S. R. Reed Dies at Home in Monteith

Monteith lost another one of its old time citizens on Monday when S. R. Reed died. The writer has known Mr. Reed for many years and always had the highest regard for him. He was a self-made man, had many good qualities, and we believe the most we could say is that he was a man among men. He had a great faculty of being able to remember faces and he always had a good word for his friends and neighbors. He will not only be missed by Monteith and vicinity but also the county at large.

OBITUARY

Sidney Riley Reed, a son of Harmon T. and Louisa Jordan Reed, was born in Noble county, Ohio, on April 29th, 1859 and departed this life at his home in Monteith, Iowa on Monday, April 30th, 1934. His age at the time of his death was 75 years and 1 day.

Mr. Reed came to Guthrie county from Ohio when five years of age, with his parents who engaged in farming in Valley township. Here he grew to manhood, attending rural schools and later a school in Chicago.

At sixteen he began his teaching career in Beaver township schools. He taught for several years and was always identified with the educational interests of the county.

On November 10th, 1880, Mr. Reed was married to Alice McClellan, and they began their happy wedded life on the old Reed homestead at Monteith, where Mr. Reed engaged in farming and the feeding and raising of cattle.

To this union were born four children: Mrs. Perl Clampitt of det; Mrs. Nora Moenich of det; Mrs. Hazel avens of Rochester, Minn.; and Miss who died in infancy.

Mr. Reed spent practically all his life in Guthrie county where he was well known and highly respected. He was a member of the 37th General Assembly of 1916-17. He was also a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge.

He was a member of the Christian church for the past twenty-eight years and always was deeply interested in the affairs of that church.

His chief occupation was the cattle business. He had many partnerships in various parts of the country as well as his own individual interests.

He leaves to mourn his going, his wife, three daughters, two sons-in-law, three sisters, six grandchildren and four great grandchildren, besides a host of other relatives and friends.

Funeral services were conducted from the Monteith church at 2:00 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. W. S. Johnson of Des Moines having charge. Burial was made at the Monteith cemetery.

Corn Hog Expenses Total Less Than 2%

GUTHRIE HOG NUMBERS ARE ABOUT TEN PERCENT TOO HIGH

The budget of expenses of Guthrie county corn-hog administration to July 1st is less than 2% of the benefit payments according to figures issued by the county agent today. This means less than 1c per bushel on corn and 10c per head on hogs.

The budget, as well as the treasurer's bond, proofs of publication and minutes of township and county organization meetings were approved in Des Moines last week and forwarded to Washington for final approval.

Hog listing sheets for the county, sent to Des Moines for approval of the state committee were returned with the statement that the numbers of hogs reported were 10% too high.

This does not mean that everyone's figures will be cut 10%. The local committeemen are working on the contract papers now in an endeavor to find the ones who have overstated hog numbers. It is understood that probably few if any intentionally overstated.

Listing sheets on the corn acreage were O. K. as being within 2% of the tentative allotment for this county.

Escaped Serious Injury in Accident Tuesday Eve.

T. N. Webb and a Mr. Winslow of Council Bluffs both escaped serious injury when their cars sideswiped on the road west of Guthrie Center, Tuesday night. Webb was coming east at the Herron corner in his Hudson and Winslow was driving west in a Terraplane, when the two met.

The fenders of both cars were bent, the running board on the Terraplane torn off, and both wheels of the latter damaged. It has not been determined if more serious damage was done to the frame.

Average Citizen Spends \$400 Per Year Locally

Residents of Guthrie Center and vicinity spend approximately \$400 per person in the retail stores and shops here each year according to an estimate by the Chicago Wholesale Market Council.

This Council prepared the figures on this study to determine how best to accommodate Iowa retailers who buy goods from Chicago wholesalers.

The \$400 per person or about \$1500 per family, spent with Iowa merchants includes all purchases except for personal services such as laundry and barbering.





