## FRED G. TURNER CALLED IN DEATH AT NORTH ENGLISH

**Former Legislator Was Active In Community, Church, County Affairs**

Funeral services for Fred G. Turner, 82, former state legislator, were held at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 6 at the Christian church in North English. A former pastor, Rev. Harold Reel of Mount Ayr, was in charge and was assisted by Rev. Albert Billingsley, Ray Mahannah and Mrs. Harold Reel sang the hymns with Mrs. Merle Smith as pianist. Interment was in the North English cemetery with John Kirkpatrick, Elmer Riess, Lewis Miller, E. L. Graham, Orville Kolosick and Virgil Fancher serving as active pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers were Ora Lown, Wilbur Carson and Henry Riess.

Fred Grandison Turner was born in Wisconsin on Oct. 2, 1865. He came to Iowa County with his parents in 1888 and they settled in a log cabin on a farm near North English. He was educated in the public schools. On Oct. 4, 1893, he was married to Matilda Delia Troger of Millersburg, who survives him. To this union were born five children, one of whom died in infancy. Those surviving are: Mrs. Buell M. Lindgren of Des Moines, in whose home death came to Mr. Turner on Dec. 2nd; Mrs. Lyle E. Campbell of Atlanta, Ga.; Mrs. Hugh M. Huff, Jr., of Roswell, New Mexico; Don Turner of North English; and ten grandchildren.

Mr. Turner was active in civic and social affairs of the community. He was elected to the Iowa State Legislature as the representative from Ia. county in 1914 and served two consecutive terms. During that time his home was made in Des Moines and he lived there until 1926 when he returned to the farm near North English. In 1928 he was elected to the Iowa county board of supervisors and served two terms. He was a member of the Grange, a member of the Christian church at North English, of the Masonic lodge, the Consistory and of the Order of the Eastern Star.

## PARNELL SECTION FOREMAN DIES OF ACCIDENT INJURIES

**Tom Hall Struck By Rail Being Unloaded Dec. 2; Services At Williamsburg**

Thomas Hall, 58, died at St. Luke's hospital, Cedar Rapids, Friday afternoon, Dec. 5, from injuries received Tuesday, Dec. 2nd at North English while unloading rails for the Milwaukee railroad. Mr. Hall, section foreman at Parnell, and his crew of workmen had been assisting in unloading rails along the line. A crane was in operation and a heavy rail became loosened; Mr. Hall, seeing it swing toward the head of a fellow workman, attempted to grab it. The rail swung around crushing his right hand, right shoulder and striking him a severe blow on the abdomen, causing internal injuries which proved fatal a few days later. A North English doctor was summoned to the scene of the accident and Mr. Hall was removed to the hospital.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Presbyterian church in Williamsburg with Rev. Lloyd Snyder, assisted by Rev. Lawrence Thompson of Oxford, officiating. Mrs. Leslie Oliver and Burton Jones sang "God's Tomorrow" and "God Will Take Care of You". Mr. Jones sang the "The Lord's Prayer". Interment was in Oak Hill cemetery, Williamsburg, with the members of the town council, of which Mr. Hall was a member, serving as pallbearers. They were Charles Hanley, George Von Leinen, John O'Rourke, Ed Sheridan, Robert O'Brien and Clarence Tiernan.

Thomas Hall, a son of James E. and Mary Delilah Hunter Hall, was born August 20, 1889 at Summersville, Mo. He was married to Maude Ellen Wren at Summersville on Aug. 7, 1915 and they moved to Moravia, Iowa, in 1916. In 1923 they moved to Blakesburg and lived there until 1931 when they came to Parnell where they have since made their home. Mr. Hall's work was railroading and he was active in civic and church affairs. He was a member of the school board at Blakesburg, and for the past six years had served on the Parnell town council. He had transferred his church membership to the Presbyterian church at Williamsburg. He was a loving husband and father and will be sadly missed in his community. The sympathy of all goes to his family, particularly to Mrs. Hall who suffered a nervous breakdown and is a patient in a Marengo hospital. She was unable to attend the funeral.

Besides his widow, Mr. Hall is survived by three children, Mrs. Mae Humphreys of Oxford, Mrs. Richard Hutchins of Cedar Rapids, and Wade Hall, at home; six grandchildren, Ricky Hutchins, Jeralee, Joanne, Joyce, Janice and Tommy Humphreys; 3 brothers William P. Hall, Ottumwa, Lee and Wesley Hall, Ottumwa, Mo., two sisters, Mrs. Lottie Scott and Sadie Hall of Summersville. #### HON. FRED G. TURNER.

