## E. D. RAYBURN WAS BURIED HERE ON FRIDAY

### Well Known in State. Died in Washington.

Funeral services over the body of E. D. Rayburn, Washington, Ia., were held Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Steffy Funeral Home and were largely attended by old-time friends of the family. Burial was in the Masonic-Odd Fellow Cemetery here. Services were in charge of the Rev. Paul Ellis, pastor of the Methodist Church. The Masonic order was in charge of the impressive graveside ritual.

Mr. Rayburn, following a long illness, passed away at his home in Washington, on the 14th of April. He would have been 79 on July 22nd.

Mr. Rayburn grew to manhood in this city and graduated from the public schools. Later he completed his education at Iowa State Teachers. For years he was influential in the affairs of the community, being president of the bank. He worked his way up from a clerk. He was a strong lodge member and helped in many ways. During his youth he played in the band and was prominent in social matters.

Ed, as he was known, was a well-known, banking figure, known over the state as well as in this county.


Since leaving here for Washington, he and Mrs. Rayburn have kept in touch with Montezuma and its citizens.

### Obituary.

On July 22, 1874, a son, Edward D. Rayburn, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Amos Falkenburg Rayburn in Montezuma, Iowa, and lived there practically all his life. Mr. Rayburn attended school here and graduated from the high school and from the Iowa State Teachers College in 1895. After graduation he entered the First National Bank as a clerk, then advanced to cashier and then was president for a number of years.

August 24, 1898, he was married to Gertrude Powell and to them was born one son, Powell Amos Rayburn.


In 1932 the State Banking Department sent him to Washington, Iowa, to assist in the liquidation of several banks in that county. He decided to remain there and entered the real estate business and maintained an office up until last July when he had to give it up on account of his health. Since September he has been bedfast and on April 14th he passed away at his home.

From 1915 to 1917 he served as State Representative from Poweshiek County. He enjoyed a wide acquaintance all over the state.


His father, mother and one sister preceded him in death. His survivors are his wife, and son Powell and wife who live in Fort Wayne, Ind.

#### EDWARD D. RAYBURN

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Edward D. Rayburn, begs to submit the following memorial:

Edward D. Rayburn was born at Montezuma, Iowa, July 22, 1874, and died April 14, 1953, at his home in Washington, Iowa.

His father, Amos F. Rayburn, who was a Civil War veteran, was born in Clinton County, Ohio, and his mother, Nettie Brosius, was born at Knightstown, Indiana. He graduated from the Montezuma High School and the State Teachers College at Cedar Falls in 1895. After graduation from college, he became a bookkeeper for the First National Bank of Montezuma of which bank he later became president. He was active in the civic life of his community, county and state, assisting in the improvement of streets, schools, and parks. He was one of the pioneers in the good roads program for Iowa.

During World War I, he was chairman of the Liberty Loan drives in Poweshiek County and received special recognition from the Treasury Department both for himself and the county for his outstanding success in the sale of bonds. Because of this wide experience in the banking field, he was called on by both the national and state banking departments to serve as receiver of many banks.

In 1932, he moved to Washington, Iowa, to take charge of a number of banks in liquidation in that vicinity. After completion of this task, he remained in Washington and engaged in the real estate business until the time of his last illness.

He was married in 1898 to Gertrude Powell, and had one son, Powell A. Rayburn. He was a member of the Methodist Church, and also of the

I.O.O.F., Knights of Pythias, Sons of Veterans, B.P.O.E., and Masonic Lodges, having been a member of the Consistory and the Mystic Shrine.

Mr. Rayburn was elected Representative of Poweshiek County and served in the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh sessions of the General Assembly.

*Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly of Iowa, That in the passing of the late Honorable Edward D. Rayburn, the State has lost an honored citizen and a faithful, useful public servant, and the House, by this resolution would express its appreciation of his service, and tender its sympathy to the members of his family.*

George H. Robb was born February 15, 1881, in Morris, Illinois. He came with his parents to Estherville, Iowa in 1893. He received his education in the Morris, Illinois and the Estherville, Iowa public schools. He also attended the Kankakee Commercial College at Kankakee, Illinois.

In 1902 Mr. Robb was married to Nellie R. Crim of Estherville. They had two children, J. Merrill and Maurine.

Mr. Robb farmed twenty-five years near Estherville, and for twenty years operated a livestock buying station and sales barn.

George Robb was known for his community service. He served thirteen years on the Estherville board of education, two years on the city council, and was mayor of Estherville. He was a charter member of the Emmet County Farm Bureau, and served as president of the Estherville Chamber of Commerce. He was active in the Methodist Church.

Mr. Robb was a prominent member of the Republican party. He served in the Fiftieth, Fiftieth Extra, Fifty-first, Fifty-second and Fifty-second Extra, and the Fifty-third sessions of the Iowa Legislature. He resigned as mayor of Estherville to accept appointment by Governor
