Fred Henigbaum, Well Known Merchant and Public Official Succumbs to Stomach Trouble

FRED G. HENIGBAUM, prominent and well known Davenport business man and public servant, member of the Iowa senate for two terms and active in civic affairs here for many years, died at his home at 5:30 yesterday afternoon following a brave but hopeless struggle against an acute disease. Stomach trouble was the cause of death. He was 57 years old.

Two weeks ago tomorrow Mr. Henigbaum returned from Chicago, where he had consulted an eminent specialist. He had received the final word that nothing could be done for him. From that time on the stricken man had not been able to leave his home, 607 East Locust street. He did not take to his bed, however, until yesterday.

Since last January Mr. Henigbaum had been in falling health. He had never loosened his hold on his business affairs. He had gradually been compelled to relinquish most of his active duties as his health failed more and more perceptibly.

The deceased was born in Albion, N. Y., June 10, 1864, the son of Adolph and Elizabeth Henigbaum. Together with his parents he removed to Davenport in 1875, and attended the public schools here. Following his graduation Fred Henigbaum entered commercial life and after business experience in various lines which took him away from Davenport and from Iowa for a number of years he returned here in 1895 to become one of the incorporators of the Davenport Furniture & Carpet company.

This concern later became the Iowa Furniture & Carpet company of today, one of Davenport's largest retail establishments. In this company Fred Henigbaum had always taken a prominent part. He was a member and director of the Davenport Commercial club and a member of the Greater Davenport committee, resigning from the latter body in 1913.

Altho a staunch Republican, Fred Henigbaum had never been a politician and had never held public office until 1914, when his friends persuaded him to enter the race for the state senate. Sacrificing his manifold business interests, Mr. Henigbaum became a candidate and was elected. He was again re-elected for the following term. In 1917 he again took up the threads of his business career in Davenport.

On Nov. 4, 1897, the deceased was married to Miss Laura Dean, who with one son, Ted; two brothers, Will and Adolph, and two sisters, Mrs. H. L. Huebotter and Miss Louise Henigbaum, survive.

Mr. Henigbaum was a genial, whole-souled individual who made a host of friends and had the happy faculty of retaining them thru life. Of a quiet, modest nature, he was a generous giver to those in need and in distress. Only his closest

friends are aware of the "lift" he has given many a fellow in the so-called down and out class. His response to an appeal for assistance was always generous and from the heart.

A recent instance of his generosity and warm heartedness was related today by one of his close associates. Standing in the doorway of his store conversing with several friends, Mr. Henigbaum was approached by a hungry individual who asked for the price of a meal and a bed. Mr. Henigbaum gave him a silver dollar. As the stranger strolled down the street, one of his friends remarked, "I'll bet that fellow is a fakir and that he took you in for that dollar." To this warning Mr. Henigbaum characteristically replied: "He may be and he may not. You don't know it, and I don't know it. I'm willing to allow him the benefit of the doubt rather than to be mistaken and refuse a hungry man."

So it was with Mr. Henigbaum in all things in life. He preferred to trust human nature rather than to condemn his fellow men, and he was always willing to back his convictions with a loosening of his purse strings.

The funeral will be held from the late home at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon with burial in Oakdale cemetery. Right Rev. Marmaduke Hare, dean of Trinity cathedral, will officiate. Funeral services at both the home and the grave will be strictly private. The family requests that no flowers be sent.

TENSION OVER ERIN NOW PAST

British Cabinet's Reply Invites Sinn Feiners to Conference.

DOOR FOR PEACE IS OPEN

No Separation of Ireland from British Empire Last Word.

Inverness, Scotland, Sept. 8.—(By the Associated Press).—Official confirmation that the British cabinet's reply to the latest note from Eamonn de Valera, the Irish leader, which was dispatched to Dublin last evening, invites representatives of the Sinn Fein to a further conference, was given here today.

The cabinet asked Mr. de Valera for a definite reply as to whether he was prepared to enter a conference to ascertain how the association of Ireland and the British empire can best be reconciled with the Irish national aspirations. It suggested that the conference be held in Inverness Sept. 20.

The British reply, written by Prime Minister Lloyd-George, says:

"Government by consent of the governed is the basis of the British constitution, but we cannot accept as the basis of a practical conference an interpretation thereof which would commit us to any demands you might present, even to that of a republic."

Dublin, Sept. 8.—(By the Associated Press).—Signs of confidence and good spirits were again apparent among the Sinn Fein leaders at the Mansion House here this morning. They have received knowledge of the contents of Prime Minister Lloyd-George's reply to Eamonn de Valera, which will be made public here this evening at the same time that the note is given out by the British. So far as could be judged, the Irish leaders were not disturbed or surprised by Mr. Lloyd-George's communication.

Tension Is Past.

Inverness, Scotland, Sept. 8.—(By the Associated Press).—Tension over the Irish question is over for the time being, now that the British cabinet's reply to Eamonn de Valera is well on its way to Dublin. Members of the cabinet who attended yesterday's meeting have split up in different directions pending the receipt of the Irish leader's rejoinder.

Ireland shall not be allowed to separate from the British empire, and the government's proposal of dominion status is the last word London has to offer, the British cabinet declared today.
