Trenton, April 1 (AP)—An associate in the defense of Paul H. Wendel, held on a Lindbergh murder charge, said today the department of justice had started an investigation of the case with regard to Wendel's claim he was kidnaped in New York, tortured, and detained against his will before he made "confessions" to the Lindbergh kidnaping.

Trenton, April 1 (AP)—The sensation - soaked Lindbergh case, still reeling from the literally last-minute halting of Bruno Richard Hauptmann's execution last night, was threatened with further startling developments today.

The exact nature of developments could not be made public immediately a high source said, but it was indicated it would be sensational.

The possibility of Hauptmann escaping the death chair beyond tomorrow night developed today as the Mercer county grand jury delayed until tomorrow morning further consideration of the Paul H. Wendel alleged confession of the Lindbergh baby kidnaping.

Announcement of the delay by the grand jury was made by Prosecutor Erwin E. Marshall of Mercer county.

Last night the grand jury, by unprecedented action, had requested Warden Mark O. Kimberling of the state penitentiary to postpone the electrocution until it could make a further investigation of the Wendel angles.

The body remained in session until the early hours of today and then adjourned until this afternoon.

Aged Pioneer Of Armstrong Passes Away

Armstrong, April 1—Funeral services for William Stewart, 85 years old, one of the organizers of this town and a former state representative, who died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. B. Knipe here at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, are to be held Friday at 2 p. m. at the Methodist church with the Rev. John D. Wolcott, the pastor, officiating. Burial will be made in the Armstrong cemetery.

Although Mr. Stewart had been in poor health for more than a year he became seriously ill two weeks ago and was confined to his bed. His condition steadily grew worse, the aged man suffering from cancer.

Arrived In 1894

The pioneer moved to Armstrong in 1894, just as the town was being established, making the trip from Grundy Center on the first train ever to reach Armstrong. Mr. Stewart immediately set up the town's first bank which he operated for many years, finally disposing of his interest in the financial institution to enter the real estate business. He followed this line of work until about 10 years ago when he retired.

HITLER A NEW LOCA

Makes Sugg For Pact

Berlin, April 1 (AP)—A memorandum to the foreign secretary, Anthony Eden, proposed today negotiating a period of four months what might be termed "armistice" replacing the pact by Germany.

During these negotiations Hitler suggested Germany, France, and Belgium should control of their frontiers by the presence of one representative from Great Britain, Italy, and neutral power.

Both sides—Germany and France—militarized the Rhineland. The Locarno pact between France and Belgium, which tested this action—should prevent casting aspersions on either, either in public utterances, or teachings.

A plebiscite of the three countries involved was proposed by the League of Nations to give solemn sanction to the pact if statesmen once negotiations were concluded successfully.

He afterward rented land in Dallas county for a decade and in 1913 came to Emmet county, where he purchased the north half of the northeast quarter of section 14, Center township, upon which he is now living. His farm of one hundred acres is a highly cultivated tract and the land, naturally rich and productive, responds readily to the care and labor which he bestows upon it. He manifests diligence and determination in his business affairs and his indefatigable energy is one of the basic elements of his growing success.

WILLIAM STUART.


One of the most prominent and influential citizens of Armstrong is William Stuart, who has taken a very active part in the development of the town and has also borne a prominent part in public affairs. He was born in Ireland, January 10, 1851, and is a son of Alexander and Margaret (Ellis) Stuart, both natives of Ireland, though the father was of Scotch descent and the mother of English. In that country the former died and in 1857 Mrs. Stuart crossed the Atlantic with her family and located in Canada. Later she removed to Michigan, where her death occurred in 1876. In the family were eight children, six sons and two daughters, of whom four still survive.

William Stuart was practically reared and educated in Canada where he attended both the common and high schools. In 1864 he went to Fulton, Illinois, where he learned the blacksmith's trade and continued to work at the same for some years. In 1879 he removed to Grundy county, Iowa, where he was also engaged in blacksmithing and wagon making for a time but later engaged in the implement business. Since 1892 he has been a resident of Armstrong and on locating here embarked in the banking business, becoming identified with what is now known as the First National Bank, of which he is still vice president and one of the directors. This institution was organized as a national bank in 1901 and is regarded as one of the leading banks of this section of the state. Mr. Stuart is also president of the Armstrong Cement & Tile Company, which was

organized about 1910, and is the owner of four hundred and thirty-two acres of land, and also a third interest in one thousand, six hundred and thirteen acres, all in Emmet county, and all improved and under excellent cultivation. Besides the property already mentioned he owns a fine residence in Armstrong.

