Rites Held for

J. E. Doze, 96

BURIAL AT MT. AYR
ON SATURDAY

Funeral services were held Saturday for Joseph E. Doze, 96, life-long resident of Decatur and Wayne counties. Until his death Thursday morning he had been in very good health except for the last two weeks. During that two weeks he had been confined to the Decatur County hospital at Leon but had returned home the Sunday before his death appearing very much improved.

He was born in 1845 at High Point in Decatur county where he lived during his youth. His earlier years were spent teaching school and clerking in a store. He was engaged in the implement business at Mt. Ayr for a number of years and served as County Superintendent of Schools and Ringgold County Auditor.

In 1890 he moved to Humeston where he operated a machine shop and foundry. In 1909 he founded the oldest distributing agency for the Ford automobile in the Des Moines territory. He served several terms as a State Legislature while continuing with his business.

He was a member of the Christian church.



He leaves his wife, Elizabeth, one daughter, Mrs. F. L. Clark, of Iowa City, Iowa; one son, Lynn, of Humeston; two grandsons, Paul D. Clark of Audubon and Joe Dean Doze of Humeston; and two great grandsons. One daughter and one son preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held in the Christian church conducted by Rev. W. W. McReynolds and Kenneth Mitchell of Garden Grove representing the Order of Masons. Music was furnished by the Christian church choir, composed of Charles Humeston, Sr., Ralph Gardner, Willard and Charles Humeston.

OBITUARY

ORVILLE A. DILLON

Orville Albert Dillon, son of Jesse A. and Ada Dillon, was born near Carl in Adams County, Iowa, on Dec. 6, 1905. His death occurred on April 16, 1950 at Des Moines, Iowa.

He grew up in the Carl community, attending high school at Corning and graduating with the class of 1926. He later attended Simpson College finishing the course there in 1930.

On June 3, 1928 he was married to Helen Bonnett of Chariton, Iowa. To them were born two children, Richard Owen and Marjory Alice.

In 1930 Reverend Dillon began his ministry in the Des Moines Conference, later the Iowa-Des Moines Conference. He was admitted on trial in 1931. He was ordained deacon in 1933 and elder in 1935. For twenty years this relationship continued although there was a period of 3 1/2 years when he was not in active service due to illness. During his ministry he held pastorates at Cambria, Tingley, Blakesburg, Webster, Attica, Shannon City, and Cumberland Pine Grove. This year marked the third at the latter place.

It was last December during the busy preparation period for the observance of Christmas that Reverend Dillon suffered the physical break which finally resulted in his death. During the intervening period neighboring pastors and laymen supplied the pulpits of his churches. Notable assistance was rendered by Brother Claude Spry of Wota who gave generously of his time and services that the church program might be maintained.

To use a familiar phrase to the members of the annual conference we can say of Orville Dillon "nothing against him". He was devoted to the christian ministry and carried the responsibilities assigned to him faithfully and well. He was particularly interested in the program of youth. He loved young people. His interest in music is well known. He was perfectly capable of conducting his church choir and often did. In fact he was conducting a Copland Cantata when the last illness overtook him.
