Diazins, Wisconsin, August 12, 1868, and came to Hampton as a young man with his parents who were pioneer residents of the county. He was educated in the Hampton public schools and assisted his father in the Hampton General store and on the death of his father engaged in banking, real estate and farm loan business here for many years. He was president of the Citizens Bank before the turn of the century which bank later became the Citizen National bank in 1905. He served as a member of the Iowa State Senate from the 43rd senatorial district from 1913 to 1917. He was chairman of the Franklin County War Activities committee during World War I. He had always been active in community affairs and served as a member of the city council, board of education and library board and in numerous other positions. He was for many years a trustee for Cornell College and had been a delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist church at Baltimore in 1908; Minneapolis in 1912; Saratoga Springs in 1916, and was a delegate to the Ecumenical Conference in Toronto, Canada, in 1911 and in London in 1921.

Mr. Robinson had been very active in the Methodist church during his lifetime and served as head of the building committee which erected the present church building. He was the first treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Upper Iowa Conference and held that office many years.

Mr. Robinson had been a member of the Masonic Lodge for over fifty years.

In Congress Five Terms

Mr. Robinson served as representative in congress from the Third Iowa District for five terms, from 1923 to 1933 and he had made an outstanding record in his work there. He was recognized as one of Iowa's strongest representatives and he always stood for the best interests of his home district. In congress he was a strong supporter of farm legislation, a chief supporter of the McNary-Haugen bill which was up for consideration at that time. He was a member of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee.

During the last several years he had retired from active business life, but continued his interest in all worthwhile community projects.

He was married to Belle Clinton, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Cluton, of Hampton, on June 15, 1888, and they had always made their home in Hampton except for periods when he served in congress. To this union five children were born.

Mrs. Robinson preceded him in death on August 10, 1943, and one daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Clinton, died September 17, 1956.

The deceased is survived by two daughters and two sons, Mrs. Jessie Thornton, of Hampton, Mrs. H. S. French, of Wayne, Illinois; Walter T. Robinson, of Des Moines, and Lee C. Robinson, of Santa Fe, New Mexico.



On the 2d of February, 1881, Mr. Holbert was united in marriage with Miss Elma D. Baker, a daughter of Jerome and Sarah (Witter) Baker. Mrs. Holbert is a woman of much refinement and culture, the painter of many pictures of horse life and designer of the pedigree certificate of the German Coach Horse Association of America, a work notable for its dignity and beauty. Her affectionate companionship and intelligent counsel have been invaluable to her husband. By her marriage she has become the mother of six children, namely: Thomas R., a graduate of the Harvard law school; Fred B.; Benjamin, Jr.; Charmion; Warren Louis; and Marjorie Madeline.

Mr. Holbert gives his political allegiance to the republican party and was its successful candidate in November, 1914, for the office of representative in the thirty-sixth general assembly. He is now a member of the lawmaking body of Iowa and in the settlement of important questions brings to bear sound judgment and keen insight into business and public conditions. Of him a contemporary biographer has written: "He has in the fullest measure the confidence and respect of the community and all who know him are proud that one who has spent the greater part of his life in this county should have such noteworthy success and are especially gratified because his prosperity has been attained without recourse to questionable methods and solely by the exercise of sound judgment and by means of great enterprise and industry." He never allows business, however, to warp his nature and his is a well rounded development in which the obligations and interests of life in other directions receive full attention.

HON. THOMAS J. B. ROBINSON.

Hon. Thomas J. B. Robinson, a senator from the forty-third senatorial district, is a resident of Hampton, Franklin county, where he has large financial interests and where he is regarded as one of the most prominent and influential citizens. He was born in New Diggings, Wisconsin, August 12, 1868, a son of Isaac Robinson, who was born in England and was quite small when his parents came to this country. In 1840 they settled in Wisconsin, becoming pioneers of that state. In 1869 Isaac Robinson arrived in Iowa, locating at Hampton, where he was successfully engaged in mercantile pursuits until his death. A devout member of the Methodist church, he held many offices in the church and took most active and helpful part in its work. He married Eliza Graham, who was also born in England and who came to this country with her parents when quite young, the family home being established in Wisconsin. Mrs. Robinson survives her husband and now resides in Los Angeles, California.

Thomas J. B. Robinson was about two years of age when his parents removed to Hampton, Iowa, where in the public schools he pursued his education until graduated from the high school. He then entered his father's store and when later the business was sold turned his attention to banking, in which field he has won notable success. He first conducted a private banking business, dealing in farm mortgages, and that undertaking proved the foundation of the present banking house of Robinson Brothers at Hampton. Senator Robinson withdrew from that bank when he accepted the cashiership of the Citizens State Bank, and when the


charter of that institution expired the Citizens National Bank was formed and he became its president, in which capacity he has since continued. He was also one of the organizers and directors of the Coulter Savings Bank, also the Alexander Savings Bank and is the president of the Hansell Savings Bank, which he aided in founding. His sound judgment has been a strong directing force in these institutions leading to continued success and he is today one of the best known financiers in his part of the state.

In 1888 Senator Robinson was married to Miss Belle Clinton, of Hampton, her father being the Rev. John W. Clinton, who was a minister of the Methodist Episcopal church. Mrs. Robinson possesses rare social and mental qualities in addition to the supreme gift of being a home maker and is known to a host of friends throughout the state. To Mr. and Mrs. Robinson have been born five children, as follows: Jessie R., who gave her hand in marriage to Frank C. Thornton, of Benson, Minnesota; Walter T., assistant cashier of the Citizens National Bank; Marguerite R.; Dorothy B.; and Lee C.

