SENATOR JOHN C. VOORHEES.

John Cramer Voorhees, son of the late Peter and Hannah Voorhees, was born at White House, New Jersey, May 18th, 1865, and passed away at his home in Anita, Cass county, Iowa, at 2:30 a. m. on Thursday, November 21st, 1918, at the age of 53 years, 6 months and 3 days. Death was the result of complications, from which he had suffered more or less during the past two years and especially since March of the present year, at which time he consulted a number of specialists in regard to his condition, from whom he received but little encouragement as to the probability of regaining his former good health.

Having acquired a common school education in his native state, at the age of 16 years he came to Anita and engaged his services to his uncle, the late Dr. V. D. Rood, who owned and conducted a hardware and implement store on the lot where stood the old opera house, recently destroyed by fire. It was here that young, healthy, ambitious "Jack" Voorhees, a bright, capable lad of pleasing address, of exemplary habits, and possessed with the natural faculty of forming acquaintances, making friends, and retaining those friends under all circumstances, laid the foundation for a future successful business career, and to no one in this or any other community; and it cannot be denied

Within a few years he established a business of his own on Main street and later erected a double two-story brick building, which was necessary in order to promptly and more conveniently handle his large and increasing business, which he finally disposed of; his bank and other interests demanding his entire time and attention. In every line of business in which he engaged, and in his numerous financial investments he was careful and conservative, and those investments have all proved successful.

On October 1st, 1884, at Anita, Iowa, he was united in marriage to Miss Otumwa E. Gaylord, a daughter of the late D. F. and Tabitha Gaylord. Two sons were born to Mr. and Mrs. Voorhees: Edson, the eldest, who died in infancy, and Leon G. Voorhees, who is in the aviation branch of the United States service, and was at home on a brief furlough when his father passed away. Leon is married and has one child; his wife being the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Trimmer.

In politics, John C. Voorhees had been a life-long Democrat, and in 1914 was elected to the Iowa state senate from the Eighteenth senatorial district, composed of the counties of Cass and Shelby, serving through two sessions of the general assembly, and at the time of his death was a member of the committee on retrenchment and reform; one of the very important standing committees of that branch of

Voorhees, Jr.; four brothers and two sisters, as follows: David T. and Peter E. Voorhees of Anita, Iowa; Chas. Voorhees, of Omaha; Dumont Voorhees of White House, New Jersey; Mrs. Kate Clark of Summerville, New Jersey, and Mrs. Edna Twining, of Des Moines. Another sister was the late Mrs. Luella Bruce, wife of Senator Jas. E. Bruce, of Chicago.

Senator Voorhees was a member of Obedience Lodge No. 380, A. F. & A. M., and Knights of Pythias, of Anita; the Chapter, Commandery and Elks lodges, of Atlantic; each society being represented at the funeral services.

The floral tributes from fraternal societies and from neighbors and friends were many and very beautiful; the silent messengers expressing the sentiment of those who, during his life time, knew and loved Senator Voorhees.

Funeral services were held at "Cramer's Corner," the Voorhees home in this city, on Sunday at 2:30 o'clock, conducted by Rev. W. H. Boaz, pastor of the Congregational church. A quartette, composed of Mrs. W. R. Spence, Mrs. G. A. Roe, W. R. Spence and R. C. Rasmussen, rendered most impressively the beautiful selections: "Lead, Kindly Light"; "I'm a Pilgrim," and "Remember Now Thy Creator." Interment was made in Evergreen cemetery.



JOHN C. VOORHEES

John Crammer Voorhees born at White House, New Jersey, May 18, 1865, passed away at his home November, 1918.

At the age of 16 years he came to Anita from White House, and became a clerk in a hardware store for his uncle, S.C. Rood, for which he received \$5 per month and his board. From this beginning he saved a competence to start a hardware business of his own. By hard toiling and good business judgement, he built up one of the largest hardware, implement and furniture stores in southwestern Iowa, selling the same when he bought the Bank of Anita from C.M. Myers. He changed the name of the bank to The Anita Bank.

Besides being a banker he operated two large farms near Anita. He was also interested in oil lands in Oklahoma. As a business man he made a wonderful success, being computed as the richest man in Cass County.

In 1914, Mr. Voorhees was elected to the state senate from the Cass-Shelby district. As a member of the Iowa senate, he had considerable influence, and was a member of the most important committee known as the retrenchment and reform. In politics he was a Democrat, and as a boy was page in the New Jersey legislature. He was a personal friend of Gov. W.L. Harding.

He was married October 1, 1884 to Miss Ottumwa E. Gaylord, who passed away March 21, 1918. He has a son, Leon, who was associated with his father in the banking business when he enlisted in the U.S. Aviation service (WWI). A son, Victor Edson, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held at his late home on West Main Street and interment was in Evergreen Cemetery.

