W. W. Saylor, Once Mayor Dies After Breaking Hip

Funeral services for W. W. Saylor will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at Kaiser's funeral home.

Mr. Saylor died Wednesday in St. Joseph's Mercy hospital where he had been a patient since the preceding Wednesday. Death was from shock due to a fractured hip. The hip was broken when Mr. Saylor accidentally fell in his bedroom.

Born Dec. 22, 1853 in Somerset county, Pa., he was one of nine children of Samuel and Sarah Saylor. He came to Iowa with his parents in 1859 and settled in Waterloo. In 1871 the family moved to a farm south of Denver. As a youth Mr. Saylor attended Iowa State Teachers college at Cedar Falls. He was married in 1885 to Kathryn Winner. They resided in Mitchell, S. D. for four years, returning to Waverly in 1889.

Mr. Saylor served as State Representative for three terms and as mayor for two terms. He was a member of the public school board for 17 years and was president of the board when the present high school building was built. For many years he was engaged in the retail and wholesale lumber business. He was a member of the Masonic lodge for more than 50 years and was also a member of the Knights Templar and Odd Fellows. His wife and son, Merrill, preceded him in death.

Surviving are a son, Lynn, and a granddaughter, Carolyn, of Chicago.

occurred when he was seventy-two years of age. His wife survives him and resides with her son upon the homestead. She is past the age of eighty-three. She and her husband were members of the Methodist Episcopal church. They were the parents of five children: Maria, the wife of James Nichols; Monroe, of this review; Cora, who died at the age of one year; Attie, the wife of H. B. Miller, of Waverly; and Olive, who married Dr. Beyer, also of Waverly.

Monroe Wescott acquired a district school education and later attended the Platteville Normal in Platteville, Wisconsin. From his early childhood he assisted his father with the operation of the homestead and after the latter's death bought the property which he still owns. The land comprises two hundred and twenty acres and is valuable and well improved, Mr. Wescott's farming interests being today extensive and profitable. He is president of the Sumner Creamery and a man of recognized business ability and integrity.

Mr. Wescott married Miss Drusa Roberts, a native of Fayette county, and they have become the parents of three children: George, who married Belle Caruthers and who lives at home; Jesse, who died at the age of one month; and Olive, who is teaching in the graded schools of Sumner. Mr. Wescott gives his political allegiance to the democratic party and served for two terms as township trustee and for five terms as assessor. He is a man of high official and business standing and is recognized as one of the most valuable and substantial citizens of the community.

WILLIAM W. SAYLOR.

William W. Saylor, a well known and successful citizen of Waverly, is identified with business interests as a stockholder in the Citizens Lumber Company of Minneapolis, of which he has been auditor for a number of years and which he has also represented as a salesman since about 1907. He has, moreover, been prominent in public life, representing his district in the state legislature as a member of the thirtieth and thirty-first sessions. His birth occurred in Somerset county, Pennsylvania, on the 22d of December, 1858, his parents being Samuel and Sarah (Dull) Saylor, likewise natives of the Keystone state. The father, who worked at the cabinet-maker's trade in early manhood, came to Iowa in 1860, locating in Waterloo, Blackhawk county, before the railroad had been built here. In the fall of 1871 he came to Bremer county, took up his abode on

a farm near Denver and there carried on general agricultural pursuits until 1892. In that year he disposed of the property and removed to Rockwell, Cerro Gordo county, where he spent the remainder of his life in honorable retirement, passing away in 1895. The demise of his wife occurred in 1908.

William W. Saylor, who was the third in order of birth in a family of nine children, attended public school at Waterloo until 1871 when the family removed to the farm near Denver. From that time until nineteen years of age he attended country school and afterward spent two fall seasons as a student in the seminary at Waterloo, Iowa. Subsequently he attended the Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls during two winter terms. He remained under the parental roof, assisting his father, until twenty-four years of age and then went to South Dakota, where he secured government land and undertook the management of a lumberyard at Kimball, continuing in that state for six years. After three years' residence in South Dakota he had returned to Iowa to be married. On again returning to this state he spent three years as manager of the lumber business of J. C. Garner and then entered into partnership with J. F. Donlon for the conduct of a lumber and implement business. At the end of six years he disposed of his interests in that connection. For a number of years he has been auditor for the Citizens Lumber Company, formerly of Waterloo and now of Minneapolis, and since about 1907 has acted as a salesman for the firm, selling principally bridge material. He is also a stockholder in the concern and is recognized as one of its most valued and able representatives. He owns some valuable residence property in Waverly.

In March, 1886, Mr. Saylor was united in marriage to Miss Kittie Winner, who was born near Waverly, Bremer county, in May, 1865, her parents being Anson and Miranda Winner, natives of New York. They came to Iowa in an early day and settled near Waverly, the father devoting his attention to farming and stock shipping. He is now living retired in Waverly, and the mother also survives. Mr. and Mrs. Saylor have two children, Merrill W., who was born in June, 1891, is employed in the office of the Waterloo Construction Company; and Lynn A., who was born in February, 1901, is attending school.

