# U.S. Pilots Blast Down Nine MIGs

## Allied Fighter-Bombers Hurl Crushing Aerial Blow at Border City

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — U. S. Sabre Jet pilots Monday reported they shot down nine Russian-made MIG 15 Jets, probably destroyed another and damaged two in air battles over North Korea.

The Air Force also announced that Allied fighter-bombers hurled a crushing aerial blow at the Red industrial complex at Sinuiju, near the Manchurian border. Targets included an oxygen plant, an alcohol distillery and a rope factory.

The jet battle pitted an unannounced number of Sabres against more than 80 MIGs.

### Bag 44.

The new figures raise the Fifth Air Force's reported total of MIGs destroyed in September to 42. The record for a month is 44, set last April.

The fighter-bomber attack was made within sight of the big Red airfields at Antung, just across the Yalu River from Sinuiju. The Air Force said it drew hordes of Communist interceptors into action.

Twenty four F-84 Thunderjets hit Sinuiju in mid-afternoon to get the assault underway. They dropped tons of high explosives and fired thousands of machine-gun bullets into the targets.

Pilots reported dense clouds of smoke after the first bombing runs.

### To Manchuria Doorstep.

The latest attack is one of a series of trip-hammer aerial blows against targets right up to the doorstep of Manchuria.

U. S. Navy planes Sunday paid a return visit to Hoeryang, less than two miles from Manchuria, and turned several warehouses and a power station into smoking ruins.

A. M. McColl, 94, former state senator and longtime member of the State Board of Control, died Sunday about 8:30 p. m. at his home in Woodward.

Mr. McColl had been in failing health since May but had been seriously ill only a week. His death was attributed to his advanced age.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. in Woodward with the Rev. W. H. Meredith of the Methodist Church officiating. Burial will be at the Woodward Cemetery. The Hooker Funeral Home has charge of the arrangements.

### Public Service

Mr. McColl first began his career of public service at the age of 32 when he was elected Dallas County clerk, a position he held for six years. The late Ralph Joy also a Dallas County pioneer, served as deputy clerk.

Besides his wife, Mr. McColl is survived by his daughter, Mrs. E. Washington, D. C., and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. McColl was born July 21, 1835, at Onancock, Va. He came to Iowa with his parents in 1875 and settled with them on a farm which was part of the old Des Moines river claim near Woodward.

On Oct. 22, 1904, he was married to the former Bess Craft at a ceremony performed at the home of her parents. The couple began married life in the house where they have since lived.

## 50-Year Mason

Mr. McColl was a 50-year Mason and was affiliated with the Peaceful Lodge No. 454 of Woodward. He was also a member of the Woodward Lions Club.

For the past three years he reigned as king of the Daily Chief's Three-Quarter Century Club, an organization which honors persons past the age of 75.

Mr. McColl was preceded in death by his brothers, Charles and Wooster, and his twin brother, Don. Also preceding him were his sisters, Anna Stewart, Kate McVean, Clare Lousbaugh, and Marian Thornley, and his parents.

Recently a tract of land was donated to the town of Woodward for a park which bears the name and which will hereinafter be known to the people of Woodward as the most distinguished citizen. The park now has a shelter house and skating rink for the recreation of the town's young people with all the work for the project donated by Woodward residents.



On the 20th of June, 1899, at Ewing, Mr. Lytle was married to Miss Lena Klingemann, a daughter of Dr. J. C. Klingemann, of Papillion, Nebraska, and they have one child, Francis Kemp, born February 27, 1904.

Mr. Lytle holds membership in Landmark Lodge, A. F. & A. M., at Sioux City, and with the Odd Fellows lodge at Storm Lake, Iowa. He is also connected with the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks. He has always taken an active interest in politics and, while a republican, has ever maintained an independent stand, particularly in local and state campaigns. At all times he has been willing, actively and publicly, to support the men and measures that he considers for the best interests of the community. He figures prominently in club circles as a member of the Sioux City Boat Club, the Sioux City Country Club, the Crucible Club and the Commercial Club, and he is a director of the Sioux City Real Estate Association. He is a well known authority and has been frequently called to give expert opinion on water works and sewer construction throughout this section of the northwest. Mr. Lytle enjoys and merits the high respect which is uniformly given him. While he has been successful and acquired an enviable position among Sioux City's sound and substantial business men, his course has not been actuated solely by the desire to accumulate. He has ever been conscious of the rights of others and has as well displayed a generous spirit toward the needy and less fortunate in an unostentatious but substantial manner. His independence of action and his fidelity to his principles have commanded for him the goodwill and confidence of all fair-minded men. Plain in his taste, democratic in manner, there is nothing about him that savors of self-importance. He never forces his opinions upon others or dictates to them the policy that they must pursue. He is a thoroughly practical man whose general information covers a wide range. Nature endowed him with strong intellectual force and this, with a retentive memory, has largely counteracted the lack of his early educational advantages. Wide reading, too, has greatly promoted his knowledge. He is just in his opinions and integrity and honor are his watchwords in every relation of life.