In politics Mr. Robinson has ever been a staunch republican and for several years served as a member of the city council of Hampton. In 1912 he was chosen senator from the forty-third senatorial district, comprising the counties of Cerro Gordo, Franklin and Hancock. During the session of the thirty-fifth general assembly he served as chairman of the committee on congressional and judicial districts and during the session of the thirty-sixth assembly he was chairman of the committee on board of control. During both sessions he served on many of the most important committees of the assembly and his career as a legislator is a highly creditable one. The causes of temperance and equal suffrage found in him one of their strongest champions and he labored unceasingly for the passage of the measure that meant prohibition for Iowa. It was largely through his efforts that the women's reformatory bill was passed. Senator Robinson has also served as a member of the Hampton board of education, the Hampton library board and as a trustee of Cornell College, retiring from the latter in 1914 after several years' service. He is one of the leading members of the Methodist church at Hampton, in which he has held many offices, and he is also a prominent figure in both state and national bodies of that church, having served for three terms as a delegate to the general conference, which meets every four years, and as a delegate to the ecumenical conference, which meets every ten years. Fraternally he is a Knight Templar Mason and a Noble of the Mystic Shrine. In all of his business and public life he has followed constructive methods, realizing the fact that opposition brings us nowhere, and has builded upon a safe foundation both for individual success and for public welfare.

JOHN STANTON.

John Stanton, proprietor of Hotel Stanton and ex-mayor of Mason City, was called to the office of chief executive after ten years' service as a member of the city council. Long experience and study thoroughly acquainted him with every phase of the city's needs and possibilities and he gave it a businesslike and public-spirited administration. He was born on a farm in Rock county, Wisconsin, May 19, 1863.

ROBINSON, Thomas John Bright, a Representative from Iowa; born in New Diggings, Lafayette County, Wis., August 12, 1868; moved with his parents to Hampton, Iowa, in 1870; attended the public schools and the Hampton High School; engaged in agricultural pursuits; president of the Citizens National Bank of Hampton 1907-1923; member of the Hampton Board of Education and board of trustees of Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa; member of the State senate 1912-1916; delegate to many Republican State conventions; elected as a Republican to the Sixty-eighth and to the four succeeding Congresses (March 4, 1923-March 3, 1933); unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1932 to the Seventy-third Congress; engaged in the real estate and investment business; died in Hampton, Iowa, January 27, 1958; interment in Hampton Cemetery.

THOMAS J. B. ROBINSON

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Thomas J. B. Robinson, begs leave to submit the following:

Thomas J. B. Robinson was born August 12, 1868, near New Diggings, Wisconsin, son of Isaac and Eliza Graham Robinson. He passed away on January 27, 1958, at Hampton, Iowa, where he had moved with his parents in 1870. He attended public school and was graduated from high school there, and then entered the banking business at the age of eighteen.

On June 15, 1888, he was united in marriage to Belle H. Clinton, a daughter of the Reverend John W. Clinton.

Mr. Robinson became the president of the Citizens National Bank of Hampton, director of the Coulter Savings Bank of Coulter, and a director of the Alexander Savings Bank of Alexander, Iowa. He was elected to the Iowa State Senate in 1912, representing the Forty-third District, and served during the Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth General Assemblies. He served as Congressman from the Third District of Iowa from 1923 until 1933, actively supporting the McNary-Haugen bill and other farm relief measures. He also served as president of the Hampton Library Board and was a trustee of Cornell College at Mount Vernon, Iowa. He was a member of the Hampton City Council, chairman of the Franklin County war activities during World War I, was a Mason and a Shriner.

Church activities were also among Mr. Robinson's interests. He was a member of the Methodist church, a delegate to general conferences of the Methodist church, Baltimore, Maryland, in 1908, Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1912, and Saratoga Springs, New York, in 1916; he was a delegate to

Ecumenical conference in Toronto, Canada, in 1911 and London, England, in 1921.

Mr. Robinson is survived by two sons, Walter T. Robinson of Des Moines, Iowa, and Lee C. Robinson of Santa Fe, New Mexico; two daughters, Mrs. F. C. (Jessie) Thornton, of Hampton, Iowa, and Mrs. H. S. (Marguerite) French of Wayne, Illinois. A third daughter, Mrs. W. C. (Dorothy) Clinton, died several years ago. Mr. Robinson is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. J. H. Sniffen and Mrs. Ruth Burns of Los Angeles, California, and Mrs. J. H. Kimball of Berkeley, California.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly: That in the passing of Thomas J. B. Robinson, the state of Iowa has lost a valuable and honorable citizen and by this resolution tenders its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of the family.

Be It Further Resolved: That a copy of this resolution be spread on the Journal of the Senate, and that the Secretary of the Senate be directed to forward an enrolled copy to the members of the family of the deceased.

J. M. Tudor was born on a farm in Johnson County, Iowa, on November 4, 1887. He was educated in the public schools there and was a graduate of Iowa City Academy and Iowa State College.

In 1914, he was united in marriage to Grace Ryan of Irwin, Iowa, and to this union four children were born, one son and three daughters.


Mr. Tudor was associated with his father in the Angus cattle business for many years near Iowa City, Iowa. Later, he established the Glyn Mawr cattle herd near Olin, Iowa, which was one of the nationally famous herds of the breed. He was a director of the American Aberdeen Angus Breeders Association for twelve years and served as president in 1948. He was a nationally known livestock judge. He was a member of the Draft Board, the Farm Bureau, Phi Sigma Kappa Fraternity, the Methodist Church and Masonic Lodge. He was director of Public Relations for the Honeymead Products Company of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, at the time of his retirement in 1949.

Mr. Tudor served in the Iowa State Senate, representing the Twenty-third Senatorial District which includes Cedar, Jones and Jackson Counties, during the Fifty-fourth General Assembly.

On March 31, 1958, Mr. Tudor passed away at Salinas, California, having lived in Carmel Valley, California, for two years prior to his death.






