Grant Chapman, of Bagley, one of this county's most noted residents, was taken by death early Tuesday morning at his farm home southwest of Bagley.

Mr. Chapman, 77, had spent a lifetime in an effort to better the farm conditions of his community and the nation and he succeeded to a marked degree.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock in the Methodist Church in Bagley and were conducted by Rev. Paul Ellis. Interment was in Dodge cemetery where the Masonic Burial Service was read by Carroll Thonburg of Linden and was attended by a large group of persons.

Casket bearers were Harley Gilman, Ace Mychreest, Ben Erps, Frank Montgomery, Maurice Cornish and Ralph Jackson.

U. S. GRANT CHAPMAN

U. S. Grant Chapman was born in Salem, Indiana, November 5, 1862 and passed away August 26, 1940 at his home near Bagley. He was 77 years of age.

Mr. Chapman's parents were C. G. Chapman and Mary Hancock Chapman and he was one of a family of four girls and five boys. The family moved to Carroll county, Ill., in 1873 where he received his education.

In February, 1890, he came to Bagley where he was manager of a grain elevator for several years. Mr. Chapman was united in marriage to Harriet Hoover King in July, 1892, and to this union one son, Ralph King Chapman, was born.

The family moved to their farm south of Bagley where Mr. Chapman took an active interest in the community. He helped organize the first telephone company and the first rural mail route in the township and served as a township trustee. In 1913 he was elected State Representative from Guthrie county and served in the 25th General Assembly. He was the first president of the State Farm Bureau Assn. and helped organize the state for Farm Bureau work. During the