CARL L. AND LIZZIE VOSS

Carl L. Voss was born in Germany January 28, 1877, the son of Henry and Elise Goos Voss and came to the United States in 1892.

He was married to Lizzie Armstrong, daughter of Joseph H. and Emma Stuckler Armstrong, in Hancock March 10, 1908.

Carl was a rural mail carrier at Walnut for several years following their marriage. They farmed in the Minden, Lewis and Walnut vicinities, retiring and moving to Atlantic about 1942.

To this union six children were born: Roy C. Voss; Lloyd E. Voss; Pearl E. Dilichay; Ethel E. Voss; Lorene M. Cozad; Hazel L. Rudy.

Lizzie died March 30, 1966. Carl L. died December 2, 1969. Both are buried in the Atlantic Cemetery.

EMIL VOSS

Ophir Chapter 84. Royal Council Nineteen. Kedron Commandery Forty-two. Member of Farm Bureau. Commander World War I, Barracks 1571.

Senator Newberry said in part:

I desire to say regarding Senator Sweney that he was a good presiding officer, a good lawyer. I happened to be in the convention when he was nominated to Congress. It was a very hot contest. There were three candidates. Colonel Sweney was selected by one-sixteenth of one vote. He served a term in Congress. He was a very capable man and when he came back, I think, being a man of considerable means, did not engage in his practice in law at Osage to any great extent.

JOHN C. VOORHEES.

Senator Nelson, from a special committee, submitted the following report and moved its adoption:

MR. PRESIDENT—Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions to commemorate the life, character and public services of the Honorable John Crammer Voorhees, late of Anita, Cass County, Iowa, and a former member of the General Assembly of the State of Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

John Crammer Voorhees was born at White House, New Jersey, May 18, 1865, and died at his home at Anita, Iowa, on November 21st, 1918, at the age of fifty-three. He lived at White House, New Jersey, until sixteen years of age and removed to Anita, Iowa, where he has resided until his death. He was a member of the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh General Assemblies.

Besides being a banker he was engaged extensively in farming, operating two large farms near Anita. He was also interested in oil lands in Oklahoma; and had extensive land interest in different parts of the United States. As a business man he made a wonderful success, being reputed the richest man in Cass County. When Mr. Voorhees came to Iowa he had nothing, and went to work and took a great deal of interest in his hardware, implement and furniture business and built up one of the largest businesses of this kind in southwestern Iowa.

On October 1st, 1884, in Atlantic, Iowa, he was united in marriage to Miss Ottumwa E. Gaylord, the Rev. E. S. Hill performing the ceremony. Mrs. Voorhees passed from this world only a few months preceding her husband. They left one son, Leon Voorhees, surviving.

Mr. Voorhees was a member of the Knights of Pythias, the Masons, the Elks of Atlantic, and the Chapter and Commandery of Masons in Atlantic. In 1914 he was elected to the state Senate from the Cass-Shelby district. His career in politics was a success. One of his strongest characteristics was his happy, sunny disposition.

Therefore Be It Resolved, That in his death, the state of Iowa and the nation lost a worthy and upright citizen, an honest able and fearless man and an advocate of all things for the betterment of his country and state, and we hereby extend to the bereaved family and friends, our sincere sympathy, and

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be printed in the journal of the Senate and that the secretary of the Senate be directed to forward an engrossed copy to the family of the deceased.

The resolutions were adopted unanimously by a rising vote.

In moving the adoption of the resolutions Senator Nelson spoke in part as follows:

It was not my pleasure to be very well acquainted with ex-Senator Voorhees. He was a sterling character and a real business man. He set an example before the young people of today of what may be accomplished today in this land of ours. He was a man thrown out on the cold business world early in life and advanced steadily and gradually, showing what can be accomplished in this life and as such I commend him to the people of the state of Iowa. He was a man of good business qualities, and much energy. His life was composed of deeds not words. He died early in life, yet having lived a complete life, so to say.

Senator Wilson spoke as follows:


To my mind there is no occasion of such real profit in our senatorial careers as are these memorial occasions. It is with a peculiar sense of sadness that I say anything in reference to Senator Voorhees. During the Thirty-sixth General Assembly, among all the associates I have had in the six years—four sessions, none tied themselves to me with quite the firmness as does the association of Senator Voorhees. His sunny smile, his genial manner, his hearty handclasp are things that can never be forgotten; and after all, those are the things that make for success in life, not the accumulation of wealth, not the attainment of fame, but the fact that a man is right at heart is the only thing, fellow senators, that we take with us.

When you or I die, a few tears will be shed and soon it is all forgotten. Struggle against it as we will, how sadly true it is! May it be said of us as of our brother from Cass that as we enter the river of death we have as our pilot the captain of our salvation, may we hear not only the heavens ringing hallelujahs but the still small voice saying, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."


FREDERICK TOWNSEND.