In 1882 Mr. Stuart was united in marriage to Miss Jennie Dunn, a native of Rock county, Wisconsin, and a daughter of Jacob and Maria (Dockstadter) Dunn, who were born in New York state but at an early day removed to Wisconsin and later to Iowa. Both are now deceased and of their eight children two have also passed away. Mr. and Mrs. Stuart have four children, namely: Grace M., now the wife of Dr. J. B. Knipe; Alta, the wife of O. Z. Burkhead, of Idaho; Hazel, the wife of Howard Smith; and Mildred, who is now attending high school in Armstrong.

Mr. Stuart is a member of Armstrong Lodge, No. 335, A. F. & A. M., in which he has filled all the chairs, and he also belongs to the Eastern Star Chapter. The republican party finds in him a staunch supporter of its principles, and he has been elected to represent the ninety-sixth district in the state legislature. He is now serving his second term as president of the school board and has also filled the office of supervisor for three years. Both he and his wife hold membership in the Methodist Episcopal church, in which he is one of the trustees. He has borne a prominent part in the development of his locality and his influence is always found on the side of right and order. In business circles he occupies an important position, and in all the relations of life he has been found true to every trust reposed in him.

JAMES D. WEIR.

For half a century James D. Weir has now witnessed the development and upbuilding of Emmet county and in its progress he has borne an important part since reaching man's estate. He is now successfully engaged in the hardware, implement and live stock business in Huntington, being the senior member of the firm of J. D. Weir & Son, and has built up an excellent trade along those lines.

Mr. Weir was born in Quebec, Canada, on the 3d of August, 1863, and is a son of David and Christine (Richmond) Weir, natives of Scotland. On coming to the new world they first located in Canada, but afterward came to the United States, becoming residents of Emmet county, Iowa, in 1867. The father purchased a farm in Armstrong Grove township, which he operated for eight years, and then removed to Emmet township, buying one hundred and sixty acres of land near Eagle Lake, whereon he followed farming for fourteen years. At the end of that time he retired from active labor and took up his abode in Estherville, where he was living when called to his final rest on Christmas Day, 1900. His wife had died in June of that year and both were

He was vitally interested in the politics of his county and served as a member of the Iowa House of Representatives in 1906 and 1912.

Mr. Sidey was married in 1890 in Toronto, Canada to Miss Margaret Sinclair, who passed away 2 years later. HONORABLE WILLIAM STUART

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorative of the life, character, and public services of the late Honorable William Stuart, of Emmet county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

Mr. Stuart was born in Ireland, January 10, 1851, of Scotch-Irish parentage. At the age of six years he immigrated to Canada, with his widowed mother and older brothers and sisters. They settled in the Province of Ontario, on a farm where Mr. Stuart grew to manhood and received his education. In 1864, he went with an older brother to Fulton, Illinois, where he learned the blacksmith trade and there continued in this work for some time. In 1879, he came to Grundy Center, Iowa, where he engaged in wagon making and practiced his trade.

As time progressed he gradually established himself in the retail implement business.

In 1892, Mr. Stuart and B. F. Robinson, a member of the Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth and Thirty-first General Assemblies, migrated to the new town of Armstrong and started a bank. After several years of active banking

he sold his interest in the bank so that he could devote most of his time to real estate interests.

He was actively identified with various activities and enterprises in the community and was postmaster during the Taft administration. He served for several years on the board of supervisors of Emmet county. In the fall of 1916, he was elected to the State Legislature from Emmet county and served in the Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth General Assemblies.

Mr. Stuart was a member of over sixty years standing in the Masonic Lodge, and was one of the founders and charter members of Emmet Lodge No. 533.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, one of its official board members, and gave of his time and resources unsparingly to the church of his choice.

Mr. Stuart came to Armstrong on the first train that pulled into the station when the new town was established. He watched and aided the town and community develop from a wild prairie of virgin vegetation into a highly cultivated area of farm lands and modern homes. Forty-four years later on March 31, 1936, in his eighty-sixth year, he received his final reward.

Uncle Billy, as he was often called, lived for and loved his community, and was ever untiring in his efforts for its betterment. That the fruits of his labor shall not pass on, his progeny remains a living example of service to mankind and that common cause.