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#### ANTHONY MILROY McCOLL.

Iowa has been signally favored in the class of men who have occupied her public positions, for on the whole they have been guided by high principles which have their root in patriotic devotion to the welfare of the commonwealth. Among those now occupying public office in Iowa is Anthony Milroy McColl, member of the board of control. He was born in Caledonia, New York, in 1858, a son of Hugh D. and Jean (Wooster) McColl, both of whom were natives of New York. In 1877 they removed westward to Iowa, settling in Dallas county, where the father followed the occupation of farming. Both he and his wife were of Scotch descent and have now passed away, the former dying in 1887, while the latter survived for twenty years, departing this life in 1907.

Anthony M. McColl acquired his education in the schools of his native town and was a young man of about nineteen years when he accompanied his parents to Iowa. He had been reared to the occupation of farming and followed that pursuit until about 1897, when he was elected clerk of the district court of Dallas county. He made so excellent a record during his first term that he was reelected

and at the close of his second term retired from office as he had entered it—with the confidence and goodwill of all concerned. He then turned his attention to the lumber and grain business at Woodward, Iowa.

Mr. McColl has always been active in politics since age conferred upon him the right of franchise and he became an advocate of republican principles. He was elected to represent the seventeenth district in the senate of the general assembly, serving through the thirty-fourth session as the successor of George Cosson, who resigned to become attorney general. At the close of that term he was reelected senator to the thirty-fifth general assembly and on the 1st of July, 1913, he was appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke.

On the 27th of October, 1905, Mr. McColl was united in marriage to Miss Bess C. Craft, by whom he has one child, Jean Milroy. The family attend the Presbyterian church and Mr. McColl holds membership with the Knights of Pythias and with the Masons, having attained the Knights Templar degree in the commandery. There have been no spectacular phases in his life, which has been devoted with persistency to his business affairs and to the faithful discharge of his official duties. He has a wide acquaintance and the sterling traits of his character are best indicated in the fact that his warmest friends are those who have known him longest.

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REV. D. J. HEELAN.

Rev. D. J. Heelan, a representative of the Catholic priesthood, pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel at Fonda, was born in Elton, County Limerick, Ireland, on the 1st of June, 1859, a son of John and Ann (Quish) Heelan. The father, who made farming his life work, is now deceased, but the mother survives.

Rev. D. J. Heelan was educated in the national schools of Ireland, in a local classical school and in St. Patrick's College at Thurles, County Tipperary, Ireland, where he was ordained on the 9th of July, 1882, for the diocese of Dubuque. He arrived in the city of Dubuque in September, 1882, and was assigned as assistant to St. Patrick's church, with which he was connected for six months. He was then appointed the first resident pastor of the Catholic church at Masonville in March, 1883, and remained there for four and one-half years. He next went to Delmar Junction, Clinton county, in October, 1887, and continued there for six years. On the expiration of that period he went to Barnum, Webster county, in December, 1893, continuing there for eleven years or until the 14th of February, 1905, when he removed to Fonda. Under his direction the present beautiful pressed brick church has been erected. This was built in 1907, and dedicated the same year at a cost of forty thousand dollars. In 1913 a handsome brick parish house was erected at a cost of ten thousand dollars. It contains fourteen rooms thoroughly modern and complete in every particular and equipment. There is no debt upon the church property, although sixty thousand dollars was raised in less than eight years, showing the energy and determination of the pastor and the hearty cooperation which he has received from his parishioners. He was also instrumental in building the Catholic church at Masonville in 1883 and the parochial residence in 1886. He also improved the church property and built a hall at Barnum. In connection

#### ANTHONY MILROY McCOLL

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable memorial commemorating the life and public service of the late Honorable Anthony Milroy McColl, begs leave to submit the following report:

Anthony Milroy McColl, public official, legislator and lumber and grain dealer, died at his home in Woodward, Iowa, on September 14, 1952.

He was born at Caledonia, New York, May 19, 1858; the American born parents, Hugh D. and Jane McColl, with their twin sons, Anthony and Donald, came to Dallas County, Iowa, in 1876, located on a farm near Woodward, and engaged at that place in the lumber and grain business. On October 3, 1903 he was married to Bess C. Craft at Woodward.

Elected in 1890, he served three terms as clerk of the Dallas County district court. He served one term in the Iowa Senate and in 1913 re-elected to that position, sitting as a member in the session that year, but resigned in June to accept appointment as a member of the State Board of Control, serving in that capacity by reappointment for 17 years, being its chairman several times.

Mr. McColl was instrumental in securing the location of the Woodward State Hospital and School at that place and active in all civic and municipal affairs, together with political movements in the county and state; served as a delegate from his county to every Republican state

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

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




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
