BLACK-HANDER CHANGES PLAN TO GET MONEY

Under Cover of Darkness
Steals Nick Coin's Bank
and Check Books.

BELIEVED SAME PERSON

All Banks of the City Were
Early Saturday Notified
of the Theft.

Failing in his threat to extort \$1,000 from Nicholas J. Coin, president of the Davenport Ice Cream Company, proprietor of the Davenport Loan & Investment company and president and treasurer of the Davenport Fruit & Produce company, the blackmail artist who was believed Wednesday night, is supposed to have changed his tactics and to have adopted another means of sharing in Mr. Coin's wealth. He is believed to have been the same person who some time during Friday night broke into the office of the latter company at 207 East Second street.

Mr. Coin's bank book, also his check book, containing many blank forms, were taken, as also a check for the sum of \$7.50 issued by Simon Lewis of Rock Island and made payable to Mr. Coin. In addition several dollar's worth of postage stamps were taken.

Mr. Coin on Saturday morning notified all the Davenport banks of the stolen check forms, as also the police.

Entrance was gained to the establishment through a rear window. Possibly the blackhanders expected to find \$1,000 waiting for them there, but if so they were sorely disappointed. All I have for them is some of these," said Mr. Coin as he lifted a handful of cartridges from his pocket, and handled them off separately.

NO ORDERS TO KEEP HARNESS SHOP RUNNING

Unless They Come That
Department Will Cease
February 1.

65 DISCHARGED MONDAY

Small Arms Plant Will
Probably Last Until
First of July.

Although optimistic telegrams are being received almost daily from Davenporters in Washington as to the future of Rock Island Arsenal, Lieut. Col. L. G. McCrum, general manager of the government's huge war plant, stated Saturday night that no official orders to continue the harness shop had been received.

Unless these orders come from Washington the harness plant will shut down on February 1 and the eight hundred men employed there will be thrown out of work. Notices were served on them the 1st of January, but such agitation has since been started that it was hoped that the shop would continue operations.

Forces Cut Down.

Fifteen hundred men were employed in that department when the armistice was signed, but the force has been gradually decreased since until now approximately 800 men are working there.

The government plans, it is understood, are to move the plant to Jeffersonville, Ind. Secretary J. C. McCarthy, of the Davenport Commercial Club, and a committee of workmen are in Washington now attempting to get the order revoked.

Sixty-five employes of the harness shop, it was stated Saturday night by those who profess to know, are to be discharged Monday, unless orders come to the contrary from Washington today.

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FIX QUOTAS FOR TEAMS IN RELIEF DRIVE

Assignment of team quotas in the campaign to raise funds for the relief of war sufferers in the near east which opens Wednesday was made Saturday by Ed. J. Dougherty, city chairman. The quotas are based upon one-half of one per cent of the amount collected by the teams during the fourth Liberty loan drive. Davenport and Scott county will be called upon to give approximately \$31,000 for the relief of millions of starving Armenians, Syrians, Persians and Jews.

Appeals were made out Saturday by the city chairman to team captains urging them to exert every effort to raise the required amount. The team captains will meet Tuesday noon at the Commercial club to complete final plans for the drive.

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He was born in Jaemsted, Germany, January 30, 1861, and came to Davenport in 1875 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. Lueders. He was married October 24, 1889, to Miss Alvina Roehlk, who survives his death.

Mr. Lueders was at one time engaged as a stock buyer and was also interested in the lumber business. He served as a representative to the Iowa Legislature in the Thirty-sixth Assembly, during the years 1914-1916. He was active in the various Liberty Loan drives and was esteemed as an earnest citizen, who contributed materially to the progress and welfare of the community. His death is mourned by the entire town and vicinity.

The funeral will be held Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the home in New Liberty. Interment will be made in the New Liberty cemetery.
