THIEVES RAID TOWN OF WELDON

Gangsters Break Into Number of Business Places, Crack Safes and Pry Open Cash Registers.

It seems that they broke into the barber's garage first by prying open the door. Once inside they went to the office and supply room where they stole five gallons of oil and some tools. Next it appeared that they went to the Post-office, pried open the door and by means of a pipe wrench and big chisel.

TRAIN ACCIDENT RESULTS IN DEATH OF C. B. EGGLESTON

Former Well Known Citizen Died at Dixon, Illinois, July 2.—
 Funeral Here Sunday.

LAY ON THE TRACK ALL NIGHT
 Injured at 9:00 p. m.—Corded Crushed Foot—Crawled Three Miles—Picked Up and Taken to Hospital.

There was cause for much sorrow in Clarke county last Friday when a message was received announcing the death at Dixon, Illinois, of the Hon. C. B. Eggleston of New London, Iowa, former highly respected citizen of Clarke county. Mr. Eggleston died as the result of a railroad accident which occurred Monday, June 22, in the vicinity of Dixon, the particulars of which as related by him after being taken to the hospital are as follows: At the time of the accident, about 9 o'clock p. m. June 22, while he was en route from Wisconsin to his home at New London, Iowa, he became ill while on the train near Dixon. He went to the wash room in the front part of the car for a drink. When he grasped the knob of the open door leading to the vestibule a sway of the rapidly moving car slammed the door shut with Mr. Eggleston on the outside and he was thrown violently from the train landing on the ground in such manner as to have his right foot crushed by the wheels of the car. No one saw him fall and when he regained consciousness he was lying in the darkness by the railroad track and his crushed limb was bleeding profusely. He secured some willow sticks and corded his leg with a shoestrung. He lay by the tracks throughout the night with a heavy rain falling much of the time. At dawn the next morning, though weakened by the loss of blood and the night's exposure, he crawled about three miles down the tracks to a highway crossing where he was picked up some time later by parties passing in an automobile. He was taken to a Dixon hospital where his crushed leg was amputated. He revived after the operation and for a time it seemed that he might recover, but pneumonia and other complications set in and he passed away July 2.

The body, accompanied by grief-stricken members of his family, arrived in Osceola last Friday evening. Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Muir from the Osceola Christian church Sunday afternoon and the remains were laid to rest in Maple Hill cemetery. The funeral was attended by a large concourse of relatives and friends.

After running it awhile they moved to Fremont township where he purchased a farm of 192 acres upon which they continued to reside until their death.

Wagon Tears Wire Down.
 Considerable excitement was aroused last Friday morning when the big transfer wagon of the Adams Transfer Co., caught a low wire of the Iowa Southern Utilities Co., and pulled over a post carrying eight or nine wires of this company in front of the Osceola Sanitarium. One of the wires, stripped of its protective insulation fell barely missing the team pulling the wagon. However, in a short time the men of the electric company soon arrived and the damage was quickly repaired. Fortunately no primary wires were injured and so few were deprived of electric current.

J. L. BALDWIN IS CALLED BY DEATH

Well Known Pioneer Citizen Passes Away in an Osceola Hospital Last Friday.

For many months past Mr. Baldwin has been a patient sufferer of an incurable disease. As he was being brought from the railway station in an ambulance the curtains were raised that he might have a glimpse of old time friends seated beneath the trees in the city park. This seemed to afford him the greatest pleasure possible and he smiled repeatedly as he noted faces familiar to him.

In the departure of Joe Baldwin a home is deprived of a loving husband and a devoted father, and the community has lost one of its most progressive citizens. Perhaps you will regret that he could not have been permitted to spend a ripe and mature old age in comfortable retirement from the busy cares that had engrossed him all his manhood days.
