# William H. Scott Is Dead

Attorney William H. Scott, former state senator and educator, died Monday night at his home for the past year, Friendship Village in Waterloo. He was 85, and had been ill for time.

A family graveside service will be held Wednesday at Greenwood cemetery. A memorial service will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday at Westminster Presbyterian church in Waterloo. Officiating will be Dr. Christie Swain of Waterloo and his former pastor in Nashua, the Rev. Glenn L. Utterback.

Mr. Hoyer gives his political allegiance to the democratic party, but the honors and emoluments of office have had no attraction for him, as he has always preferred to do his public duty as a private citizen and not as an office holder. He has ever stood on the side of progress and improvement in community affairs, and his labors have been a forceful element in the work of general development here.

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JOHN HUENEKE.

John Hueneke, proprietor of the billiard and pool hall and refreshment parlors at Alta Vista, was born in Dubuque county, Iowa, September 16, 1873, a son of Otto and Anna (Feldermann) Hueneke. The father, a native of Germany, came to the United States in his boyhood with his parents, but the mother was born in Jackson county, Iowa. After his marriage Otto Hueneke settled on the old home farm owned by his father and spent his remaining days upon that place. He became the owner of the property and continued to further develop and improve it until his death in 1906. His wife had passed away many years before, her death occurring about 1877.

John Hueneke was a pupil in the district schools and after his textbooks were put aside he continued to work upon the home farm with his father to the time of his marriage. He then purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land in Washington township, Chickasaw county, four miles east of Alta Vista, and thereon resided until 1910, when he took up his abode in the town, having sold his land the previous year. For two years after settling in Alta Vista he engaged in grain buying for the Gilchrist Elevator Company and subsequently devoted his attention to dealing in horses. In 1915 he purchased the billiard and pool hall and refreshment parlors which he has since conducted and in the intervening period of four years has built up a business of substantial proportions.

On the 28th of October, 1902, Mr. Hueneke was united in marriage to Miss Minnie Joachim, a daughter of Carl Joachim, who came to Chickasaw county from Illinois in 1886. To Mr. and Mrs. Hueneke have been born seven children, four of whom survive, namely: Florence A. A., Elva M., Arnold O. C. and Vera L. A.

Politically Mr. Hueneke is a republican and he and his family are members of the Lutheran church, while fraternally he is connected with Alta Vista Lodge, No. 658, I. O. O. F. He has become a stockholder in the Farmers' Lumber & Coal Company and through well directed efforts has won a position among the wide-awake and alert business men of his town.

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HON. WILLIAM HUGH SCOTT.

Hon. William Hugh Scott, of Nashua, a member of the state senate of Iowa and a well known attorney at law in Chickasaw county, was born in Fayette county, Iowa, October 4, 1883, his parents being Alexander and Margaret (Scott) Scott, who are natives of Scotland. They came to this country in early life, the father crossing the Atlantic with his parents in his boyhood, while the mother arrived in young womanhood. They were married in Fayette county, Iowa, in 1882 and there Mr. Scott devoted his attention to the occupation of farming until 1909, when he retired from active business and took up his abode in West Union, where he and his wife now make their home.

William Hugh Scott, reared under the parental roof, obtained his early education in the schools of West Union, passing through consecutive grades to his graduation from the high school with the class of 1901. He afterward matriculated in the Upper Iowa University, from which he received his Ph. B. degree in 1908. Thus with broad literary learning to serve as a foundation upon which to build the superstructure of his

professional knowledge, he entered the law department of Drake University at Des Moines and there was graduated with honors in the class of 1915. In June of the same year he was admitted to the bar and on the 1st of July opened an office in Nashua, where he has since remained in active practice. Advancement at the bar is proverbially slow but no dreary novitiate awaited Mr. Scott. He soon won recognition of his powers by reason of his ability in presenting causes before the courts and his clientage has steadily grown in volume and importance. Moreover, his ability in other directions has been recognized by his fellow citizens, who on the 5th of November, 1918, elected him to the Iowa state senate, in which he is now serving. He most thoughtfully and earnestly considers the vital questions which come up for settlement and his progressive course has won warm commendation from his constituents. In April, 1916, he was elected mayor of Nashua and was reelected to this position in April, 1918, resigning January 15, 1919, to enter the state senate. His administration of municipal affairs was of a most practical and progressive character, bringing about various needed reforms and improvements in the city life.

On the 5th of June, 1909, Mr. Scott was married to Miss Ada Evelyn Heckel, of Clayton county, Iowa, and they have become the parents of a son, Everett Greig. Mr. Scott is identified with Bradford Lodge, No. 129, A. F. & A. M., of Nashua, and is a loyal follower of the teachings of the craft. Both he and his wife are consistent members of the Congregational church and their position in social circles is an enviable one. In all that he has undertaken Mr. Scott has made steady advancement, and the high position to which he has attained in professional circles and the high honors accorded him in political circles indicate that his future career will be well worth watching.