Iowa, where he resided upon a farm for many years. He is now living retired in the village of Anita. Unto Mr. and Mrs. Cline have been born seven children, of whom six are yet living: Warren E., who is employed in the Casey creamery; Franklin P., Albert E., Ollie F., Ernest L. and James F., all at home. One son, Eddie, is now deceased.

Mr. Cline belongs to Casey lodge, No. 256, I. O. O. F. He usually votes the democratic ticket, but is liberal in his views and at local elections frequently casts his ballot without regard to party association. His life has been a busy and useful one, crowned with success, and he is now numbered among the prosperous farmers of Thompson township, his property being a monument to his thrift and diligence.

SIDNEY R. REED.

Sidney R. Reed has been at different times variously connected with business and progressive interests in Guthrie county and is now associated with his brother, W. L. Reed, under the firm name of Reed Brothers, in the grain and live-stock business. He possesses a spirit of determination that has enabled him to overcome many difficulties and obstacles, such as always confront the business man. Prompt, energetic and reliable, he has made an excellent record in the business world by reason of honorable methods. He was born in Noble county, Ohio, April 29, 1859, his parents being Harmon T. and Louisa (Jordan) Reed. His great-grandmother in the paternal line. Mrs. Rebecca Reed, is still living. She is now eighty-five years of age and she has six great-great-grandchildren.

Harmon T. Reed, the father of our subject, was born in Morgan county, Ohio, on the 7th of December, 1838. There he was reared and engaged in farming until 1864,

when he came to Iowa. Arriving in Guthrie county, he purchased a farm in Valley township, then Center township, where he engaged in buying, feeding and shipping cattle in connection with general agricultural pursuits. He was thus busily occupied until 1875, when his knowledge and previous success in the cattle business took him to Chicago, where he engaged in the live-stock commission business at the Union Stock Yards. He was identified with the business there for fifteen months, after which he returned to Menlo, then known as Guthrie Switch, where he continued in the live-stock and grain business until 1878. In the fall of that year he went to Leadville, Colorado, where he engaged in mining and merchandising. During his sojourn in that state he was one of the four men known as the "lucky four" who discovered the Duncan mine on Friar hill. The others were Mike Duncan, George France and F. B. Bickford, all of whom were early settlers in Guthrie county. Mr. Duncan sold his interest to Mr. Reed and his partner, Mr. Bickford, for six hundred dollars, and some time later they opened up a rich silver vein that enabled them to sell the mine for thirty thousand dollars. The new company developed the mine rapidly and but a short time later they were shipping ninety tons per day which showed a smelting rate of thirty dollars per ton, and the mine was estimated to be worth one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

Harmon T. Reed remained in Leadville five years, after which he returned to Monteth and resided on the home farm until 1901, when he went to Palisades, Colorado. There he engaged in the raising of peaches and in this he has been very successful, securing a measure of prosperity in excess of all of his former investments. Some of his orchards are now worth three thousand dollars per acre and others are valued at almost as high a figure. He owns a residence at Long Beach, California, which he purchased in December, 1906, and which he

fairs he has been watchful of every opportunity of winning success, and as years have gone by he has attained a place of prominence as a live-stock dealer in Guthrie county.

ABRAM RUTT.

Abram Rutt, who has been connected with various business interests in Guthrie county, is now president of the Abram Rutt National Bank of Casey and is widely recognized as an able financier and a man of unqualified business integrity. He was born in Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, on the 3d of October, 1831, and is a son of Samuel and Susan (Whistler) Rutt, of whose seven children he alone survives. The father, also a native of Lancaster county, there spent his entire life, reaching the venerable age of eighty-two years. Throughout his active business career his time and energies were devoted to farming.

Abram Rutt was reared on the old homestead farm and acquired his education in the district schools of Lancaster county. His educational privileges were limited, as he attended school only when there was nothing of importance to be done on the farm. He remained upon the old homestead until his twenty-third year and in the fall of 1853 he came west, attracted by the broader opportunities, which he believed might be enjoyed in a new but rapidly developing section of the country. He spent the winter in Madison county, Iowa, and in the spring of 1854 he went to Adair county. He was closely associated with early events there that left their impress upon the history of that portion of the state. He helped to lay out the county seat of Adair county, which at that time was Fontanelle, where he continued to make his home until 1876.

