Funeral for Niles Ihrke Held Here


Funeral services for Niles L. Ihrke, 66, lifelong resident of the Lake City community, were held Monday morning at Huffman Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Carl Jensen, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Lake City cemetery with military honors by the Lake City V. F. W. post.

Mr. Ihrke died at 12:30 a. m. Friday, March 20, at Veterans Administration Hospital in Des Moines, following a long illness. He had been a farmer before moving to Lake City several years ago. A veteran of both World Wars, he served in the Army Air Corps in the first and in the Navy in the second.

Surviving are his wife, Rose; two sons, Raymond, Dexter, Minn.; and Wayne, Lake City; two grandchildren; two brothers, Robert Ihrke, Lake City and Lynn Ihrke, Portland, Oregon. One brother, Clinton, is deceased.

John W. Jacobs, Lifetime Resident Of Lake City, Dies Here at 92

John W. Jacobs, 92, retired attorney and former state legislator, died early Sunday morning, March 22, at McVay Memorial hospital, where he had been a patient since March 21, 1963. He was a life-time resident of this community.

The son of Henry F. and Margaret Lawrence Jacobs, he was born on a farm in Jackson township southwest of Lake City on August 7, 1871.

His early education was gained in a rural school where he attended classes intermittently during the months of the year when he was not needed to assist with the farm work. He completed the courses offered in the Lake City public school prior to the time that formal graduation ceremonies were held.

After teaching in a rural school west of Lake City, he attended Drake University in Des Moines, where he won top honors in oratorical contests. With an unusual natural ability for mathematics he pursued a course in civil engineering and after two years was awarded a bachelor of science degree.

To satisfy a compelling urge to become a lawyer, he enrolled in the University of Iowa College of Law and was admitted to the Iowa bar in 1896.

Practiced Law For 44 Years
Shortly after returning to Lake City to start the practice of law, he became associated with the late M. E. Hutchison in a law partnership which continued with great success until 1910 when Mr. Hutchison became a district court judge.

In 1915 Mr. Jacobs became associated with the late Marion R. McCaulley in a law partnership that continued successfully until his retirement in 1940.

During his legal career he became known throughout Iowa for his outstanding ability. His oratory, ringing always with the sound logic of truth, carried conviction to the minds of

continuing devotion for his profession, his clients and his cause. The fee he might receive for his sparkling talents was of little concern. His never-ending worry was always whether he had turned every stone and driven every nail in support of his client.

Though slight in stature, he displayed a powerful personality and a wealth of knowledge: "He never cast much of a physical shadow but he certainly cast many fatal legal shadows over the heads of worried opponents," was a most appropriate observation made by a fellow-member of the Iowa bar.

For many years Mr. Jacobs served as drainage attorney for Calhoun county.

In 1956 he was recognized for a 50-year period of membership in the Iowa State Bar Association.

A strong Republican, he participated prominently in politics on local, state and national levels, attending the national

Gives Report on 1963 Seals Sale

The total for the county was \$3,398.44 which is \$61.41 less than received in the 1962 campaign.

convention of the party in 1928 as a delegate from Iowa.

He served three terms as a representative from Calhoun county in the Iowa legislature, where he made an outstanding and lasting record.

Mr. Jacobs served four terms as mayor of Lake City. During his first year, in 1897, he was instrumental in procuring electrical and telephone service for the town.

A man of unlimited energy and ambition, he gave countless hours of service to civic organizations, Red Cross and War Savings campaigns and the development of community projects. As a public speaker he was much in demand throughout this area.

Although his physical activity was curtailed in his declining years, he never lost interest in current events on all levels, keeping well informed on every subject. His interest in farming and agriculture was carried on in the operation of farm land in Jackson township.

Mr. Jacobs was married November 17, 1898 to Bertha A. Coe, a native of Woodbine. Also a Drake University graduate, she was professor of language and literature in the Woodbine Normal College prior to her marriage. Mrs. Jacobs departed this life in 1947.

Mr. Jacobs is survived by his two daughters, Catherine Jacobs Cavanaugh of Topeka, Kansas and Jean Keir of Sac City; four grandchildren, John and Ann Cavanaugh and John and Cathy Keir; a niece, Mrs. John (Elizabeth Cook) Warburton of Newton, who made her home with the Jacobs family for a number of years; and his sons-in-law, Dr. John Cavanaugh and Walter Keir.

Preceding him in death were his parents, his wife, a sister, Ella Jacobs Cook and a brother, Walter Jacobs.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Huffman Memorial Chapel with the Rev. C. O. Stuckenbruck in charge. Interment was in the Lake City cemetery.

John R. Grey, 73, Of Auburn Dies