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#### THEODORE C. HOLSCHLAG.

Theodore C. Holschlag, who follows farming on section 30, New Hampton township, Chickasaw county, was born in Scott county, Iowa, February 5, 1875, and is a brother of B. A. Holschlag, in connection with whose sketch is made mention of the parents on another page of this work. During his youthful days Theodore C. Holschlag assisted his father in the work of the home farm and at the age of six years became a pupil in the district schools of New Hampton township, there acquiring the education that qualified him for life's practical and responsible duties. The occupation to which he was reared he has made his life work and following his marriage he began building on his present farm of one hundred and twenty acres.

It was on the 10th of October, 1905, that Mr. Holschlag wedded Miss Rose De Muth, a daughter of J. P. and Barbara (Gross) De Muth, who are residents of New Hampton, where the father has been a prominent figure in business circles since 1869. The young couple began their domestic life upon the farm which is still their place of abode and in January, 1906, they removed into their new home, one of the fine farm residences of the county. Here they enjoy the comforts and many of the luxuries of life as the result of their industry and capable management. Mr. Holschlag devotes his time and energies to the further development and improvement of his farm of one hundred and twenty acres and in addition he rents pasture land. His activities have been carefully directed and energy and determination have been the salient factors in winning his present-day success.

Prior to her marriage Mrs. Holschlag engaged in teaching school for twenty-seven consecutive terms in District No. 4 in New Hampton township. No higher testimonial of efficiency and capability could be given than the fact that she was so long retained as teacher of one school. By her marriage she has become the mother of two children: Harold Clemens John, born January 2, 1907; and Carl Bernard, October 15, 1912. The parents are communicants of St. Mary's Catholic church of New Hampton. In politics Mr. Holschlag maintains an independent course, voting for men and measures rather than party. He is now serving as treasurer of the school board in District No. 4, New Hampton township, in which his wife was so long a teacher. Their interest in community affairs is deep and

and editor of the "New Hampton Tribune," his father having gone off on a much-needed vacation. His preparation for the dual editorial and administrative post had been long and arduous, for from 1929 to 1937 he had devoted all his spare time to an apprenticeship in the printing shop, business office and editorial rooms, under his father's tutelage. After 1937 he had also served as office manager and advertising manager of the weekly. After the elder Mr. Feuling's return, after a vacation of several months, the son became associated with the Industrial Materials Company of Fort Wayne, Indiana. In 1941, when Eugene Feuling again accepted a Government post, John Feuling returned to New Hampton and again took over the management of the "New Hampton Tribune."

Nine months later, however, the United States having been catapulted into World War II, he was called into the Army. Assigned to the Corps of Engineers, he was sent to Fort Belvoir, Virginia, for basic and officer training. On July 21, 1943, Mr. Feuling was attached to the 174th Air Combat Battalion, 96th Division, with which he sailed for the South Pacific Theater of Operations, where he arrived in July, 1944. He participated in action at Leyte, at Okinawa, and other famed battle spots of the Pacific, as a member of the combat engineer units. After the Japanese surrender, he was a member of the American occupation forces in Korea. By March, 1946, his entire battalion had sufficient service credit points to be returned to the United States and separated. Mr. Feuling then returned to Fort Wayne, Indiana, where he became associated with Swansen, Inc., wholesale distributor of Chevrolet motor parts. He remained in Fort Wayne until the elder Mr. Feuling died in September, 1947. Since then he has been the publisher and editor of the "New Hampton Tribune." In April, 1948, Mr. Feuling purchased the "New Hampton Economist" and consolidated the two weeklies. He now issues them as one paper with two names, appearing semi-weekly. In other words, the "Economist," which has a circulation of two thousand, four hundred and ninety-six, appears on Tuesday; the "Tribune," with a circulation of two thousand, seven hundred and one, appears on Thursday.

Active in New Hampton's civic affairs, Mr. Feuling is one of the leaders of the New Hampton Chamber of Commerce. Back in 1940, when he was office and advertising manager of the "Tribune," he was secretary of the Chamber. He is also active in the Iowa Press Association, the National Editorial Association, the Chickasaw County Fish and Game Association, and the New Hampton Golf and Country Club. A prominent Catholic layman, he is also well known as a worker in the Knights of Columbus. Fishing and hunting are his favorite sports.

On May 7, 1941, Mr. Feuling married Mary Ann Fishering, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter J. Fishering, of Fort Wayne, Indiana. Mr. Fishering is the president of the Erie Materials Company. Mrs. Feuling is a graduate of LaSalle Junior College, Auburndale, Massachusetts. Two children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. John Eugene Feuling: Nanette Agnes Feuling and Dan Thomas Feuling.

