Henry L. Brady of Perry Dead

PASSED AWAY AT PERRY HOSPITAL AFTER AN ILLNESS OF THREE MONTHS.

Many friends throughout the county regret to learn of the death of Henry Brady, Dallas county's representative in legislature twenty years ago. He was a noble citizen and was one of the county's most prominent men.

The Perry Daily Chief contains the following data pertaining to Mr. Brady's useful life:

"Henry L. Brady, 66, former Dallas county representative to the Iowa legislature and speaker at the house in the thirty-fifth general assembly, died Sunday morning at 5 a. m., at the King's Daughters hospital here, following a serious illness of three months. The death was due to diabetes from which he had been afflicted for many years.

"Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon, April 12, at 2 p. m., with the Rev. F. C. Edwards, pastor, officiating.

"Mr. Brady, prior to entering political service, was a prominent Dallas county farmer, and had resided in the county for 65 years. He was born in Polk county, the son of Thomas and Adeline E. (Mott) Brady. His father came to America from Ireland in 1848 and joined the gold rush to the west. Returning from the west he bought the old home farm southeast of this city.

"Henry Brady was educated in the rural schools of this county and in the Perry high school. He attended Iowa State college at Ames in 1886 and 1887, taking course in general science.

"He was first elected to the Iowa general assembly in 1910. Completing that term he was again elected in 1912 and served as speaker of the house. He was also chairman of the committee on rules and a member of the committees on ways and means, railroads and transportation, board of control, normal schools, agriculture, public health, banks, banking and mines and mining.

"While in the legislature he was the father of several measures which have stood the test of time. He authored the bill for a full crew and car limit on trains in Iowa and also the legislation providing for hog serum for the eradication of hog cholera. He was one of the most active and prominent legislators Dallas county has ever produced.

"Leaving politics he returned to the farm, where he remained until a few years ago when he retired, moving to this city. He has since maintained his residence here until stricken with a serious attack of diabetes.

"Mr. Brady was unmarried and is survived by one sister, Miss Mary Brady, with whom he made his home."

Henry L. Brady Died at Perry

Former Representative and Speaker of the House Passed Away After Long Illness

Henry L. Brady, one of the best known residents of Dallas county, died Sunday morning at the Kings Daughters hospital in Perry, following an illness of three months. He had been a sufferer from diabetes for a number of years and his death was due to that ailment. Mr. Brady was 66 years of age.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church in Perry Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Brady was prominent in Dallas county politics for many years. He was elected representative in 1910 and served two terms. During his second term he was chosen as speaker of the house. He fathered a number of important measures and was known as one of the most active legislators Dallas county has ever had. Until a few years ago he was engaged in farming, but for the past three or four years has been living in Perry. He was unmarried and is survived by one sister.
