studied at the University of Iowa, receiving his bachelor of arts degree there in 1893 and his law degree in 1894. He returned to his home community, Center Point, to begin his law practice.

In 1905 Judge Ring was elected clerk of the Linn county district court, serving at Marion. After two terms as clerk he moved from Marion to Cedar Rapids where he practiced law until his elevation to the bench. Since 1915 he had been senior member of the law firm of Ring and Hann.

Served In Legislature.

From 1913-1917 Judge Ring was a member of the lower house of Iowa's legislature from Linn county. He was vice-chairman of the 1913 code commission and served as chairman of the judiciary committee during his second two-year term.

Judge Ring's fraternal interests were wide. In 1910-11 he was grand master of Iowa Odd Fellows. He was also connected with the Knights of Pythias and other lodge bodies and was a past president of the Conopus club.

His abilities won him distinction in the Methodist church, of which Judge Ring had been a lifelong active member. For many years he served as a member of the board of trustees of St. Paul's Methodist church of Cedar Rapids and was teacher of the Wesleyan Sunday school class there. His lay leadership in the church began when he served as superintendent for the Methodist Sunday school at Center Point, an office which he later held at St. Paul's. to turn the securities into dollars, however, meant marketing them in this country. In discussing the loan now authorized, Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau said recently that conditions in American markets had presented difficulties in this regard and that a loan at this time would be in order to secure the price of obtaining maximum value. Whether one loan will be adequate to meet all British needs was not stated. Morgenthau said Britain's obligations to United States manufacturers at the first year amounted to between \$1,000,000,000 and \$1,400,000,000, but he could not estimate how much this had been reduced in six months since then. Jones said the loan, for which the British pledged more than \$1,000,000,000 in collateral, will bear interest at the rate of three per cent annually and will mature in 10 years. Provision was made for a five-year extension, if two-thirds of the principal has been paid on the original maturity date. The loan was pledged by the British included securities of 61 United States corporations listed on the New York stock exchange, with an aggregate value of approximately \$250,000,000; unlisted securities of 16 United States corporations with an estimated value of \$115,000,000, and capital stock of 41 British-owned insurance companies in this country with an aggregate net worth of over \$180,000,000.

\$1,282,106 Is Budgeted For Cedar Rapids Schools

An appropriation of \$1,282,106 for 1942-43 operation of the Cedar Rapids public schools was approved by the board of education in a budget estimate filed Monday night.

Of this amount, the board asked \$1,222,106 in taxes, computed that

Largest item in the budget is \$803,600 for instruction; \$675,000 of which goes for teachers' salaries; \$13,000 for supplies; \$20,000 for supervising principals.

A hard, efficient worker, he achieved much in the development of the street system in Des Moines, the construction of Keosauqua Way, Avenue Frederick M. Hubbell, and many other projects of similar design, widening, improving, constructing. His terms of service in the streets department were notable also for the marked improvement in the lighting of the city streets.

HERBERT CLARENCE RING, jurist, died in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, July 20, 1941. Born on a farm near Center Point, Iowa, March 31, 1870, he was the son of Richard C. and Harriet A. Ring. Educated in the Center Point high school, he was graduated from the State University of Iowa in 1893, receiving his law degrees from that institution one year later. Entering the practice of law in Center Point, he served as clerk of the Linn County District Court 1904-08, after which period he settled in Cedar Rapids to practice. A member of the Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth general assemblies, 1913-17, Mr. Ring was elected in 1929 to the 18th Judicial District Court to which he was thrice re-elected and which position he held at the time of his death.

HARRY E. WILKINS, U.S. army officer, retired, died in Des Moines, August 15, 1941. A graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, he shortly rose to rank of captain; he went to the Philippines as assistant to the chief commissary in 1901. Assigned to different posts upon his return to this country, he served in Cuba from 1905-08, with the rank of Major. He was with the American expeditionary force which crossed the Mexican border in 1914 to Vera Cruz, as chief quartermaster. In May, 1917, as chief quartermaster and Lieutenant-Colonel, he sailed with General Pershing to France with the A.E.F. On his return to the United States in August, 1918, he was depot quartermaster in New York City, where he spent most of his time until his retirement in 1919, with the rank of Brigadier General.

Returning to Des Moines, Mr. Wilkins was associated with the Wilkins Bros. department store, served on the Iowa bonus board, and was a supervisor for the Des Moines Street Railway until his resignation in 1930. He was active in politics as well. He was buried in Arlington National Cemetery.