**EVERETT G. SCOTT**—Among the young veterans who have entered professional life in Fayette County is Everett G. Scott, who came to West Union upon his discharge from the service in November, 1945, and opened a law office. The son of a well known attorney at Nashua, Iowa, Mr. Scott is rapidly building a general practice and making a place for himself in the community.

He was born August 20, 1918 in Nashua, in Bremer

County, the son of W. H. and Ada (Heckel) Scott. Mr. Scott's paternal grandfather, Alexander Scott, and his wife were both natives of Scotland, each of whom came to the United States alone in their teens and settled in Fayette County, where they met and were married. Of their three sons, W. H. Scott and Greig Scott are attorneys, the latter being prominent in his profession in Phoenix, Arizona, and George L. Scott of West Union is now chairman of the Iowa State Liquor Commission. Before receiving this appointment he had been for ten years a member of the Iowa State House of Representatives, from Fayette County.

W. H. Scott, who is a native of West Union, became an attorney and has practiced for years at Nashua. He married Ada Heckel, a native of Millville, in Clayton County. Her father was born in Germany but came to Iowa as a youth and settled in Clayton County. The only child of W. H. and Ada (Heckel) Scott is Everett G. Scott.

Mr. Scott attended Nashua High School and the University of Iowa, where he graduated from the liberal arts course in 1939 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts and from the Law School in 1941. For a year he practiced law at Rock Rapids. In June, 1942 he entered the United States Coast Guard for service in World War II. He received his discharge in November, 1945, and came at once to West Union, where he opened an office and began the practice of law. In January, 1949 Mr. Scott completed construction of an office at 115 South Vine Street, which is very modern and attractive, both in design and decoration, and ideally situated for his professional use. On October 1, 1949, Mr. Scott was appointed county attorney to fill an unexpired term caused by the resignation of the previous incumbent. He has since been elected to this office, on the Republican ticket, to serve for the term commencing January 1, 1951. Mr. Scott is a member of the American Legion, the Lions Club and the West Union Country Club. He is a Republican and a member of the Presbyterian Church. Golf is his favorite diversion.

In 1941 Everett G. Scott was married to Shiela Bunze of Charles City, the daughter of Carl Bunze, deceased, who was an official of the G. P. Smith Company, millwork manufacturers of Charles City. Mrs. Scott is a graduate of the University of Iowa and taught for one year at the Iowa Soldiers' Orphans' Home in Davenport. She is now active in women's club work and civic projects. Mr. and Mrs. Scott have two children: Janet, born in 1943; and Kathleen, born in 1947.

J. O. Shaff was born January 6, 1885, the son of John H. and Jennie Drips Shaff. He held a bachelor's degree from Iowa State College and a master's degree from the University of Wisconsin. He was a life resident of Camanche Township, a member of a family which came to Clinton County from Sodus Point, New York, in 1837.

He married Gladys Meick of Dodgeville, Wisconsin, in 1909. She passed away in 1918. In 1921 he married Mrs. Evelyn Purcell.

Mr. Shaff was a State Representative in the Thirty-seventh Session and a State Senator in the Fortieth, Fortieth Extra, Forty-first, Forty-second and Forty-third Sessions of the General Assembly. During his incumbency as a State Senator he worked diligently in establishing Iowa's primary road system. He was chairman of the Senate highways committee during a special session of the legislature in which the first one hundred million dollar paving bond issue was approved. He worked successfully in behalf of shifting the cost burden for paving highway construction to road users instead of by special assessment. He was a member of a committee of twenty-two which went to Washington after World War I to petition for agricultural tariff protection. He was a member of the Resolutions Committee at the 1928 Republican National Convention in Kansas City, Missouri. Two sons have served in the General Assembly.

William H. Scott was born at West Union, Iowa, on October 4, 1883, the son of Alexander and Margaret Scott, pioneer farmers. He died on June 9, 1969.

He was graduated from high school in West Union and from Upper Iowa College at Fayette. After college he served as superintendent of schools for a period of five years in North Dakota. He then returned to Iowa and was graduated from the Drake University Law School in June of 1915. Immediately after graduation he opened a law office at Nashua and was elected mayor of the town. He maintained his Nashua law office until 1967.

He was married to Ada Heckel in 1909, and to them was born one son, Everett Greig. Ada Heckel Scott passed away in 1955. In 1956 Mr. Scott married Minnie Camp who is his surviving widow.

Mr. Scott, a Republican, was elected to the Iowa Senate in 1918 from Chickasaw and Floyd Counties and served one term.

He was a member of the Masonic Order for over fifty years. He was counsel for the Chickasaw County draft board during World War II and for several years thereafter.

Surviving Mr. Scott are his widow, Minnie Camp Scott, and his son, Everett Greig Scott, of Waterloo, Iowa.