Mr. Saylor is a stanch republican in politics and a well known figure in the local ranks of the party. He served as a member of the city council for nine years and was also elected mayor but resigned that office at the end of eight months in order to take his seat in the state legislature. He represented his district in the general assem-

bly during the thirtieth and thirty-first sessions and in that connection made a record which reflected credit upon himself and justified the confidence of his constituents. He is a worthy exemplar of the Masonic fraternity, being a member of the blue lodge and chapter, and has been identified with the Woodmen since 1884. Mr. Saylor likewise belongs to the Maccabees, the Knights of Pythias and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and was one of the incorporators of the Mystic Toilers. Such in brief is the life history of William W. Saylor. In whatever relation of life we find him—in political circles, in business or in social relations—he is always the same honorable and honored gentleman, whose worth well merits the high regard which is uniformly given him.

O. A. McCumber, the owner of a well improved farm of one hundred and sixty acres on section 31, Dayton township, which he has operated for the past twenty-seven years, has served continuously as township assessor since 1891, his incumbency covering a longer period than that of any other like official in the county. He came to Bremer county in 1855 and is one of its few remaining citizens who took up their abode here at that early day. His birth occurred near Belvidere, Boone county, Illinois, on the 12th of June, 1846, his parents being Albert and Achsa McCumber, who were born, reared and married in New York. The father's birth occurred on the 1st of September, 1818, while the mother's natal day was July 25, 1825. They removed to Boone county, Illinois, in an early day but subsequently returned to the Empire state and thence came to Bremer county, Iowa, in 1855. Albert McCumber acquired one hundred and sixty acres of land on section 31, Dayton township, and there carried on general agricultural pursuits throughout the remainder of his life, passing away in 1892. His widow, who still resides in Dayton township and has attained the age of eighty-eight years, is well known and highly esteemed throughout the community which has been her home for almost six decades. They were the parents of nine children, as follows: O. A., of this review; Augustus, who died at the age of seven years; Jane, who passed away in childhood; Marquis C., whose demise occurred in early manhood; William, a resident of Waverly; Ida, who is the wife of William Robinson, of Webster, South Dakota; Albert, who passed away at the age of twenty years; C. L., a real-

WILLIAM W. SAYLOR

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable William W. Saylor, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

William W. Saylor was born December 22, 1858, in Somerset County, Pennsylvania—one of nine children born to Samuel and Sarah Saylor. He died Wednesday, January 9, 1952, at Waverly, Iowa, and was buried January 11 at Harlington Cemetery in that city. Death was caused by shock due to a fractured hip, which was broken when Mr. Saylor accidentally fell in his bedroom.

He came to Iowa with his parents in 1859 and settled in Waterloo. In 1871 the family moved to a farm south of Denver, Iowa.

As a youth, Mr. Saylor attended Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls. In 1885 he married Kathryn Winner of Waverly. They resided in Mitchell, South Dakota, for four years, returning to Waverly in 1889.

Throughout his life Mr. Saylor occupied many positions of honor and trust in his community. He was a member of the Public School Board for seventeen years—part of the time as president. He also served on the town council and was elected mayor for two terms. He served as a member of the House of Representatives in the Iowa Legislature during the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second sessions. He was a member of the Masonic Blue Lodge for more than fifty years as well as belonging to the Chapter and the Knights Templar and also to the Odd Fellows Fraternity. Most of his life he was engaged in the retail and

wholesale lumber business. Mrs. Saylor and his son, Merrill, preceded him in death. Surviving are a son, Lynn, and a granddaughter, Carolyn, both of Chicago.

In the passing of Mr. Saylor both the State and community suffer the loss of an outstanding and upright citizen. The good works performed by him during his long life of ninety-four years will live on for many years to come.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly of Iowa, That in the passing of the Honorable William W. Saylor the State has lost a valued and honored citizen, and the House would tender its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family in their sorrow.

WILLIAM SCHMEDIKA

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable William Schmedika, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

William Schmedika was born in Shullsburg, Wisconsin, August 19, 1869, son of Henry and Mary Schmedika. He had been a resident of Hardin County since he moved there with his parents at the age of four years. The family moved to the Radcliffe vicinity where he grew up. In 1928 he moved to his farm southeast of Iowa Falls.

Mr. Schmedika was active in political circles for a number of years. He served in both Houses of the Iowa Legislature, being elected to the House of Representatives in 1915 and to the Senate in 1923. He served one term in each of the branches.

He was also a frequent candidate for county and state offices, running on both the Democratic and Independent tickets. He was last a candidate for a state office on one of the minor party tickets.

He was married to Miss Clara Awe in 1889, who died in 1907. Four children, all of whom are living, were born to the couple. They are Mrs. Noble Johnson and Mrs. Bert Benson, both of Radcliffe; and two sons, Dale of Alden and Roy of Jewell.

Mr. Schmedika died on June 3, 1951, at the age of 81 years.


