E. P. Malmberg Former Mayor Of Newton, Dies

Funeral services were held recently for Edward Phillip Malmberg, 312½ S. Peninsula Drive, 88, of Daytona Beach, Fla., a former mayor of New-ton and member of the Iowa State legislature.

Private services were held at Baggett-McIntosh in Daytona Beach, with Fr. Knox Brumby, rector of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, conducting the services. Memorials to the Kiwanis Scholarship Fund were accept-ed.

Survivors were his wife, An-nie of Daytona Beach; a son, Phillip G. of Cocoa Beach, Fla.; a daughter, Mrs. Edan-nalle Ashford of Daytona Beach; and two grandchildren.

A native of Newton, Mr. Malmberg moved to Daytona Beach in 1930 and practiced law.

Mr. Malmberg was a former county attorney in Jasper County and a former mayor of Newton.

He served as a member of the Iowa State Legislature for 12 years.

Mr. Malmberg, member of the Florida Bar Association, had been a partner in the ab-stract business of Malmberg and Bailey.

The partnership was the start of what is now the Maytag Loan and Abstract Co.

Mrs. Horace H. Morrison headed the abstract business for Mr. Malmberg.

Mr. Malmberg was the first president of the Kiwanis Club when it was organized in 1922 and, was a former field repre-sentative of the Kiwanis Inter-national and one of the organi-zers of the First Kiwanis Club in Daytona Beach.

He was a graduate of Iowa State University and was a 32nd degree Mason.