Hon. Fred G. Turner, representative of his district in the state legislature and a prominent farmer of English township, Iowa county, was born in Dane county, Wisconsin, on the 2d of October, 1865, a son of James and Laura J. (Clark) Turner. Although the father was a native of Nova Scotia, Canada, and the mother of New Hampshire, they were married in Wisconsin, where they had removed as a young man and young woman. In October, 1866, they came to Iowa county, Iowa, and located upon a part of the farm now in the possession of our subject. They continued to reside there until called from this life, the demise of the father occurring in April, 1896, and that of the mother in April, 1905.

Fred G. Turner was reared upon the homestead in this county and received his education in the district schools of its vicinity. Upon reaching his majority his father took him into partnership and they farmed together for a number of years. As time passed, however, the father retired more and more from the operation of the farm and our subject gradually assumed the control and management of the work. Following the demise of the father Mr. Turner of this review purchased the home farm of three hundred and forty acres from the estate and subsequently purchased an adjoining one hundred and sixty acres, so that his property now comprises five hundred acres in one body. It is all under cultivation and everything about the place is kept in excellent condition. He uses scientific methods in the operation of his farm and gives the same care to the management of the financial phase of farming that a business man gives to his business, seeking always to eliminate waste and to secure the largest net profit possible.



In 1893 occurred the marriage of Mr. Turner and Miss Delia Troger, and their children are, Blanche Irma, Grace Marvel, Laura June and Fred Donald. Mr. Turner has supported the republican party since age conferred upon him the right of franchise and he is one of the recognized leaders of that organization in this part of the state. At the November election of 1914 he was chosen as state representative from his district, his fellow citizens thus recognizing his grasp of public affairs, his keenness of insight and his loyalty to the public weal. He has held a number of local offices, was for ten years a member of the board of trustees and for twenty-five years has been president of the school board. He is identified with North English Lodge, No. 256, K. P., and is also a loyal and consistent member of the Christian church, of which he is an elder and to which his wife likewise belongs. He has met with signal success as an agriculturist and has also prospered as a stock-raiser. He is a representative of that type of man who, while looking carefully after his private affairs and winning financial independence, also finds time to devote to matters of public concern and co-operates with measures seeking the well-being of his community.

#### JOHN P. GALLAGHER.

John P. Gallagher, the junior member of the firm of Osborn & Gallagher, publishers of the Williamsburg Journal-Tribune, is a native of York township. He was born on a prairie farm, his parents being John and Catharine Gallagher, natives of Tyrone and Monaghan counties, Ireland. They located in York township in 1859. There were nine children in the Gallagher family and the subject of this sketch is a twin, his brother mate being G. P. Gallagher, who resides on a farm within sight of the old homestead. The father of the twin boys died when the sons were yet in their teens and they at once assumed the responsibilities of the three hundred and twenty acre farm, canceling its debt and maintaining a home for their mother and sisters.

In 1888 John P. was appointed to the railway mail service, his first assignment being the run from Davenport to Calmar; in 1890 he was transferred to the run from Marion, Iowa, to Kansas City, Missouri, and he spent eleven years in this, resigning in 1901, when he became part owner of the newspaper with which he is still connected.

Mr. Gallagher never attended other than the district school, and this only in broken periods, but his studious disposition has required but little aid; he has read good, wholesome literature, he has been a constant observer of the leading plays and his deductions and conclusions always bear the stamp or seal of an originality redolent of genius. As a writer his work at once attracts attention by the earnestness, force and fairness of his expressions. He belongs to no political party in the sense that he must be ever ready to advocate its proclaimed tenets; he regards the common or general good as of paramount importance and is bitterly opposed to the theory that the common or general good is best subserved or promoted by an unbending allegiance to any political party and his fondest dream is that some day, some time, "all men's good shall be each man's

## Memorial to the Honorable Fred G. Turner of Iowa County

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Fred G. Turner, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Fred G. Turner was legislator, county officer, extensive farmer, school board official for twenty-five years, took an active interest in all local affairs besides serving in the House of Representatives of the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh General Assemblies.

He was born in Dane county, Wisconsin, October 2, 1865, and the following year came with his parents to Iowa county. He was married to Miss Delta Troger and they are the parents of three daughters, Mrs. Grace Lindgren of Des Moines, Mrs. Irma Campbell of Atlanta, Georgia, and Mrs. June Huff, of Roswell, New Mexico, and a son, Don Turner, who is a resident of North English, Iowa.

He was laid to rest on Saturday afternoon, December 6, 1947, at the Christian Church of North English, Iowa, with the Rev. Harold Reel, former pastor, of Mt. Ayr, in charge.

Beside his residence in Iowa county, he spent his declining days in Des Moines at the home of his daughter, who cared for him during his illness.

He was held in high esteem by his constituents, and by all his many friends and colleagues during the entire period of his fine public service.

*Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-third General Assembly of Iowa:* That in the passing of the Honorable Fred G. Turner the state has lost an honored citizen and a faithful, useful public servant, and the House, by this resolution, would express its appreciation of his services, and tender its sympathy to the members of the family.