Ever watchful of opportunities and readily recognizing the opportune moment when

the seventies to the lumber trade, opening yards in Casey. In this venture he met with success, building up an extensive business and at the same time he purchased and improved a section of school land in Adair county. To this he added a tract of two hundred and forty acres and he still retains the ownership of these landed interests. Upon establishing the lumberyard at Casey he removed to this town and continued in the lumber business until about 1888. In the meantime, however, he became a factor in financial circles, opening a private banking house, which he conducted for twenty years. In February, 1906, he organized the Abram Rutt National Bank, and on the 1st of March, 1906, the new financial institution opened its door for business, with Abram Rutt as president; William Valentine as vice president; and S. Lincoln Rutt as cashier. The bank is capitalized for twenty-five thousand dollars and is one of the leading financial institutions of Guthrie county. In addition to his banking and agricultural interests, Mr. Rutt deals in farm lands and his operations in real estate have been to him a fruitful source of income. In 1904 in connection with Michael McDonald, L. M. Kern, of Des Moines, and Mr. Miller, he bought seven thousand acres of land in Canada, which is now all sold.

On the 5th of February, 1866, was celebrated the marriage of Abram Rutt and Miss Sarah Valentine, of Adair county, with whom he traveled life's journey for nearly twenty years, being then separated by the death of the wife August 25, 1885. In his political views Mr. Rutt is a republican, who keeps well informed on the questions and issues of the day and is known as a stalwart champion of the party principles. He served for one term as county treasurer while living in Adair county. Fraternally he is connected with the Masons, at Fontanelle, having been made a Mason nearly fifty years ago.

Sidney R. Reed was born in Noble county, Ohio, April 29, 1859, and passed away at the family residence in the town of Montieth, Iowa, April 30, 1934.

At the age of three he came with his parents, Harmon T. Reed and Louisa Jordan Reed, to Iowa. His entire farm life was spent on the same farm near Montieth.

In his early life, he was a teacher in rural schools. Later he became a farmer and was also interested in the One Hundred and One Ranch in Cherry county, Nebraska. After retiring, he was associated with his brother in Montieth in livestock and grain business.

Mr. Reed was united in marriage on November 10, 1880, to Miss Alice McClellan. Three children were born, all of whom survive, Mrs. Pearl Reed Clampitt, Adel, Iowa; Mrs. Nora Reed Moench, Waterville, Minnesota and Mrs. Hazel Reed Havens, Rochester, Minnesota.

Mr. Reed served his community and state and served them well. Iowa has lost a most valuable citizen.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions, commemorating the life and service of the Honorable J. W. Roberts, late of Adair county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following memorial:

J. W. Roberts was born in Adair county, Iowa, July 9, 1861, and passed away at the family residence in Grand River Township, Greenfield, Iowa, on July 10, 1936.

Mr. Roberts during his life was prominent in his county serving as township officer, county recorder during the years of 1903 to 1909 and in the Forty-first and Forty-second General Assemblies of the State Legislature.

At the age of 25, he was united in marriage to Eva Jane Tullis. To them were born three children, two sons and a daughter, James and Lloyd Roberts, who resides near Greenfield and Mrs. Olie Grace Hoyt, who resides in Guthrie, Oklahoma. The grandchildren are Donald, Mildred, Robert and Roberta Hoyt and Betty Darlene Roberts.

Mr. Roberts was a resident of Grand River township for 58 years, served his community and state and served them well, and Iowa has lost a most valuable citizen.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-seventh General Assembly, That in the passing of the Honorable J. W. Roberts the state has lost an honored citizen, a man of high ideals in brotherly living and useful citizenship.

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the Journal of the House, and that the Chief Clerk be directed to forward an enrolled copy to the family of the deceased.


