its good diagnostic facilities.

"Remarkable Feat"

Dr. E. Cuyler Hammond, director of statistical research for the American Society, reported that the Iowa division accomplished a "truly remarkable feat" in successfully tracing and keeping track of 99.82 per cent of the men studied during the two years.

Volunteer groups were used in making the study. One of these was the sociology class at Westmar College, whose students interviewed 518 eligible men in Plymouth County.

2 Heads Roll From Package Left in Dump

WINONA, Minn. (UP) — Sheriff George Fort huddled with state Crime Bureau Chief John Tierney Monday to investigate two embalmed heads found wrapped in a newspaper at the Goodview village dump.

"We're stumped as of now," Fort said.

The heads were found by the dump caretaker Saturday. The package had been placed on level ground and when the caretaker kicked it the two heads rolled out.

One of the heads was that of a white man, about 70 years old, Fort said. It had skin, teeth and hair. The other head was that of an elderly negro man.

Both heads had patches on them indicating they had been on

From Near Drowning

A Dubuquer's knowledge of artificial respiration may have saved the life of a 19-year-old Dubuque bather Sunday at Frentress Lake, a mile east of East Dubuque.

Jim Kraus, near-victim of the incident, said Monday morning he felt "all right" and would go back to work, but he added he was "a little sick last night." Kraus, an experienced swimmer, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter J. Kraus, 2515 Jackson St.

Pat Gilligan, 18, daughter of George Gilligan, 884 Loras Blvd., was swimming with Kraus and a girl friend about 2:30 p.m. near a cabin belonging to Pat's uncle, Walter Gilligan of East Dubuque, when the youth was stricken by a cramp and slipped from an innertube about 75 feet from shore. Pat said she reached Kraus after swimming eight or 10 strokes and tried to hold him up. "He was too heavy, though," she said. "But the men in the boat got there, pulled Jim through his innertube, and towed him to shore."

Call Resuscitator

Dale Nilles and William Klotz with Mrs. Nilles, all of 1995 Asbury Rd. in Dubuque, had witnessed the incident from shore, and the two men had set out in a boat to aid the faltering youth. They pulled Kraus to shore, and Nilles started giving artificial respiration while the East Dubuque resuscitator was called. Nilles, a telephone company employe, recently completed a Red Cross course required by the company, Mrs. Nilles said Monday. He removed a partial dental plate that was choking the youth and a diving mask that had slipped over Kraus's mouth. He also treated Kraus for shock.

Nilles kept up artificial respiration about a half hour, witnesses said, and then the resuscitator was applied. About 3:15 p.m., 45 minutes after the near-drowning started, Kraus was on his feet.

Uncle Collapses

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Frank A. O'Connor, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Frank A. O'Connor was born at Independence, Iowa, August 2, 1875. He attended public and parochial schools at Lawler, Iowa, the Iowa City Academy and the State University of Iowa, graduating in the law school in 1898. He was admitted to the Bar the following year, and with William Avery Smith, now a member of the Iowa Supreme Court, opened a law office and practiced law at New Hampton, Iowa. This partnership continued for 44 years, and in 1918 they moved to Dubuque, Iowa.

Mr. O'Connor was elected county attorney for Chickasaw County in 1902 and re-elected in 1904. He was elected State Representative from Chickasaw County and served in the Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth General Assemblies, becoming minority party leader of the Democrats in the session of 1911. In May, 1922, he became United States Attorney for the district of northern Iowa. He was delegate-at-large from Iowa to the Democratic National Convention at Baltimore in 1932. He was chairman of the Iowa Delegation of the Democratic National Convention at Chicago in 1940, and placed the name of Henry Wallace of Iowa in nomination for vice president.

Mr. O'Connor served on the Iowa Governor's Council of Defense in World War I during 1917 and 1918. In 1934 he entered federal service, becoming general counsel for the Farm Credit Administration at Omaha and later became its general agent, being responsible during this time for the operation of the FCA, including the four credit banks set up by the congressional act. He served in this capacity until June 1, 1937.

He was president of the Dubuque Chamber of Commerce, member of the Board of Governors of School of Religion at the University of Iowa, and trustee and member of the Board of Regents of Loras College.

He was united in marriage on November 24, 1904, to Mary Agnes McNevin of Minneapolis, Minnesota, who, with a son Gerald, was killed April 6, 1934 in an auto-train collision.

Mr. O'Connor died at his home in Dubuque, Iowa, June 20, 1954. Surviving are his wife, the former Mrs. Mabel Conover, whom he married in March, 1939; his two sons, Charles E. and Francis J. O'Connor of Dubuque; five grandchildren; three brothers and four sisters.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of Iowa: That in the passing of the Honorable Frank A. George O'Donnell was born at Freeport, Illinois, on September 28, 1870. He passed away at Carroll, Iowa, on August 17, 1953.

He came with his parents to Carroll County as a young boy where he lived on a farm. His early education was received in the schools of Maple River Township and St. Joseph Catholic school, Carroll, Iowa. He was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church and charter member of Charles Carroll Council Knights of Columbus, Carroll, Iowa. He was a farmer and later was employed by the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad as superintendent of construction. He was a township trustee of Maple River Township for six years and was well known for his community service. He was elected State Representative from the fifty-fifth district of Iowa on the Democratic ticket from Carroll County to serve in the Forty-third and Forty-fourth General Assemblies.

Mr. O'Donnell is survived by two brothers, T. B. O'Donnell of Anthon, Iowa and E. J. O'Donnell of Sioux City, Iowa; also a sister, Nell O'Donnell of Carroll, Iowa.

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
